Last week I shared here the first in a series of reflections on love. I mentioned our desire to love and be loved is not present in us because of our own doing but because God intentionally created us this way. God's understanding of love is much greater than the limited notion of it simply being an emotion or a feeling. For God, love never seeks its own interest and relentlessly pursues the good of other people, regardless of the cost. That is why God tells us we need to love even our enemies. Jesus willingly offering Himself for crucifixion makes this clear. We are reminded of this each time at Mass when the priest repeats the words of Jesus at the consecration: "This is My body given up for you!"

The opening prayer of Mass this weekend is as follows: *O God, who founded all the commands of your sacred Law upon love of you and of our neighbor, grant that, by keeping your precepts, we may merit to attain eternal life, through our Lord Jesus Christ...* Through this prayer we are being reminded that each of God's teachings and commandments are about loving God and neighbor. When we take them to heart, and allow them to direct our thoughts and actions, the benefit for doing so extends beyond this world into eternity.

Jesus, being the Good Shepherd that He is, reminds us during our weakness that God's commandments are not burdensome. Every person has the ability, if they apply themselves, to live according to the plan of Godly love. Even the thought of acting differently is not present in any person in heaven. Choosing to disregard any of God's commandments is choosing to only partially live the plan of Godly love. There is good in every person, but the unGodly aspects of the them are what damages their relationships with others and prevents them from entering heaven. We see that at every level of society.

The sins of pride and selfishness are the cancers that are destroying us and society at many levels. It's well worth our time to examine the many ways that these two sins give birth to every other sin. They are completely incompatible with heaven, yet many people allow these to remain part of their daily thoughts and actions. These two sins are the freeway to hell that many are traveling. In the first Scripture reading at Mass last week, God asked us to reflect on why "the sinner hugs [sin] tight"? Why do we cling to what prevents us from entering heaven?

You might consider praying the following prayer, or something similar to it, each day. *Lord, help me to love You authentically with my whole heart, mind, soul, and strength. Help me to have such an honest love for You that it overflows to others. Help me to look past myself in pride and selfishness. Help me grow in self-discipline so that I will generously and sacrificially give of myself to You and my neighbor. May Your holiness permeate my life completely and totally, and help others do the same. Amen.*

The first quarter is in full swing at the elementary school! Mr. Bob Keller (Title I teacher) has started providing remedial support to students in small groups in the areas of math and reading and Mrs. Jenny Pennell (gifted and talented teacher) has started working with small groups of students on enrichment activities that challenge their critical thinking and analytical skills. We are looking forward to Mrs. Anne Petrie joining us at the end of the month to work with our students (K-8) on 21st century learning skills and hands-on STEM concepts that incorporate science, technology, engineering, and math.

In the classroom, students have started building important "habits and skills" as homework has been assigned across grade levels (K-5) and student planners have been implemented in grades 3-5. The weekly newsletters that teachers have been sending home in the home-school envelopes on Wednesdays outline homework expectations, content standards being covered in the classroom, and important dates and reminders. Students are to copy assignments and due dates into their planners at the end of each day. Parents are expected to review their child's planner each night and sign it. Teachers are expected to do a quick planner check each morning to look for parent signatures. In alignment with our PBIS "Be a Spartan" program, students will be rewarded with Spartan Bucks for following the planner expectations.

Over the last several weeks, students have been learning all about two programs that are foundational to St. Peter's Elementary: (1) **Virtues in Practice (VIP)** and (2) **Positive Behavior Intervention Support (PBIS)**. Students are now comfortable with the programs and teachers have begun to put these programs into practice.

Virtues in Practice (VIP)

VIP is a two-year character development program. This program is structured to fit the monthly school calendar, as well as liturgical season, and eighteen virtues are emphasized during the course of the two-year cycle.

Each month's virtue includes four weekly tips or suggestions for students to follow in order to practice the virtue in a concrete and practical way. The monthly virtue and weekly tip are announced each morning as part of daily announcements as a reminder to students and staff. In addition, VIP reminders are placed in each classroom and teachers emphasize the virtue in class activities, stories, discussions, and assignments. "Students of the Month" are selected by their teachers based on demonstration of that particular month's virtue.

The virtues, which form the heart of the program, are: courtesy, responsibility, honesty, patience, respect, self-discipline, compassion, courage, tolerance, cooperation, empathy, citizenship, generosity, hope, charity, mercy, humility and perseverance.

For the month of September, the virtue is cooperation. Children are encouraged to work together to solve problems, think about their talents and find ways to share them with others, remember that everybody should contribute to the group and deserves to be heard, and be willing to listen to others' ideas and compromise.

Positive Behavior Intervention Support (PBIS)

PBIS is a systematic process that guides districts and schools in developing policies and practices that proactively define, teach and support appropriate

behavior. PBIS suggests a shift in thinking about behavior and discipline so that emphasis is on reinforcing positive behaviors.

By focusing on prevention-oriented programs, reinforcing positive behaviors, and offering individualized instruction, PBIS practices support Ohio's strategic plan (*Each Child, Our Future*) and fulfill the call to educate the whole child by emphasizing social and emotional learning to increase success in academics and in life.

The theme of St. Peter's PBIS process is "Be a Spartan" and focuses on three expectations that guide student behavior in all areas of our campus: classroom, restroom, hallways, playground, cafeteria, and mass. The expectations are:

- Be Safe
- Be Respectful
- Be Responsible

The expectations are defined by specific guidelines and are posted throughout the school campus reminding students how to "Be a Spartan" during each activity of their day.

As part of our PBIS process, teachers and other staff members use evidence-based practices to increase student learning and decrease classroom disruptions.

To offer positive reinforcement of appropriate behavior during all activities and academic learning, the teachers and staff:

- Constantly teach and refer to our school-wide expectations
- Provide students with more praise than correction
- Talk to students with respect using positive voice tone
- Actively engage everyone in the class during instruction
- Use pre-correcting, prompting, and redirecting while teaching
- Look for the positive first and provide positive, immediate, frequent, and explicit feedback

“Be a Spartan” is a team-based process for systemic problem solving, planning, and evaluation. It is an approach to creating a safe and productive learning environment where teachers can teach and all students can learn. When students are “caught being a Spartan,” they earn “Spartan Bucks” to use in the school store each week.

Overall, the administration and school staff have worked really hard over the summer to ensure that all of the programs, policies/procedures, and supports mentioned above were in place for our students when they returned to school in August. From remedial support to enrichment opportunities, St. Peter’s is unique in that we know each of our students individually and their learning needs. We work really hard to put programs in place that support each student’s individual needs and help students learn and grow socially, academically, and spiritually. I am looking forward to another fantastic school year!



HISTORY TIDBIT ABOUT ST. PETER PARISH



In a sense, Father Maurice Howard could be considered the first Pastor of Mansfield Saint Peter's, since it was he who was asked in the early autumn of 1844 by the Bishop of Cincinnati (really the Bishop of all of Ohio), John Baptist Purcell to attend to the people of Mansfield on a regular basis. Often impassable roads, extraordinarily long distances between mission stations, and inclement weather made for frequent challenges to Father Howard's ministry.


40 Days for Life Fall Campaign Kick-Off Prayer Rally

REFLECTION ON TODAY'S READINGS

Notice any difference between the attitude of Paul in the second reading and that of the workers in the Matthew's Gospel? The workers grumble because the latecomers got the same pay as those who worked all day. Paul has worked for the Lord for years, yet he thinks it is better to keep working than to claim his reward of eternal life.

The workers grumbled because the landowner gave the same wages to the ones who only worked for an hour. (You can imagine the picket signs: Vinedressers Local on Strike: Management Unfair!) Matthew was referring to the Jews who had served God for centuries and now see newcomer Gentiles claiming equality in the church. They were complaining about God's generosity in reaching out to all peoples, not just the chosen few. God's generosity is the real point. Contrast that with Paul, who loves the Philippians so much that he is willing to put off his heavenly reward if he can help any more people come to Christ. That is the attitude that Jesus hopes for in all his disciples. We can care more about bringing Jesus to others than we do about our own comfort or even our lives. We can do this because we know the Lord's ways are not fair—they are more generous than we can imagine!

SAINT VINCENT DE PAUL (1581-1660) FEAST DAY -SEPTEMBER 27



St. Vincent de Paul was born in the 16th century and lived on a small farm in Gascony, France. He worked herding his family's livestock as a child and entered seminary at age 15. He was ordained at age 19 but since he was too young to be a pastor, he continued his theological studies. Although he initially hoped priesthood would afford him a comfortable life, he had a change of heart while hearing the confession of a dying servant. From then on, he sought to fulfill the spiritual needs of the poor in France. He eventually became the leader of the Vincentian community, whose members devoted themselves to the service of the poor in small towns and villages. Throughout his life he established confraternities of charity, organized fundraisers for missionary projects, founded hospitals and seminaries, and ransomed slaves. He also had a particular passion for training priests by conducting retreats. Vincent started out as a hard and rough man but became tender and sensitive to others' needs. Let us be uplifted by the example of St. Vincent de Paul, who allowed himself to be transformed by Christ in both character and deeds. May we follow his example and seek to serve those in need in whatever capacity God may be calling us to. — Tami Urcia
