We sat right up in the front row. She said we would be able to experience the Mass better by not having our view blocked by other attendees.

Outside of those couple of years of going to 7 p.m. Mass with my grandmother, we were a 5 p.m. family. We had "our pew." Even after I left Mansfield, I still never chose to sit "up front." That started to change after my children were born.

When David was a baby, we still sat in the back, near the cry room. However, their cry room was much larger and usually full of kids running around playing with toys. Even the adults used the room to chat with each other during Mass. In other words, I could not stand being in the cry room.

At some point, the sage reasoning of my grandmother came back to me. Over the course of a few months, we found ourselves moving up towards the front row. Believe it our not; our fidgety two-year-old became less fidgety. He started to pay more attention to what was going on at the altar. Since then, we have done or best to sit up front.

Fr. Jeremy reiterated on Christmas Eve how enjoyable it was to have so many little kids at Mass and how it is a good thing for our Catholic faith to have young children participate in the sacrament of the Eucharist.

So to my fellow parents with young children, I challenge you to try my grandmother's advice. Try moving up to the front of the church one weekend. You may find that your little ones are less fidgety because they can now see what is happening at the altar. Don't worry about your kids making noise, both our of priests have told me many times they are not bothered by it. Trust me; my three-year-old daughter has spent more time hiding under the pew the last month then above it.

For anyone who already sits up front, don't be upset if a younger family chooses to bump you from "your pew." They are just taking my advice.

Our children are the future of our church. Give them the opportunity to see and participate in the Mass.

This moratorium is set to be lifted on January 12, 2017, with the execution of Ronald Phillips. Bishop Daniel E. The unfolding of the story of the Incarnation continues today as the Church celebrates the Epiphany. The tale of the magi from the East is one of the most fascinating in all of scripture. It has much to teach us about what we can come to expect, even in circumstances and places that may seem insignificant or small. Bethlehem was a tiny town, what we might refer to today as a town without even one stop light. Yet it is over this seemingly insignificant place that the guiding star stops in its own search for the place where the Savior would be born. Too often we fail to recognize the fact that the star of Bethlehem comes to rest in our everyday lives, where we can experience God's presence, manifested in ever new ways. Epiphany calls us to shake off our stupor and recognize the One who comes to save us.

TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION

This year, in the United States the celebration of the Epiphany falls on January 8, but the traditional date for the Epiphany is January 6. The date we know as January 6 was established as the solstice in Egypt in 1996 BC, but the Egyptian calendar lost a full day every 128 years. Twenty centuries later the actual solstice had migrated to December 25. People still kept January 6 for the solstice celebration, but December 25, matching nicely with the Roman pagan feast of the Unconquered Sun, launched an extended solstice holiday. By the time of the early church, the whole period of twelve days was celebrated just about everywhere.

Christians began to celebrate Christ as the true light of the world in four themes: the Nativity, the manifestation to the Gentiles, the baptism of the Lord, and the wedding feast at Cana. That was entirely too much for one day to handle. A twelve-day season was ready to be adapted, so Christians borrowed from the pagan calendar for their own season of light. Thus early Christian celebrations of the Christmas season extended from one date for the solstice, December 25, to the older date, January 6. The darkest time in the Northern Hemisphere could now be filled with the Christian observance of the arrival of the Light of the World.
