The Scriptures often remind us that the wisdom of God is thought of as folly in the eyes of the world. Could there be any better example of that notion than the incredible, thrilling story of which we have been part for the past week?

Consider that Jesus had been making religious waves all over Judea at a time when making waves wasn't the best way to stay out of prison or off the cross. He attracted large crowds of followers wherever he went. Those crowds followed him even to remote places lacking in the most basic of human needs. He entered Jerusalem on a colt, acclaimed by crowds who spread palm branches and even their own clothing before him so that he would not have to walk on the dirty streets.

None of this went unnoticed by the religious authorities, who wanted nothing to do with the upheaval that the ministry of Jesus seemed to promise. They hatched a plan to trap and condemn Jesus, and in our liturgies last week we heard that old familiar story. Crucify him! Crucify him! Away with him! Let his blood be on us and our children, they cried.

And then, pleading for forgiveness for his tormentors and accusers, Jesus did something even more incredible. He surrendered his Spirit and died. Incidentally, the late Father Raymond E. Brown, S.S., in a commentary on the Gospel of John, wrote that only God could willingly surrender his spirit...that only God could will himself to die in the way that Jesus did. To anyone observing those events, Jesus' death must certainly have seemed like surrender and defeat.

No doubt the followers of Jesus felt that defeat and despair. They must have believed that all their hopes were dashed into the dust. As the cold stone closed the silent tomb where Jesus lay, all nature must have held its breath...waiting for whatever maelstrom would come next. The Lord of Life was dead. Or so it seemed.

Then, in the quintessential 'good guy wins out in the end' story, we fast forward to the day after the Sabbath...the first day of the week. Imagine! An empty tomb! No sign of him anywhere. What could have been more strange? Executed as a criminal in the most barbaric way imaginable, buried behind an enormous stone, the body of Jesus is gone and his followers are mystified.

Of course we all know the rest of the story, as Paul Harvey used to say. But let's stop to consider what we can draw from this story. Seemingly fallen in defeat and despair, Jesus is raised to new and eternal life. The paradigm of expectations about the Messiah has been shattered and radically reconstructed. Life is brought forth from death. Victory is snatched from the jaws of defeat. Everything is topsy-turvy...all our expectations met with paradox.

Essentially, what we think we know is not what we know at all, and it may not even be the whole truth. Out of the myriad lessons we can learn from this story, perhaps one of the most salient and important is that God doesn't deal in expectations. God delights in subverting the dominant paradigm of our cultures. It's been said that if you want to hear God laugh, tell him your plans.

Today, our celebration is a perfect example of God laughing. We thought him dead, but he lives! He lives! He lives and none of our lives will ever be the same!
