GIVE TO GOD WHAT IS GOD'S

I sound like a broken record. I feel like a broken record. Do I even look like a broken record – chipped and cracked and repeating the same note over and over? Every year at this time in the fall when my rotation comes up on the bulletin column schedule, I find myself thinking – and writing – about the same thing. For the past few years I've referred to something I witnessed at the prison: a guard handing a recently-widowed woman a small box containing all the belongings her husband had with him when he died. In those past bulletin articles, I reflected on what it would be like to have so little at the end of life...and what is really important when we come to the end of our earthly lives.

This year my thoughts have gone deeper about the fleeting nature of life on earth. As I pray for all who have lost loved ones suddenly, such as in the recent mass shooting, and those who have lost all they own in the wildfires, I'm reflecting on the fragility of this life. I have family members in the San Francisco Bay area. While they are not facing immediate danger from the fires, they see the effects all too closely. They have welcomed into their home a family evacuated from Sonoma County still uncertain if they will have a house to return to.

This time of year like no other, except perhaps the Lenten season, opens my mind and heart to questions of the meaning of this life and the expectations of how I use my time, talents, and treasure. This time of year and reflections on the tragic loss others are experiencing lead me to feelings of remorse, regret, sorrow for my own actions. I look upon the inconvenience and anxiety I've caused others by my lack of order and procrastination. I think of all the thank-you cards or sympathy notes I never got around to sending. I reflect on the amount of time I spend looking for things I've misplaced in my paper piles instead of being able to use that time to help others.

Somewhere in this disorder there is always that "still, small" voice that God is there. Despite my many weaknesses, God has not and will never give up on me – or anyone else. When Jesus says to give to God what belongs to God, I know what that is: everything.

The only response to all God has given to me is love and gratitude....and to give that broken record a little nudge to move to a new track and get the music going again.

PRISON MINISTRY CORNER



This week's "Corner" contains comments made by our brothers at Richland Correctional (RiCI). As regular readers of this bulletin know, we offer something for the Catholic community at RiCI every night of the week as well as several prayer and study opportunities several mornings a week. The men who attend regularly demonstrate tremendous growth in the faith and are the best evangelizers, often without having to say a word. (There are about 2500 inmates at RiCI, housed in five two-story dormitory-type buildings, about 250 bunk beds on each floor).

"I watch for openings other guys give me. A good example is my bunky who is always nasty suddenly saying, 'Did you ever think God sent you to be my bunky for a reason?"

"In the two years I've been here, I've changed. I keep my mouth shut now and look at people differently. Others approach me now and ask questions about faith".

"I've come to realize every fault I see in others, I see in myself." "Inmates - and guards - recognize the Catholic brothers here and ask us to pray for specific petitions. They can tell there is something special about our community."



POWER STRUGGLE

Power struggles occur on every level of society, from the world stage to relationships at work, to our own homes. We struggle for position in the hierarchy of power: Who has power over whom? How do they wield it? What is the source of that power? What is the healthy response?

In this Sunday's Gospel reading the Pharisees engage Jesus in a power struggle over whether Jews should show tribute to Caesar by paying taxes. Jesus' response puts this and every struggle for power into perspective. In harmony with the words of Isaiah and Paul, Jesus teaches us that God is the ultimate source of all power—the power of earthly rulers, the Pharisees, Jesus, the Church, and the power within ourselves.

TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION

What makes the Eucharistic Prayers for Masses with Children different from the others? First, there is the intended assembly, which is described as comprised of mostly children of school age. There are three Eucharistic Prayers for Masses with Children available to us now in the missal. The first one has a very simple form, easily grasped by even a young child. The second has a great deal of participation by the assembly—repeated sung acclamations. The third has a number of variations that can be tricky for a priest to handle if he hasn't prepared carefully.

All of this work does point to a true treasure of our tradition: children are part of the Sunday assembly, precisely because they are baptized members of Christ's body. By contrast, the churches of the Reformation tend to look upon children as members in training, and see worship as an adult activity. Sunday school happens downstairs while the adults celebrate Holy Communion upstairs. In a phrase, that's not Catholic. Children belong to Christ and to the assembly. So, the desire to care for the children in the assembly, to draw them into the prayer, and to adapt our rituals and texts to their needs is deeply Catholic, a true pastoral effort to help draw everyone into the praise of God.

A FAMILY PERSPECTIVE: In today's Gospel the Pharisee was talking about commandments (something we are forced to obey by external pressure) and Jesus was talking about love (an internal exhortation to give our heart, soul and mind to another).
