We live in a very small town. Small towns have some benefits. There is always the question of safety that you don't really have to worry about. Knowing most of the time if something happened you could call upon anyone to help out is absolutely a benefit, but there are some downfalls to living in such a community.

I grew up in the community that I speak of and love it, but one thing that always bothered me (and my mother who lived almost her entire life in a more urban setting) was how sheltered we were.

Sheltered doesn't seem like a bad thing to most parents. It is a good thing because you can keep your children away from those less than savory elements of life for a little bit longer. There is a flip side, however, of never being exposed to anything different than yourself.

Although my community has improved vastly over the years since I was a child, I would by no means call it a "melting pot". On any given day you see people just like me roaming the streets. You see the same types of people in the store or in church. You see "sameness" everywhere you go, and what makes it more difficult is having someone by your side that doesn't see the sameness.

My four year old. My oldest. My pride and joy and my outspoken wonder. He has started to not only notice differences in people but to loudly speak about it.

"Mom, do you SEE that lady?"

Of course my response is that I do see her and she has a very nice shirt on, isn't it lovely?

"Mom, WHY is that guy riding in a scooter?"

And again I say, well your brother likes riding dirt bikes but some people like things with four wheels.

"Mom, Mom, Mom! That lady has a DOG in the store! Do you see her?"

Oh yes, and what a cute dog it is, let's leave that dog alone.

"Mom, Mom,. I am talking to you! I think that is the oldest guy I have ever seen!"

And you are the loudest person he has ever seen...

As you can see I am skirting the issue of differences at the moment and not well. I quickly look for a rug to crawl under whenever one of these little episodes come about, and keep hoping that someday I will have the courage and the words to address it in a more proactive and positive manner.

Recently after one of these loud proclamations in a public place where I just wanted to run and hide, I started thinking about what I should have said instead of what I did say:

PLENARY INDULGENCE AVAILABLE—MARCH FOR LIFE

By special grant of our Holy Father, Pope Francis, Cardinal Mauro Piacenza, the Major Penitentiary of the Catholic Church, has informed the Bishops of the United States that a plenary indulgence can be obtained by the Christian faithful by taking part in the sacred celebrations of the 2018 March for Life (18-19 January 2018). Those that are unable to attend or participate in the March for Life due ot age, sickness, or other grave reason, may also obtain the plenary Indulgence, provided that they have the disposition of detachment from any kind of sin and have the intention of fulfilling, as soon as they are able, the three customary conditions of the Indulgence if they spiritually unite themselves to the ailments of their own life to the merciful God." The three customary conditions for receiving the plenary indulgence include: sacramental Confession, Eucharistic Communion, and prayers for the intentions of Pope Francis.

What I said: Yes, she has lovely hair. Wouldn't it be neat to have hair like that?

What I should have said: "God created mankind in his image; in the image of God he created them; male and female he created them." (Genesis 1: 27)

I grant you these words would have been lost on the little fellow, but upon further reflection how true is it. God created us all in his image, in all different forms, in all different shapes, in all different styles and in all different life circumstances. It doesn't matter what you look like or where you have been, dignity is inherent just because it is not because of what you look like or where you were born or into what life you have been given to encounter. Dignity exists because it simply is there, because each person has been uniquely created by God. God makes it simple, it is the rest of us who equates one life to another and quantifies what is a "good life" compared to a not so excellent one.

This month we pray for the dignity of life to be upheld from the moment of conception to natural death. Let us always pray for those "differences" among us that make us uniquely special but also uniquely God's children. THE LAMB OF GOD

"Behold the Lamb of God!" We hear this phrase every Sunday at Mass, but there's a good chance that many Roman Catholics do not know who in the Bible originally spoke it. The phrase appears only in the Gospel of John, on the lips of John the Baptist, who utters it twice. In today's Gospel reading, John proclaims Jesus as the Lamb of God, and two of John's own disciples then follow Christ. A little bit later Andrew, who heard John and then followed Jesus, brings his brother Simon to be re-named Cephas, or Peter. A careful look at these Bible verses shows us the mission of everyone baptized into the Body of Christ: we must always proclaim our faith in Christ, so that others will follow him. We may not know how the will of God might work through those we bring to Christ; that is not the point. The point is that our ongoing mission as a church is to bring others to Christ, the Lamb of God, who takes away the sin of the world.

TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION

"Ordinary Time" began for us this week. On the old calendar, the feast of the Presentation, still more than two weeks away, was the last day of the Christmas season. Sadly, Bethlehem is hardly a place of peace on earth these days. The ancient Christian community has been largely uprooted by political strife. The Church of the Nativity stands (barely) in remarkable disrepair and disorder in Manger Square. The roof is crumbling, the major doorways are blocked, the wiring is faulty, and the worship life is disrupted by quarrels among Eastern Christians.

The church was founded by the Emperor Constantine in 325, destroyed in a Samaritan revolt in 539, and rebuilt by the Emperor Justinian. When the area came under Muslim control in 638, the holiness of the church was respected, and in return Christians allowed Muslims to pray in the south aisle, a right still upheld. Earlier in that century, invading Persians were ordered to destroy all churches, but when they saw the magi carved over the doorway of the Church of the Nativity, they spared it out of respect for their ancestors who bore gold, frankincense, and myrrh to the same city. The Crusaders restored and redecorated the church by the twelfth century, and it is their plan that survives. Down a few stone steps is a stone grotto with a silver star marking the place of Christ's birth: when the star was stolen in 1847 it triggered an international crisis that exploded into the Crimean War.

Since 1852, the church has been shared by the Roman Catholic, Greek Orthodox, and Armenian Churches. The Greeks are in charge of the grotto, but don't enjoy the best of friendships with the Armenians. Catholics have the care of the Chapel of the Manger, and avoid the squabbles by a separate entrance to the Franciscan monastery church of St. Catherine. Pray for peace in Bethlehem!
