St. Peter's has a long history of offering Catholic education to countless generations of students. From our earliest days the transmission of the Faith through our schools has been central to our parish mission. And so it continues to today.

I would like to express my deep appreciation to all in our parish who sacrifice for our schools – parishioners, parents, teachers, staff, and the efforts of our young people. Parishioner and parent volunteers, for example, offer countless hours to the athletic, academic, extracurricular activities and service of our school. Thank you from all who benefit from your service!

In 2017, it was reported by our diocese that we have 58 Catholic elementary schools and 13 Catholic high schools. We serve more than 17,000 students and rank 30th in the nation in the number of Catholic students. In addition, 99% of these students graduate from high school and 95% pursue higher education. Although the student population in Catholic schools across the nation has had a minor decline, the Diocese of Toledo enrollment remains strong.

As I have said many times, our parish school system was founded to continue to teach the Faith. Academic excellence, consistent discipline, and Christian values that permeate our curriculum must remain our focus. Our school operates on a lean budget, and wage increases to all staff have been very modest. So, in many ways, the continuance of our parish school system depends on the continued sacrifice and support of our entire parish. I ask our families who have their children enrolled in our system and religious education classes to make Sunday worship a priority.

Catholic schools offer us a reason to hope! The smiles, activity, achievements, and service of our students continue to impact individuals and the community daily! The Spirit is alive in our buildings! And so I invite YOU, your friends and neighbors – and parishioners – to visit our school

THE OBEDIENCE OF ABRAHAM AND JESUS

God tested Abraham by asking not for an ordinary sacrifice, which would have been a partial burning with the meat divided between God and the people and eaten by those who sacrificed, but for a holocaust, a total burning of the sacrificial animal. This type of sacrifice consecrated the entire offering to God alone. This is what God was asking of Abraham in offering his only son, Isaac. When Abraham demonstrated his obedience, that was enough. This story from today's scriptures foretells the completion of the blood sacrifices of the old covenant in the new covenant: the blood of God's own Son, offered to us on the cross and in the Eucharist. Abraham's obedience foreshadows the obedience of Jesus to God's promise of salvation. The obedience of Abraham is rewarded in the birth to him, through Isaac, of many nations. The obedience of Jesus is rewarded in the salvation of all people for all time.

TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION

The second Sunday of Lent every year recalls the Transfiguration of the Lord. Since the fourth century, Mount Tabor has been the focus of devotion to this event. As mountains go, it is not particularly lofty, rising about fifteen hundred feet, within view of the Sea of Galilee and very close to Nazareth. Scripture doesn't identify the mountain, but in the year 348 Saint Cyril of Jerusalem said he preferred Mount Tabor to Mount Hermon as the site of the Transfiguration, and his opinion won. It has long been a strategic military site, and ancient fortresses are visible on the heights. Over the centuries, churches and fortified monasteries rose on the mountaintop, only to be destroyed by various invaders. Six hundred years ago, local Christians started to decorate the ruins with flags and banners on the Feast of the Transfiguration. In 1631, the Sultan granted permission to the Franciscans to live on Mount Tabor, and they have been there ever since, discovering the ruins of an old Crusader church and constructing the present church on the site in 1924.
