My kids are still little, only 5, 3 and 2, and the beauty of little kids is that there is very little that can harm them. Because of their tender ages and need for dependence on others, I am constantly around them or they are in the care of another adult that I trust. It is very easy at this point to control what they see or are exposed to, which makes it a nice place to be as a parent.

But even with that being true, bad things have been creeping in slowly but pointedly. It could be a phrase here or there that I don't want to hear coming out of their tiny mouths or the way they treat others that go against everything that we have taught them. It is there and it is becoming more rampant. They are exposed to other children at our child care provider so that could be the source. It could be from television and those seemingly undetected innuendos that children's television feels prompted to throw in there sometimes. It could be from hearing their older siblings or relatives or the older kids on the playground.

It really could be from anywhere, but I am here to say this mama is not amused.

I guess in the back of my mind I always pictured my kids would be a little bit different. I pictured them more as the Beaver Cleaver sort whose worst offense was subscribing to a "record of the month" club and accruing a \$20 bill. I never imagined that at the age of three I would be fighting against language and phrases that in my estimation should not be coming out of a toddler's mouth, but here is where we are.

So what is the solution for this desperate mother? Wrapping them in a bubble seems like a good idea but is not wholly realistic. It starts with what we teach them at home, and the good people who work as catechists around them.

I know I can only do so much alone, and I have to rely on other people who hold the same morals and faith values as I do to help drive the point home of how we would like our children to conduct themselves. Catholic Schools do a fantastic job of doing this by instilling those morals and values every day in their faithfilled classrooms. For some families for a variety of reasons Catholic Schools are not an option, which is why we also offer weekly Parish School of Religion courses to bring to and reinforce with the children of our parish their faith education that has been started in their homes.

In a world where morals are being attacked daily and in different ways, and quite frankly at a heightened pace, it is reassuring to me that I have these advocates around me that will help me reinforce the faith with my children especially when they may not believe what I am saying or have chosen to "tune me out" because I am cramping their style. It says in Proverbs, "Train the young in the way they should go; even when old, they will not swerve from it." That is, in a nutshell, the goal of religious education through Catholic Schools and PSR programs, and at Saint Peter's we are very proud to provide it. PRISON MINISTRY CORNER

All we do in prison ministry is inspired and challenged by Scripture and Church teachings. We embrace Matthew 25:31-46 - "...I was in prison and you visited me..." - through our ministering to our brothers at Richland Correctional and Correctional. But where are we with the issue of capital punishment and with those who are facing execution? At the heart of Catholic teaching on the death penalty is the belief that "Human life is sacred because from its beginning it involves the creative action of God and it remains for ever in a special relationship with the Creator, who is its sole end..." (Catechism of the Catholic Church 2258) Pope Francis shared these words in an Address before the International Commission Against the Death Penalty: "Nowadays the death penalty is inadmissible, no matter how serious the crime committed. It is an offense against the inviolability of life and the dignity of the human person, which contradicts God's plan for man and society, and his merciful justice, and impedes the penalty from fulfilling any just objective. It does not render justice to the victims, but rather fosters vengeance...." Let us pray for insight and courage to defend life. See next week's bulletin for updates on Candlelight Prayer Vigils.

175TH ANNIVERSARY NOTES

Before there was a wild, wild west, there was Northeastern Ohio! Father Maurice Howard was one of several priests who labored as missionaries in Northeast Ohio long before any but a few Catholic parishes were established here. When he was not visiting mission stations from as far east as the Ohio/ Pennsylvania border to as far west as Bucyrus, Father Howard lived at Doylestown southwest of Akron. In a sense, Father Howard could be said to have been the first Pastor at Mansfield after he was asked in early autumn of 1844 by Cincinnati Bishop John Baptist Purcell to attend the people of Mansfield regularly. Often impassable roads, long distances between mission stations and inclement weather made for frequent challenges to Father Howard's ministry. Nature, however, was not Father Howard's only challenge. When Bishop Purcell asked Father Howard to begin ministering to the people of Mansfield and Richland County, he warned Howard that a great many people hereabouts were "habitual drunkards." Father Howard was later pleased to be able to report that after two visits, the people of the Mansfield area were indeed reformed and that many previously "incorrigible" drunkards had taken the pledge to abstain from alcohol. Whether they were motivated by genuine penitence or by Father Howard's threat that no priest would ever again visit the area unless they became teetotalers is not exactly clear!

O LORD, BE MY HELP

Today we encounter readings that draw us into the mystery of suffering and death. In the past few years we have witnessed the devastation of life and property through earthquakes and hurricanes. So many lifted their lament to God, simply asking, "Why?" This is an honest expression of anger toward a God who we believe is the giver of life. When we lose a loved one, we can wonder why the presence of Christ is not enough to make that person rise, even from death, as did the little girl in today's Gospel passage. Again we raise our voices and ask, "Why?" At moments such as these, let us make the prayer of the psalmist our own: "Hear, O LORD, and have pity on me; O LORD, be my helper." TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION

As Independence Day draws near, we think of the men and women of the military who serve with courage and competence, some far from home. How does the Church accompany them? In 1939, Pope Pius XII created an independent jurisdiction of the Catholic Church called the "Military Vicariate." In 1985 Pope John Paul II created the "Archdiocese for Military Services, USA." Spanning the globe and serving nearly one and a half million Roman Catholics, more than one thousand priests minister in hospitals, on military bases of all the armed forces, on ships at sea, and on the battlefield. The AMS does not ordain priests, but accepts priests on loan from religious orders and dioceses.

In 1824 a Jesuit priest named Adam Marshall enlisted in the Navy and died at sea in 1825. He was assigned as a "schoolmaster," but he sought out and ministered to Catholic sailors. Twenty years later, President Polk was worried that the war with Mexico was seen as anti-Catholic, so he recruited two Jesuit priests to serve in the army as chaplains. At the time of the Civil War, only about ten percent of Americans were Catholic. Military policies forced Catholic soldiers to attend Protestant services. The Church protested this rule, and many priests volunteered to become chaplains. Their witness and the courage of the "Nuns of the Battlefield" (several orders of sisters who assisted Civil War victims) helped temper prejudice against Catholics and pave the way for the life and ministry of this vigorous and unique archdiocese.
