At our recent prison retreat we ended the afternoon by inviting the men to sit in a large circle; the only sound in the room was the Gregorian chant playing on the CD recorder. The prison ministry team members went around the circle laying hands and saying a prayer over each man. Some touched lightly on the shoulders, others made a Sign of the Cross on foreheads, and most laid their hands firmly on each man's head. In an environment where physical touch is understandably not frequent, this experience was powerful. Some of the men said afterward this was the first time in their life that anyone had touched them so lovingly and fervently.

Benedictine monk Fr. Demetrius Dumm, who taught New Testament studies at St. Vincent Seminary in Latrobe, PA, for nearly 50 years until his death a few years ago, shared this reflection:

"Jesus took the bread, and as he was about to break it for his disciples, he said something that they had never heard before. They must have lifted their heads and turned toward him in surprise. For he told them that this was not just bread being broken for them; it was his own body. And when he prepared to pass the cup of wine to them to be consumed, he said this was his blood, which would soon be poured out for them."

In those words (and in the account in the Gospel of John of Jesus washing the disciples' feet), Jesus Christ, our Lord and Master, teaches us the meaning of his life...and the meaning of our lives as His followers: the way to salvation and ultimate freedom and joy is through total self-giving....through unselfish love.

The words of another spiritual writer capture this thought as well. Mother Maria Skobtsova, an Orthodox nun who perished at Ravensbruck concentration camp just days before liberation, leaves us these challenging words:

"The Eucharist...is the Gospel in action. It is the eternally existing and eternally accomplished sacrifice of Christ and of Christlike human beings for the sins of the world. Is it not strange that the path to communion with the divine is so closely bound up with our communion with each other? It assumes consent to the exclamation: 'Let us love one another, that with one mind we may confess Father, Son, and Holy Spirit: the Trinity, one in essence and undivided."

Spending time before the Blessed Sacrament in adoration, receiving Holy Communion regularly and with an open and clean heart, serving others especially the most vulnerable among us, living in gratitude for all God has given us, touching the hearts of others through kind acts....May we experience the loving touch of Jesus and extend that touch to one another.

ST. PETER'S PARISH WAS OFFICIALLY ESTABLISHED OR FOUNDED IN 1844.

For many years before that, the spiritual needs of the Catholics of Mansfield were met by travelling priests assigned by the Bishop of Cincinnati. Those travelling priests, (possibly including St. John Nepomucene Neumann C.Ss.R. who became the 4th Bishop of Philadelphia and was canonized by Blessed Pope Paul VI in 1977), were the stuff of legend as they wandered the ever-expanding wilderness of the "West." Many of them went on to become the bishops and leaders of the young and hungry Church in the United States in the early part of the 19th century.

We do not know the precise date of our founding, but we do know that the year was 1844 and that the time of year was autumn. Bishop Purcell, in discussions with his priests, had originally settled on naming the new parish in Mansfield for the Holy Trinity. It is not clear how the Bishop's mind was changed so that we became St. Peter's Parish instead Holy Trinity Parish.

So it's been nearly 175 years since our Parish was founded and we need to begin planning for the celebration of that anniversary. With that in mind, we will be forming a committee to plan the celebrations that will take place between May and October of 2019. Volunteers are needed to help with the many plans and projects of such a committee. PRECIOUS BLOOD

On this solemnity we focus our attention on the Body and Blood of Christ. We listen to the story of the renewal of the old covenant, which Moses sealed by splashing the blood of animals on the altar of sacrifice, as well as on the people. Jesus, whose blood is the blood of the new covenant, shed that precious blood on the cross, saving us from sin and promising us everlasting life. Blood is the life source that courses through our bodies. The precious blood of Christ is the life source for our spirits. Today may we, like the psalmist, offer a sacrifice of thanksgiving to the Lord, whose Body and Blood strengthen us to bring the Good News to everyone we meet.

TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION

The origins of today's solemnity lie in thirteenth-century Belgium. In those days, people seldom received Holy Communion, and never from the chalice. A nun in a troubled convent, Juliana of Liège, devoted her life to stirring up love for the Eucharist, lobbying for a feast day to honor the Blessed Sacrament with Masses and processions.

Juliana may have been inspired by the Ascension Day processions in nearby Bruges. Crusaders brought a treasure home to Bruges from Constantinople in 1204: a religuary said to contain a cloth from Joseph of Arimathea with which he had helped prepare the body of Jesus for burial. The stain on the cloth was said to be the holy blood itself, and so the people of Bruges built a great basilica to house the relic. Bruges became a great center of pilgrimage because of this treasure, and the procession of the Holy Blood is still one of the greatest festivals in Belgium today. The bishop carries the relic through the narrow streets, and the people wear medieval costumes and act out scenes from the Bible.
