

The other night I was at a meeting where it was a mix of people from Boomers to Generation Y & Z. During the meeting, a discussion took place regarding an event the younger crowd had planned that was a very successful. A Boomer commented that they felt the location was a bad choice, because people not attending the event may have taken things out of context. (The event had taken place inside part of a public venue.)

The moderator stepped in and talked about how this was a great opportunity to show how organizations need to do a better job of bridging the gap between their members. The long-time members understood that the younger members are going to do things differently than they had done things. Boomers most likely did things much differently than their parents of the Greatest Generation did. (I've read my history on the 60's – I've heard the stories from our alumni.)

What may be off-putting to one generation is perfectly acceptable to another. The ability to text a silent auction bid at dinner during our Fall Gala is great example, right here at St. Peter's.

I think that in many ways we need to work harder at bridging the gap in our parish. I know I was away from Mansfield for almost 20 years, but in that time many parish organizations and events ceased to exist (including events that generated thousands of dollars in annual revenue for the parish.) Now there is not just one reason why they went away, I am sure there are many.

However, I know I have fought uphill battles in my three years trying to break the mold of, "that's the way we've always done it," or "here is why you/we can't do that."

Right now, we have a wonderful opportunity at St. Peter's. There is a group of young families, many parents of young children in our school, who have rallied together to start working not only to better their school community but also to try to increase their commitments to their faith as well. In some cases, these are relatively new families to Mansfield and are bringing with them the spirit of vibrancy from their old parishes. Others are lifelong members of St. Peter's who for one reason or another have lost a connection with their parish community and have pledged to make a new commitment of faith.

So, I hope if you see a family with young kids, that you will please make them feel welcome in our parish – especially during this renovation process. Also, please pray for us on staff and the leadership councils to also be open and willing to their ideas to do things differently – if it still falls within the doctrines and rules of the church.

Because research shows when members of Generation Y & Z feel like valued members of an organization, and they feel like they are making an impact, they will support it with their treasures.

A faith community is only as strong as its members, and we all would love to see more baptisms and weddings than funerals each year, thereby working to build a bigger Kingdom of God right here in our little corner of the earth.

#### 175<sup>TH</sup> ANNIVERSARY NOTES

If you want to know about the faith and strength of will it took to forge a Catholic presence in our area 175 years ago, it is helpful to look at the character of the men and women of faith who labored in this vineyard. As the second Bishop of all of Ohio, John Baptist Purcell certainly had his hands full.

When he was appointed Bishop in 1833, Purcell arrived in Cincinnati to find only one Catholic church in a city of 30,000 people. Anti-Catholic sentiment was soon widespread as a wave of German and Irish immigrants (the largest part of whom were very Catholic) inundated Ohio and Cincinnati in particular. Bishop Purcell had to become the staunch defender of his flock.

To defend and grow his flock, Bishop Purcell built churches, a seminary and a cathedral. He travelled frequently over his statewide diocese and often visited little towns like Mansfield, where the luxury of a resident pastor did not exist. He travelled to Europe many times, raising money to fund his dynamic vision for Catholicism in Ohio. While in Europe, he visited seminaries to recruit newly ordained priests to come to his diocese. Many young priests followed him across the ocean and became hard and fast pillars of the Church for years to come.

One anecdote may give you a better picture of the man. A wealthy and prominent Cincinnatian named Nicholas Longworth built an observatory on the top of Mount Ida in central Cincinnati and renamed the hill Mount Adams, in honor of President John Quincy Adams, who came to Cincinnati in November of 1842 to lay the cornerstone. On the day of the dedication with all of Cincinnati's notables, including Bishop Purcell assembled, Adams delivered a typically long and windy oration. One or two lines stood out, for Bishop Purcell at least. Adams said, "This observatory is to be a beacon of true science that should never be obscured by the dark shadows of superstition and intolerance symbolized by the Popish Cross..."

Bishop Purcell's response to former President Adams' speech came in two parts. He first built *Immaculata Church* on the highest point in Mt. Adams in 1859. Apocryphal anecdotes say that Purcell decided to build the church after surviving a storm at sea during which he promised God that he would do so. While both stories have the ring of truth, anyone who is familiar with Cincinnati can tell you that Immaculata Church with its very tall steeple surmounted by a cross is prominent and visible as you drive in to Cincinnati from Northern Kentucky. You can't miss it.

Bishop Purcell's second, and more telling response, was to erect the Monastery of the Holy Cross for the Passionist Fathers next to the site of the observatory. On the day of the monastery's dedication in 1873, then-Archbishop Purcell preached an eloquent homily on the "Triumph of the Cross." He built a monastery dedicated under the name of the Holy Cross and preached on the "Triumph of the Cross" on the very spot where John Quincy Adams made his plea for the banishment of the, "... Popish Cross!"

You cannot say that John Baptist Purcell, the Bishop who ordered the founding of our very own parish, lacked wit, perspicacity or intestinal fortitude! He was a real "type" of the sort of dedicated missionaries who built the Church in northeastern Ohio.

#### **REST IN THE LORD**

For several weeks we have listened to readings that have recounted just how arduous the work of prophets and disciples can be. In today's Gospel, the Lord Jesus listens to the reports of those he had sent out "two by two" to minister to the people. After the apostles reported what they had done, Jesus, recognizing their fatigue, says, "Come away by yourselves to a deserted place and rest awhile" (Mark 6:31). Perhaps this is what the Lord is telling his disciples in the year 2018 as well. We need to pause on our journey of discipleship and simply rest in the Lord. Sunday Mass provides many opportunities for quiet times, particularly during the periods of silence following the readings. Why not take the time today to allow the saving word of the Lord to penetrate your heart during those silent times? Ask the Lord to renew you in body, mind, and spirit for the arduous work of discipleship.

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#### TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION

The American Revolution cleared the way for freedom of religion in the former colonies, since the colonies had always been a more religiously tolerant place than the old country. Even so, colonial laws restricted the practice of the Catholic faith, and just as in England, Americans who desired to be priests or nuns had to go to the Netherlands or France. As political storm clouds gathered in France, an American woman, Mother Bernardina Matthews, the prioress of the Hoogstraeten Carmel in Holland, made a brave move. With two other American nuns, her nieces, and a Dutch sister, she came to Port Tobacco, Maryland, in 1790. Within twenty years the community had grown to twenty, although by 1823 their farm failed and they had to move to Baltimore and open a school. The Carmelite order requires contemplation and cloister, so in time the school was closed. The Port Tobacco land had long since been sold, but in 1976 a community of nuns was able to return thanks to loyal neighbors who had worked for forty years for their restoration. Today, our original American convent is fully alive in prayer, hard work, and strong community.
