Hello everyone!

In this weekend's Gospel reading, we continue through chapter six of St. John's gospel, also known as the "Bread of Life discourse." In this chapter, Jesus reveals to his disciples quite clearly and directly that he is the Bread of Life that came down from heaven and that he intends to give them his flesh to eat and his blood to drink. In a word, he openly reveals to them what he will later do at the Last Supper- give to the entire Church the gift of his flesh and blood in the Eucharist.

There is truly much beauty, depth, and significance to unpack when reading the bread of life discourse. When Jesus says in today's Gospel, "No one can come to me unless the Father who sent me draw him, and I will raise him on the last day," I cannot help but think of the great solemnity that the Catholic Church will celebrate across the world this Wednesday: the Assumption of the Blessed Virgin Mary. On this feast day, we will celebrate Mary being taken up in body and soul to heaven at the end of her earthly life. This is indeed the reward Mary received for remaining faithful to Christ every moment of her life. Having been conceived without Original Sin, and never having committed a sin throughout her life, Mary goes before us into the kingdom of heaven and shows us the reward that awaits whoever departs this life in the state of grace.

However, we need not worry that we have not been able to follow Christ perfectly like Mary because, out of love for us, Christ gave to us the great gift of the sacraments to heal and perfect us. In the Sacrament of Reconciliation, our sins are forgiven and our relationship with Christ is restored. In the Eucharist, we strengthened to avoid sin, to do what is pleasing to the Lord, and we are given a tremendous opportunity to be united to Christ in the most direct way possible - by eating his flesh and drinking his blood. In this way, he gives himself to us completely in his self-sacrificial and unconditional love for us so that we might in turn love him and others in the same way.

Just as Mary loved Christ with all her being and in every moment of her earthly life, may we too strive to love him in the same way, always seeking to draw closer to him and to be raised on the last day to join Mary and all the saints in the Kingdom of Heaven. May the Eucharist be our greatest treasure in this life and may we at all times make this prayer by St. Alphonsus Liguori our own:

"Saints have but a single eye, with which they keep in view, in all that they do, the sole pleasure of God; and with David they say: 'What have I in Heaven, and besides Thee what do I desire upon earth?' (Ps. 73:25). What do I wish, O my God, in this world or in the next, save Thee alone? Thou art my riches, Thou art the only Lord of my heart. Let the rich enjoy their riches, let the kings enjoy their kingdoms. Thou, O Christ, art my treasure and my kingdom!"

PRISON MINISTRY CORNER



Bishop Daniel Thomas shares these thoughts: "With his revision of No.2267 of the Catechism of the Catholic Church (CCC) Pope Francis has reaffirmed that which he has previously taught, "Today capital punishment is unacceptable, however serious the condemned's crime may have been. The death penalty regardless of the means of execution entails cruel, inhumane and degrading treatment." Pope Francis asked for the revision regarding the death penalty to affirm that "no matter how serious the crime that has been committed, the death penalty is inadmissible because it is an attack on the inviolability and dignity of the person." This revision is not so much, as has been reported, a change in Church teaching, as it is a natural development in her teaching held over centuries regarding the dignity and sanctity of all human life from conception until natural death. This development of doctrine highlights the fact that in our present age, heinous criminals can in fact be prevented from being a threat to society and to citizens, making the death penalty in effect unnecessary. I welcome this revision of Pope Francis to the Catechism, which confirms in a formal way what I, together with many of my brother bishops, have already preached, advocated and taught against the death penalty."

175TH ANNIVERSARY NOTES

Learning what we can about the history of our Parish, especially in short weekly installments, is going to take us quite a while. The problem with history is that if you focus on one event or place, you can lose sight of the context. It's helpful and important to get a view of the wider history as we consider our heritage and the wonderful story of our family of faith.

One way to achieve that wider understanding is to take a moment to learn about what was going on across the globe in those days. For the sake of brevity, we will focus on 1843; on 1844, the year of our founding; and on 1845. In the future we may consider other world events, but for now let's limit ourselves to this three year span of history. A list of the events seems to be the best format. If you don't know about an event or want to learn more about it, the internet or the Public Library are excellent resources.

In 1843 John Tyler was tenth President of the United States of America after succeeding the short-lived William Henry Harrison. Queen Victoria had been on the throne of Great Britain for six years. Wilson Shannon was the Governor of Ohio. There were 26 states in the United States. Tensions in the U.S. about slavery were beginning to mount. In the same year, Charles Dickens published *Martin Chuzzlewit* and *A Christmas Carol*. Speaking of Christmas, 1843 saw the first use of Christmas cards. The Law School of St. Louis University became the first college of law west of the Mississippi, and the first major wagon train bound for the northwest set out on the Oregon Trail.

In 1844, James Knox Polk became the eleventh President of the United States, defeating Henry Clay. St. Bernadette Soubirous and famed organist/composer Charles-Marie Widor were born in France and Jesuit priest/poet Gerard Manley Hopkins was born in England. In the same year the University of Notre Dame and the Columbus-Xenia Railroad, the first railway planned in Ohio, both received their charters. Also in 1844 Samuel F.B. Morse sent his very first electrical telegram with the words, "What hath God wrought," and Charles Goodyear patented his rubber vulcanization process. Also in 1844, the United States negotiated the first formal treaty between the U.S. and China.

In 1845, the United States annexed Texas and both Florida and Texas became states. The rubber band was patented in England, the United States Naval Academy opened and Edgar Allan Poe published his famous poem *The Raven*. Also in that year, Blessed John Henry Cardinal Newman became a Catholic, former President Andrew Jackson died and, in Ireland, the blight that caused the Great Potato Famine began, inaugurating the massive migration of Irish immigrants to the United States. You may recall from earlier columns that the largely Catholic Irish were not warmly received in the U.S.

More about our founding and our history will follow in future bulletins.

STRENGTHENED BY THE BREAD OF LIFE

Today we resume the "Bread of Life" discourse from John's Gospel that began two weeks ago. He makes reference to the Jews' ancestors who ate manna in the desert. These days we would think primarily of Israel wandering in the desert, but faithful Jews would also have known the story of Elijah that we hear today. Strengthened by food and drink in the desert, the angel of the Lord sends him on his forty-day and forty-night journey (the biblical number for a preparation time). Like the food given to Elijah in the desert, Jesus tells his listeners that he is bread for the life of the world. It is very important that we not stop listening to Jesus after his promise of eternal life--a marvelous promise, but this "reward" is not the only reason we feast on the Bread of Life. We also come to the table to be made strong for the journey of mission, that the whole world might have life in the fullness of Christ. We are compelled, if we have eaten of the bread of life, to go forth in service to all.

TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION

Careful readers of the "Treasures" will have noticed that the two columns about the oldest monastic communities in the United States refer to the colonial states. The Louisiana Purchase gained a great treasure for our nation, the Ursuline monastery of New Orleans. Among the greatest pioneers of that city were nuns who came from France on a perilous voyage in 1727, pestered by pirates and tossed by fearsome storms. These were genteel, well-educated Ursulines, yet their first task was to roll up their sleeves and open a hospital to care for the pestilence-ridden colony. Next, they opened a school for girls and launched a plan to educate the women being shipped over from France to marry settlers. In this way, they had enormous influence in molding patterns of family and domestic life.

At Christmas time in 1814, the threat of a British assault on the city was growing. On the terrifying night of January 7, 1815, the women of New Orleans gathered in the monastery chapel to pray that the city be spared from destruction in battle. The mother superior made a vow to have a Mass of Thanksgiving on that date every year should the Americans win. That night, Our Lady of Prompt Succor, to whom the nuns had great devotion, became the protector and patron of this great city. The convent in the French Quarter is the oldest standing building in the Mississippi valley, and the only surviving building of the French colonial period. The nuns relocated in 1824, but their old monastery is preserved as a museum and archives for the Archdiocese of New Orleans. The school the nuns began, Ursuline Academy, is the oldest continuously operating Catholic school, and school for women, in the United States.

A FAMILY PERSPECTIVE



"Stop murmuring," Jesus told the disciples in today's Gospel. Complaining is a dead-end and constant complaining is nagging. We might feel better but others feel bitter.
