This year is an anniversary year in our history as we celebrate 150 years of St. Peter's School system. Our school system was founded on the faith and the sacrifice of generations of parents, religious sisters, priests, and many generous donors – including our alumni(ae). - 5. Absences from school should be kept to a minimum. Classroom instruction time, once lost, can never be repeated. A healthy lifestyle is key to a happy lifestyle.
- 6. Parents shall never make false excuses for their children's absences.
- 7. Courtesies such as "Please" and "Thank You" are golden words; they are frequently overlooked and under used.
- 8. Encourage your son or daughter to do their homework and get it in on time. This provides time for recreation, including athletics.
- 9. Administration, teachers and parents shall work together for the ultimate good of their child(ren). Education is a "partnership."
- 10. Refrain from using social media for gossip, criticizing school leadership, teachers, or other families.

As St. Augustine reminds us, "In essentials, unanimity; in matters of debate, discussion; but in all things, charity."

175TH ANNIVERSARY NOTES

<u>"This day will be a day of remembrance for you, which your future generations will celebrate with pilgrimage to the LORD; you will celebrate it as a statute forever."</u> (Exodus 12:14)

"In the future, these are to be a sign among you. When your children ask you, 'What do these stones mean to you?' you shall answer them, 'The waters of the Jordan ceased to flow before the ark of the covenant of the LORD when it crossed the Jordan.' Thus these stones are to serve as a perpetual memorial to the Israelites." (Joshua 4: 6 – 7)

"Then he took the bread, said the blessing, broke it, and gave it to them, saying, 'This is my body, which will be given for you; do this in memory of me.'" (Luke 22:19)

In the past seven years our parish has celebrated a number of anniversaries: the 100th Anniversaries of the Laying of the Cornerstone, the First Mass, and the Consecration of our Church; the 140th Anniversary of the service of the Sisters of St. Francis of Mary Immaculate from Joliet, Illinois; the 150th Anniversary of the founding of St. Peter's School (which we observe this year); and the 175th Anniversary of the Founding of our parish next year. We have had and still have a lot to celebrate!

You may ask why do we celebrate so much? Our calendar is full of the feasts of saints. We remember birthdays and wedding anniversaries and even occasionally the anniversary of the passing of someone dear to us. So why do we celebrate these other things?

The answer to the question is simple, Memory and the action of calling to mind the stories of faith and the ministry and mission of Jesus are an essential part of our Catholic identity. The action of *Eucharist* (from the Greek – literally to give thanks) necessarily presupposes remembering. In the Mass, we first hear the stories of our faith history and then we give thanks in the Eucharist, which becomes for us both participation in the grace of salvation in Christ and a foretaste of the heavenly banquet that is to come.

So memory is a cornerstone of our faith and our practice of the faith. "We remember," as the song says, that we have been loved, both by God (in the Son particularly) and, in a broader sense, by those who came before us...those who loved us without knowing us and those to whom we are connected in the Communion of the Saints. Thus, our celebration of these anniversaries is a memorial of what our ancestors did, but it is also keeping alive their deeds for future generations and it is a genuine connection to all those who have gone before us, "... marked with the sign of faith..." And that's why these celebrations are important!
