Among the many contradictions we find in the Scriptures, one of the best examples of Jesus as an iconoclast and breaker of rules and traditions is found in this weekend's readings. In the first reading from Deuteronomy, Moses admonishes the people of Israel to hear, to learn and to live by the statutes and decrees which God has given them. He warns them that they should neither add to the laws nor subtract from them in any way. Moses calls upon the people to observe the law carefully and to follow it closely. They will, he says, thereby give testimony to the greatness of God and to the greatness and wisdom of the nation of Israel as they adhere to the law.

Of course, we know that for many of the Israelites, following the law nearly became a religion in itself. As Mark notes in the Gospel reading, "...For the Pharisees and, in fact, all Jews, do not eat without carefully washing their hands, keeping the tradition of the elders. And on coming from the marketplace they do not eat without purifying themselves. And there are many other things that they have traditionally observed, the purification of cups and jugs and kettles and beds." (Mark 7: 3, 4)

I have always considered it one of the great hypocrisies in the Passion Narrative that the Priests and members of the Sanhedrin would not enter the Praetorium when Jesus was to be judged by Pilate for fear of being made ritually impure just before the Passover and the Sabbath. In other words, it was important enough to have Jesus killed but not important enough that they would make themselves unclean to see their dirty work done for themselves.

In today's Gospel, Jesus takes the Pharisees and the scribes to task for their hypocrisy in clinging to legalistic ways of religion. "Well did Isaiah prophesy," he says, "about you hypocrites." (Mark 7). Jesus makes plain that to worship God only with one's lips and without one's heart is no worship at all. He goes further to say that disregarding the meaning of God's commandments and clinging to human tradition does not make one pure.

The things that defile us are the things we bring out of ourselves: "...evil thoughts, unchastity, theft, murder, adultery, greed, malice, deceit, licentiousness, envy, blasphemy, arrogance, folly. All these evils come from within and they defile." (Mark 7) To those we might add things like anger, impatience, hatred, unforgiveness, lack of compassion, mercilessness, and the love of power.

Put in such a way, this passage spotlights our own failings and impurity. Who among us hasn't been guilty of some of these sins? We realize, then, that the law is meant to point out the myriad ways in which we all fall short. We're all in this boat together and it seems to me that we have to begin to realize that we're all in need of God's mercy and forgiveness. We're all in need of God's cleansing and healing touch. Certainly the times in which we live point that out in a lot of different ways. As a people of faith, let us turn away from mindless adherence to rules and regulations. Let us instead beseech God's compassionate mercy and realize that we all owe the God of the universe the real worship of our whole hearts. Let us realize that it is not enough to follow rules if our hearts aren't in it. What conversion and victory awaits us if we can accept this!



PRISON MINISTRY CORNER

Our seminarian brother, Michael Bialorucki, shared these thoughts as he reflected on his experiences at St. Peter's this summer:

"I came into Mansfield telling Fr. Hite I wanted to be involved with prison ministry because the idea of doing prison ministry terrified me; yet I know it is one of the things Jesus expressly commands us to do in Matthew 25. As I walked in for the Mass the first time I visited, I was pretty terrified. I had grown up with Hollywood telling me what it was like inside the prison and who prisoners are. Needless to say, as I found out quickly, Hollywood missed the mark on this one, too. I was blown away with the welcome and hospitality I received at my first visit to RiCI and, I am not too proud to say, I was moved to tears as I prayed with you all in the first Mass, hearing and seeing the dedication and energy you brought to the active engagement of the Holy Eucharist. As Fr. Weibl says, it must take being in prison to truly understand how to worship because the community does it so well."



175TH ANNIVERSARY NOTES

We continue our look into the lives of the early Pastors of St. Peter's Parish. We last read about Father Gallagher, who was our first resident Pastor. This week we will read a bit about the lives

of our second and third resident Pastors, Father James P. Molony and Father Jacob Kuhn.

Not much is known about Father James Molony. He was born in Ireland on June 19, 1830 and was ordained to the priesthood on June 26, 1859. He was appointed Pastor of St. Peter's in Mansfield in September 1865, three and a half years after the departure of Father Gallagher. During his very brief



tenure here, Father Molony purchased the land on which the Elementary School now stands. He built a rectory on that newly purchased property. As noted, Father Molony's tenure here was very brief. He left Mansfield for a new assignment in November of 1865 after serving barely three months here. Father Molony's next assignment was as Pastor of St. Malachy Parish in Cleveland, where he remained until his death on June 15, 1903.

Following immediately after Father Molony's departure, our third resident Pastor arrived. Father Jacob A. Kuhn was born near Saar-Brücken in Rhenish Prussia in Germany on April 20, 1836. After immigrating to the United States, he studied at a seminary in Davenport, lowa, and at St. Mary's Seminary in Cleveland. Father Kuhn was ordained to the priesthood for service in the Diocese of Cleveland on June 28, 1863. He was assigned to Mansfield St. Peter's in November of 1865. During his time in Mansfield he established St. Peter's School in 1868. A year later, in September of 1869, he was transferred from St. Peter's. Father Kuhn also served as Pastor at Newburg (which had many mission stations), Niles and its missions, Cleveland St.



Peter's, Norwalk St. Peter's, Cleveland Holy Family (later to become St. Edward's), and, finally, Massillon St. Mary's, where he served from April of 1879 until his death on November 30, 1898.

ANOINTING OF THE SICK MASS



THE HIGHEST LAW

From time to time, newspapers and magazines will offer, as an item of "filler," various laws that are still on the books but seem silly to us in our day and age. In one California city, it is illegal to have two indoor bathtubs in one house. Clean water, a precious commodity when the law was written, is now readily available, so the law seems silly. But the human value of protecting and preserving precious resources is still around, evident in many conservation laws that seem sensible to us. So it is with the laws of religious tradition. What Jesus scorns today is others' attitude toward ritual laws, an attitude that becomes nearly idolatrous when laws are observed for their own sake. Jesus teaches that observation of external ritual laws is of value only when they are emblems of our internal disposition toward the will of God. Our whole lives must follow the one ultimate law of God: to love God completely and to love neighbor entirely. Roman Catholicism is a tradition rich with customs, traditions, and even laws. As we continue to listen to the voice of Christ, we must always look into our own hearts and underneath our ritual practices to make sure that love of God and love of neighbor are what we prize above all. TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION

When an altar is dedicated, the Rite of Dedication directs that, if possible, the relics of a martyr be mortared into the church floor under the *mensa*, or "altar table." Up until this revised rite, the general practice was to include small relics of saints in an altar stone, a slab of marble that was normally set in the altar itself. Today's rite states a clear preference for "martyr," and for a substantial part of the body, in accord with our tradition's desire for substantial symbols. Martyr, of course, means "witness" in Greek, and was the title given early on to the people who by their death imaged the death of Christ.

From the beginning, there has never been a shortage of such people, although it took a while for the Church to develop a process to declare someone a martyr. Saint Augustine tells how it was done in the fifth century. By then, popular opinion didn't count as much as an official tribunal set up by the bishop of the place where the martyr suffered. After the inquiry established that the person did indeed die for the faith, a metropolitan bishop had to ratify the decision before a shrine could be built or an altar set up over the martyr's tomb. For the most part, the honor paid to a martyr (called a "cult") was restricted to that diocese, although the fame of some heroes spread so much that they were celebrated elsewhere. The age of the martyrs is now, and more people died for the faith in the twentieth century than ever before, witnessing to Christ to the end. Their sacrifice remains "the seed of the Church." v.
