

175TH ANNIVERSARY NOTES

So far, we have looked at the first three resident Pastors of St. Peter's. While very little is known about Fathers Gallagher, Molony, and Kuhn, quite a lot is known about Father Andrew Magenhann, fourth resident Pastor of St. Peter's. In fact there's enough known about him that more than one column will be devoted to his time in Mansfield.



Andrew Magenhann was born at St. Pilt (Busweirre) in Alsace (later Alsace-Lorraine) in Germany near the French border on February 28, 1839. He immigrated to the United States when he was very young and was eventually ordained to the priesthood on July 30, 1861, by Bishop Rappe of Cleveland. His first priestly assignment was to St. John the Evangelist in Defiance where he succeeded Father James P. Molony, who would eventually precede Father Magenhann at Mansfield. While at Defiance, Father Magenhann served the mission churches at Edgerton St. Mary's, New Bavaria Sacred Heart of Jesus and at Delphos St. John's.

Father Magenhann was subsequently assigned as first resident Pastor at New Bavaria until 1865 when he was assigned first to St. Nicholas Parish in Berwick in Seneca County and then in 1867 to St. Peter's Mission Church in Norwalk. While there, he helped to establish St. Paul's Church in Norwalk, which resulted in a severe reduction of his own congregation at St. Peter's.

In October of 1869, Father Magenhann was assigned to succeed Father Kuhn at St. Peter's in Mansfield. Thus he began a pastorate of nearly thirty years here, which was exceeded only by our seventh Pastor, Monsignor Rupert Goebel, who served a term of thirty-two years. It is safe to say that Father Magenhann's tenure was productive and eventful.

Within his first year Father Magenhann began the construction of the second St. Peter's Church as the population of Mansfield for the first time then exceeded 10,000 and there were 200 families registered in the parish. The need for a new and larger church was apparent as the parish outgrew its previous building. The new church was built to the rear of the first church building and fronted on to South Mulberry Street. The building itself was 52 feet wide by 125 feet deep and was constructed of red brick in the Roman style.

On November 14, 1870, Father Magenhann purchased, at his own expense, three lots and the old First Ward school building located directly across Mulberry Street from the second church. This became St. Peter's School and a playground for the children. As the school grew, it was Father Magenhann who brought the Sisters of St. Francis of Mary Immaculate of Joliet to Mansfield to operate St. Peter's School in 1871. Two teaching sisters, Sr. Mary Ignatius and Sr. Mary Lucy, and a housekeeping sister, Sr. Mary Petra, arrived on August 28 and began their service at once.

We will continue our in-depth examination of Father Magenhann's life and work in Mansfield next week.

SEE BEYOND OUTWARD APPEARANCES

The phrase "Sunday best" has lost much of its meaning in our society today. Some lament the loss of people dressing up for church on Sunday; others think it's a healthy sign that we're as casual in attire gathered before the Lord as we are elsewhere. No matter which school of thought on this topic we belong to, James would probably chastise us. In either case, we are still focused on external appearance, mistaking it for some sort of favored position before God. True, James criticizes the community that favors the rich and well-dressed, while it ostracizing the poorly clothed, but even more he criticizes the making of distinctions, making choices based on criteria that have nothing to do with the reign of God. James might turn our attention to the reign of God described by Isaiah, in which people are healed and the earth becomes ripe to bear fruit. Jesus today is focused on this reign of God, healing a Gentile man in a region hostile to his Jewish faith, not mindful of the man's origins or clothing or status or ability to repay. Isaiah, James, and Jesus in Mark's Gospel all call us to look more deeply to find where the will of God needs to be done, and has been done, on earth as in heaven.

TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION

Back to work we go! Summer break is over and there is much to accomplish in school and in the workplace. It's a venerable Catholic custom to assign patron saints to the trades and occupations of life. This is largely in the realm of popular devotion, and although from time to time the Vatican declares a saint to be patron of this or that, the process is free-wheeling and just about uncontrollable. Still, there is a saint for almost any purpose, whether you are on death row (Dismas), having eye trouble (Lucy), or pursued by poisonous toads (Hubert). Medieval guilds would often associate themselves with heavenly patrons, so Saint Joseph has the carpenters, Thomas More the lawyers, and physicians get Saint Luke. If you're stuck in the airport, St. Joseph of Cupertino is on call since he was said to rise off the floor when he prayed, and if you're in a long line at the ATM, Saint Anthony Claret is for you.

In recent years, the Vatican has from time to time assigned a new patronage, as when Saint Aloysius Gonzaga was named the patron of HIV-AIDS patients, since as a young Jesuit novice he had cared for his fellow novices during a terrible plague. Anything that matters to us—nation, parish church, occupation, illness—can have a patron, and it is an aspect of Catholicism that has enormous appeal. To believe in the "communion of saints" is to know that the ties that bind us as a communion do not unravel with death, and that when we stand before life's struggles, we do not stand alone. Who is your patron saint?
