Hello Everyone!

A happy liturgical new year to all as we enter the Advent season this weekend!

The first Sunday of Advent can sometimes feel disconnected from what we have been hearing during the last few weeks of Ordinary Time. After all, throughout the last few Sundays, the Church has been reminding us that everyone will encounter Christ as the just judge after this life and, as such, we need to stay vigilant and repent of our sins in this life because we do not know the day nor the hour in which Christ will come again. This weekend, we once again jump into the beautiful season in which the Church takes about four weeks to remind us of the importance of Christ's first coming. Last week, we celebrated Christ as King of the universe; through Advent, we celebrate Christ, the Creator of the universe, coming to save us from sin and death.

In the Church's rich artistic and liturgical tradition, even from the early centuries of her existence, much artwork and liturgical music has been created to help us enter into this short-lived but wonderful season. That is part of the reason why Advent truly is my favorite liturgical season of the year.

One such piece of music is the traditional Advent hymn, "Creator of the Stars of Night," which I am certain we will be hearing over the next few weekends. Originally composed in Latin, this hymn comes to us from the seventh century. The lyrics beautifully summarize what I tried to express above and easily help us to enter into this season:

Creator of the stars of night,
Thy people's everlasting light,
Jesus, Redeemer, save us all,
and hear Thy servants when they call.

Thou, grieving that the ancient curse
should doom to death a universe,
hast found the medicine, full of grace,
to save and heal a ruined race.

Thou camest, the Bridegroom of the Bride,
as drew the world to evening tide,
proceeding from a virgin shrine,
the spotless Victim all divine.

At whose dread Name, majestic now,
all knees must bend, all hearts must bow;
and things celestial Thee shall own,
and things terrestrial Lord alone.

O Thou whose coming is with dread,
to judge and doom the quick and dead,
preserve us, while we dwell below,
from every insult of the foe.

To God the Father, God the Son,
and God the Spirit, Three in One,
laud, honor, might, and glory be
from age to age eternally.
Amen.

As we can see, what we celebrated last Sunday on Christ the King and what we will be celebrating these next few weeks are actually a lot more connected than it may have seemed at first sight.

175TH ANNIVERSARY NOTES

With this column, we begin our look at the pastorate of our seventh and longest serving Pastor, Father (later Monsignor) Rupert Charles Goebel. Many among us will doubtless remember Monsignor Goebel well. There are countless tales and anecdotes told of the serious, stern and devoted priest who was the first to serve here after this Parish and surrounding parishes were transferred from the governance of the Diocese of Cleveland to the control of the Diocese of Toledo in 1923.

Rupert C. Goebel was born August 28, 1883, in Blakeslee, Ohio, the first-born child of parents Peter and Caroline (née Dietrich) Goebel. At age 16, young Rupert enrolled at St. Joseph's College, the college seminary of the Precious Blood Fathers, in Collegeville, near Rensselaer in Indiana. He graduated from there in 1902 and began studies first at St. John's College in Toledo, where he graduated in 1905, and then at St. Bernard's Seminary in Rochester, New York.

Upon completion of his studies, Rupert Goebel was ordained a priest of the Cleveland Diocese by Bishop John Farrelly on June 10, 1911, less than a month after Bishop Farrelly laid the cornerstone for the present St. Peter's Church here in Mansfield. Father Goebel's first priestly assignment was as parochial vicar at Good Shepherd Church in Toledo. In August 1912 he was transferred to St. Ann's Church in Toledo and in November 1913 he was assigned to St. Joseph's Church in Tiffin, Ohio.

Father Goebel was sent to the Catholic University of America in 1914 for two years of additional studies. Upon his return to Tiffin he was appointed to the Apostolic Mission Board of the Diocese of Toledo, and 1917 he was appointed Pastor of St. Aloysius Church, in Bowling Green, Ohio.

In 1923 the transfer of Erie, Huron, and Richland counties from the Diocese of Cleveland to the Diocese of Toledo became effective. Our shortest serving pastor, Father Nicholas Hassel, elected to remain in the Cleveland Diocese. Father Goebel was appointed his successor on March 15, 1923, beginning service as the Pastor who served here the longest (1923 to 1955 – 32 years).

Father Goebel's tenure at St. Peter's coincided with many of the most significant and momentous events in the history of our Parish. We will continue our examination of his pastorate in the next column in this series.

ADULT FAITH ENRICHMENT

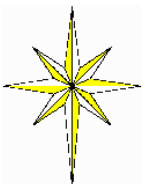

THE PROMISE OF JUSTICE

We are in fairly good company when we ask God for justice. Often enough we hear and agree with the lament of the people of Israel asking God why the wicked prosper. However, when we call out for justice, we usually want someone to get his or her comeuppance. God's justice is something other than this, of course. God's justice comprises a wonderful rightness between God and humankind.

Today, Jeremiah looks ahead to a time when a just one will sprout from the shorn-off stump of Jesse of the house and family of David. Life was not fair in Jeremiah's time. Israel's kings held the promise of God's fidelity, but it was difficult to see how God's promise could be realized through them.

Nevertheless, Jeremiah lifts his voice and announces that the Promised One will come. Luke's Gospel echoes that announcement, and Paul is filled with sturdy encouragement. And so Advent begins with a promise.

TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION

Occasionally, someone raises a surprised complaint that while Christmas arrives on Santa's sleigh at the Macy's parade on Thanksgiving Day, the Church doesn't catch on too fast. They may even say that Advent is a new fangled idea. Not so. To trace its beginnings, we have to go back to the fourth or fifth century in France (then Gaul), when Epiphany was the favored day, next to Easter, for baptism. The old pagan structures of Rome were collapsing then, and many people sought to be baptized. Since adults always prepared for baptism by fasting, folks counted back a few weeks for a kind of retreat. Before too long, bishops were advising everyone to attend church frequently beginning on December 17. Soon, artists were imagining ways of expressing the Advent mystery, and in Italy this gave rise to beautiful mosaics of empty thrones awaiting the arrival of the Lord of all creation.

Advent as we know it develops on two separate tracks: the first having to do with our spiritual preparation for celebrating the Christmas feast, and the second having to do with the way this is organized and expressed in the liturgical readings and prayers every day of the season.
