END OF YEAR CHARITABLE GIFTS

The end of the year is fast approaching, and with all of this year's changes to the tax code this year, you might find yourself in a position to make an end of year charitable gift to reduce your 2018 taxable burden. You may want to make a gift to St. Peter's to: pay off your Capital Campaign pledge early, pre-pay your 2019 Sunday collection, the Annual Fund or endow a sustaining gift to the Msgr. Edward C. Dunn Foundation.

Anyone may give the gift of cash or stock to St. Peter's. Gifts of stock that have been held for a year or longer can have a charitable deduction for the stock's fair market value on the day it is donated, and you may avoid paying capital gains on the stock. Stock transfers should be initiated by December 22, 2018 to guarantee they will be completed by the end of 2018. All other gifts must be postmarked by December 31, 2018 to be credited towards your 2018 giving cycle.

If you are 70 1/2 years or older, you may also elect to make a qualified charitable distribution from your IRA.

175TH ANNIVERSARY NOTES

We continue our look at the life and pastorate of our seventh Pastor, Father Rupert C. Goebel.

When Father Goebel arrived in 1923 to take the reins as pastor of St. Peter's, the parish was still operating under a system most dioceses had abandoned. Toledo Bishop (later Cardinal) Samuel Stritch charged Father Goebel with the task of reorganizing the parish administratively as well as with the task of improving the operating conditions of St. Peter's School.

Father Goebel's first steps were to establish a renewed Parish Advisory Council and the eliminate the old pew rent revenue system in favor of offertory envelopes by then being used in most Catholic parishes. Pew rent was a practice whereby an individual or family would pay a specified amount for the right to use a particular pew or group of pews at any and all divine services in the Church. The money raised from pew rent was used to support the operation of the parish and to support the living expenses of the clergy. Those who could not pay pew rent were encouraged to use the many unreserved pews, usually near the back of the church.

When Father Goebel introduced the offertory envelope system, there was some resistance from the parishioners, but the Parish Advisory Council promoted the idea in the light of being better able to budget for and anticipate the parish's many financial obligations.

In 1924, Bishop Stritch ordered Father Goebel to establish a four year high school at St. Peter's in which 23 students were enrolled the first year. That class became the graduating class of 1928.

In 1925, the Parish, under Father Goebel's direction, purchased the current rectory from the Wappner family. Our priests still live there today.

Bishop Stritch also directed Father Goebel to begin construction on a new Elementary School building to accommodate the burgeoning student population. Prior to the construction of the new Elementary building, the entire red brick school building which stood on the current church parking lot had been converted to classrooms and five portable schoolrooms had been erected next to the red brick building.

Construction on the new school building began in the fall of 1926 and on March 20, 1927, Bishop Stritch presided at the laying of the cornerstone of the new building. That cornerstone reads: "Erected to our children, that they may honor their parents, that they may serve their country, that they may love their God, that they may save their souls." The school first opened its doors to students in September 1927.

We will continue our examination of Father Goebel's pastorate next week.

The great powers of Rome are named and made to stand waiting for the arrival of God's salvation. And we find Paul meditating joyfully on what really matters.

According to Baruch, the city of Jerusalem is like a person standing on tiptoe looking for God's salvation, which is coming from the east. Those who were led away on foot, heads down, now come back, a proud people. Why, the very way is smoothed out. The path is lined with fragrant, lush trees.

It can't get any better than this, can it? Well, yes, it can. For a voice calls out in the desert. Here is the beginning of the salvation of God.

TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION

Look around most Catholic churches, and you will discover an image of John the Baptist, often in the old baptistery, or in a window near where the font is or was located. He has two feast days in the calendar: one commemorating his birth, and the other his death. There are only three nativities in our calendar: for Jesus, for Mary, and for the Baptist. John's birthday is reckoned according to the schedule given in Luke's Gospel of the angel's announcement to Mary. The angel tells her that her cousin Elizabeth is in the sixth month of pregnancy, and so Mary hastens to help her. Reckoning Christmas as December 25, we count backwards nine months to March 25 for the Feast of the Annunciation. Then we count forward three months to June 24 for John the Baptist's birth. Halfway to Christmas, his nativity gives ample reason for rejoicing in the summer, and his symbols of fire and water are used playfully in bonfires and dives into the sea. Even at the polar opposite of Christmas in the calendar, the energy of Christ's birth in the Incarnation provides cause for rejoicing.
