Over the past couple of months, I've had the responsibility of entering the weekly giving data into our donor database. Through that process, it is a witness to the living testament of Jesus in Mark's gospel 12:41-44.

"41 He sat down opposite the treasury and observed how the crowd put money into the treasury. Many rich people put in large sums. 42 A poor widow also came and put in two small coins worth a few cents. 43 Calling his disciples to himself, he said to them, "Amen, I say to you, this poor widow put in more than all the other contributors to the treasury. 44 For they have all contributed from their surplus wealth, but she, from her poverty, has contributed all she had, her whole livelihood."

While database entry isn't the most exciting thing a person can pass the time doing, it has been a humbling experience. It's been a chance to look beyond the weekly totals, year-to-date averages and understand the weekly sacrifices that our parishioners make to support our ministries.

Each week, we receive envelopes in the baskets that contain just a couple of dollars, but they are there faithfully every week. For others, that amount may be \$10, \$25, \$50 or more. Several children put in their collection envelopes every week. You see one envelope each week with thirty-five cents in it. Do they pull it from their piggy bank, or does it comes from their parents? Either way, it's teaching a valuable lesson on sacrificial giving. It's a constant reminder to me that I need to do a better job with my kids.

Every sacrificial gift you give makes an impact at St. Peter's. It is because of your efforts we have this beautifully restored church. It is because of you that we can feed the needy every month and provide ministry to our local prison population. It is because of you that we can continue to provide Catholic education to our community, both through our school and PSR program. It is because of you that our priests can continue their mission to provide the sacraments every week.

I would also be remiss not to acknowledge all the time and talent that also goes into making this parish continue to move forward. Our liturgical ministers, musicians, servers, ushers, and sacristans who make sure our Masses run smoothly. The volunteer teams who serve wonderful lunches after funerals. And then we have our baking crews, cafeteria servers, classroom helpers, maintenance and properties handymen, and the list can go on and on.

As we begin our 175th year, **thank you** to everyone for all you have done and may you have a great and blessed 2019.



HANDICAP SEATING IN CHURCH

Holy Communion will be brought to both areas on weekends. However, note: the "break" in the middle of the church on both sides of the main aisle is **not designated** as a handicap area. Worshippers who choose to sit in these pews are asked to process forward for Holy Communion as usual.

175TH ANNIVERSARY NOTES

In our last 175th Anniversary Notes column, we took a final look at the pastorate of Monsignor Rupert C. Goebel, seventh Pastor of St. Peter's. After Monsignor Goebel's death from cancer in May of 1955, Father James W. O'Grady was appointed as Parish Administrator until a new Pastor could be assigned by Bishop Rehring.

On June 3, 1955, the Chancery announced that Monsignor James F. Hebbeler, at the time Pastor of St. Thomas Aquinas Parish in Toledo, was appointed the eighth Pastor of St. Peter's with an effective date of June 10, 1955. As a young priest, Monsignor Hebbeler had been stationed in Mansfield at St. Peter's as an assistant from 1926 to 1932 immediately after the completion of his graduate work in Sacred Theology in Rome after his ordination to the priesthood in 1925.

James F. Hebbeler was a native of Toledo, born there on February 22, 1899, the third son and fourth youngest of the five children of William H. and Mary Ellen (nee' Fitzgerald) Hebbeler. Although as a young man James Hebbeler aspired to become an engineer, after attending St. John's High School and College in Toledo, he enrolled at Mount Saint Mary's of the West Seminary in Norwood, Ohio, a suburb of Cincinnati.

He completed his studies for the priesthood at the North American College in Rome, and was ordained a priest there on December 19, 1925.

During his school years, James excelled in athletics as well as academics and won several awards for athletic success, especially in basketball and baseball. During his priestly career he started or advanced the CYO in each of his parishes.

As indicated above, Father Hebbeler was first assigned as an assistant to Monsignor Goebel here at St. Peter's from 1926 until 1932. In January of 1932 he was named the assistant principal at Calvert High School in Tiffin, Ohio. Later in 1932 he was assigned to the post of Chaplain at St. Rita Hospital in Lima, Ohio, and simultaneously as pastor of St. Mary Parish in Bluffton. Ohio.

Little more than a dozen years after his ordination, he was assigned as Pastor of St. Thomas Aquinas Parish in Toledo, a reflection of the confidence and regard in which he was held by Bishop Karl J. Alter. Father Hebbeler remained as Pastor of St. Thomas Aquinas Parish until June of 1955. In 1954, Bishop George Rehring appointed Father Hebbeler to the Diocesan Board of Consultors and later in the same year requested that the Holy See name Father Hebbeler a Domestic Prelate with the title of Reverend Monsignor. In June of 1955, following the death of Monsignor Rupert C. Goebel, Monsignor Hebbeler was appointed Pastor of St. Peter's Parish in Mansfield on June 10, 1955.



TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION

Monday of this week is Christmas Day in Russia and in much of the Orthodox world. This curious difference in schedule has a lot to do with how calendars have been developed and changed over the years. In the year 45 B.C. Julius Caesar gave the empire his Julian Calendar, with the winter solstice on January 6. This put an end to a system in which officials called "pontiffs" were able to tweak the calendar by adding extra days in as needed. He invented two new months at that time, December and January; and in order to correct the mess the pontiffs had made, forced a year of 445 days on the empire in what he named "The Last Year of Confusion." The new months varied in number of days according to a complex schedule, but the calendar was still off by nearly twelve minutes a year, and lost a full day every 130 years.

Pope Gregory XIII reformed the calendar in 1583, but not everyone appreciated his efforts. England held out for two hundred years. The year 1700 was a leap year in England, but not in France; they were eleven days apart! George Washington was really born on February 11; when the Gregorian calendar was finally adopted in the English colonies shortly before the Revolution, he had to move his birthday to February 22. Now the calendars are thirteen days apart, which accounts for Russia's Julian calendar Christmas. And Caesar thought he had brought confusion to an end!
