Last week, the little voice in the back of my head was telling me that I was about due for a weekly bulletin article. It turns out the voice in my head was right.

If you are a family of a school-aged child, I hope you will consider joining us this afternoon for our Open House here at St. Peter's – if anything just to check it out. Even if you don't think you could ever afford a Catholic education, you can come and at least see what we have to offer.

The Catholic school system is still the second biggest in the United States after public schools. We have talked a great deal about our 150-year anniversary this year, and throughout our history there have been many high points and low points. However, our Catholic values have never wavered. That's the one thing that you won't find in a public school — going to Mass, learning about our Catholic faith and how to be a moral, upstanding citizen who has personal responsibility. Plus, our school has small class sizes and personalized attention.

Tuition is always a concern, but we have many financial assistance and scholarship programs available from Ohio School Choice Scholarships to our Annual Fund. If your family is active and participates in your Catholic faith and wants a Catholic education for your child(ren), we can work to find a way.

Many people believe that tuition is a sacrifice, but instead, think of it this way; it's an investment in your child's future. I know my parents sacrificed a great deal to send me to St. Peter's. If you look at it as an investment, and they do, it paid off.

As you know, we are working on a strategic plan for our future. I believe that Catholic education has a long future ahead of it. Reading old strategic plans in the archive room which go back to the late 1970s makes me want to twist the words of Mark Twain just a bit: 'The rumors of our demise are greatly exaggerated.'

We have many dedicated teachers who could work in many other places and earn a lot more money. However, they chose St. Peter's because they are dedicated to the students and to the idea of Catholic education. Why no consider being a part of the solution by investing in the next generation through Catholic education at St. Peter's?

The diocese newly defined "Core Values" will guide all our efforts at every level throughout the diocese. We also created what we call "Strategic Pillar Goals." This is where we will be concentrating our energies for the next three years.

CHURCH REGULATIONS REGARDING FAST & ABSTINENCE

Abstinence from meat (beast or fowl) is to be observed by all Catholics fourteen years old and older on Ash Wednesday and on all Fridays of Lent. This obligation prohibits the eating of meat, but not eggs, milk products, or condiments of any kind, even though made from animal fat.

Fasting means limiting oneself to one full meal on a given fast day. Catholics who are eighteen years of age but not yet fifty-nine are obliged to fast on Ash Wednesday and Good Friday. On fast days, two additional smaller meals are permitted if necessary to maintain strength. However, the two smaller meals together may not equal one full meal. Moreover, eating solid foods between meals on fast days is not permitted. The exception, of course, would be those under physicians care, in which case an individual is encouraged to do another form of penance.

THE INSIDE SHOWS

In this third Sunday of our reading from the Sermon on the Plain, Jesus speaks of the inner soul and its outer expression. He uses images as he teaches. He addresses all of us.

Jesus sees a plumb line connecting the soul with the soul's expression-words and actions. He uses exaggeration to drive home his point. We are urged to clear out the debris that blinds us. He knows that we have an uncanny ability to be blind to our own weaknesses, though they be as big as a board. He knows, too, how willingly we seem to ferret out others' smallest speck-like flaws.

And this, too, is for our general consumption; solid old goodness and solid old badness will show eventually. The old Latin saying, which echoes Jesus' images, is true: "What is bred in the bone will out in the flesh." By and by, the inside will show through.

TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION

Many Catholics who are not active in the Church will still seek out ashes this Wednesday. Likewise, many Jews who are not otherwise observant will follow the Day of Atonement, Yom Kippur, with great exactness, fasting and refraining from work and entertainment. People customarily dress in white as a symbol of purity and a reminder of God's promise that our sins will be made white as snow. While the overture to Ash Wednesday for Christians may be a festive Mardi Gras celebration, for Jews it is the New Year feast of Rosh Hashanah. Ten days before the Day of Atonement to God, people are expected to repair breaks in human life. These are days for offering forgiveness and seeking to repair harmed relationships with family, friends, or coworkers. Everyone is expected to seek out someone and "clear the air" by asking for understanding for any mean words or thoughtless deeds in the past year.

Perhaps the ashes you receive will be invested with deeper meaning if you follow a similar plan. This year, Rosh Hashanah will be September 29, and Yom Kippur October 8. A conversation with some Jewish friends or neighbors about their experience of a season of repentance may be a blessing on your Lent.
