Mass on Monday evening, April 15, and Tuesday, April 16 is cancelled. Father Hite & Father Austin will be in Toledo for the Chrism Mass at 11am.

In Observance of Holy Week, the Parish Center will close at 12:00 noon on Holy Thursday, and be closed Good Friday, Holy Saturday and Easter Sunday and the Monday after Easter. We will reopen on Tuesday, April 23.

Today marks our entry into the holiest and most meaningful week in the life of the Church: Holy Week. Despite all the pageantry and solemnity we will witness during the coming days, our successful participation in Holy Week requires involvement at a deeply personal level, and not just at the level of corporate participation as part of a worshipping congregation. With that in mind, I offer the following meditation on the text of today's second reading from Paul's letter to the Philippians.

We begin by confessing that Christ Jesus is God. He is the only-begotten, the Son of God, the incarnate Word of God. But even though he was, "...in the form of God," Jesus did not see himself as entitled to equality with the Father who had begotten him.

Can you imagine? Certainly not the way we think about things today, is it? I mean, really...the only-begotten Son of God, consubstantial with the Father and yet refusing to stake claim to what was obviously his by right?

Moreover, as Paul reminds us, this was no passive acceptance of something beyond his control. Jesus has taken decisive action – he has emptied himself and has taken on the form of a slave...not a servant even, but a slave. God has descended to become one of us and has taken on himself all that is part of the human condition (except for sin).

What a thing to consider! The God of the universe...the Creator of all that is or will be or ever was, embraces mortality in order that we might taste immortality! He accepted death on a cross taking on himself the frailty, sins and failures of all of us...loving each and every last one of us completely and without any terms or conditions. This is so much the case that Paul, in another epistle, says, "...he who knew no sin was made to be sin..."

So quite rightly (as our society is prone to think anyway), God gave to Jesus Christ the "name above all other names," exalting him above everything, and making him the victor who triumphs over sin and death. That is naturally followed by our own acknowledgment and confession of the Lordship of Jesus, with every knee bent in homage before him. After, all we owe him our homage for saving us, and not to mention that he is still also God and worthy of our praise.

We ourselves seek a share in that victory, and we long to be found standing at last by God's own side and basking in the light of life forevermore. But there is a hard truth here. Just as Jesus is our Savior and Master, he is also our model.

For those who seek to follow Christ, there is no way round it. There can be no victory or life everlasting without the Cross. And true discipleship does not flinch in the face of the suffering and service we are called to embrace. Jesus reminds us to take up our crosses and follow him...to accept with Faith the road ahead of us and to accept the place and life each of us has been given. Our crosses may not be rough-hewn lumber covered in blood, but it is only through embracing our own crosses fully and faithfully following Christ that we can come to share it his life without end. We must each discover what it truly means: Father, into your hands I commend my Spirit!

May your observance of Holy Week lead you to a deeper understanding of what Jesus has done for us.

CHURCH REGULATIONS REGARDING FAST & ABSTINENCE

Abstinence from meat (beast or fowl) is to be observed by all Catholics **fourteen years old and older on Ash Wednesday and on all Fridays of Lent.** This obligation prohibits the eating of meat, but not eggs, milk products, or condiments of any kind, even though made from animal fat.

Fasting means limiting oneself to one full meal on a given fast day. Catholics who are **eighteen years of age but not yet fifty-nine are obliged to fast on Ash Wednesday and Good Friday.** On fast days, two additional smaller meals are permitted if necessary to maintain strength. However, the two smaller meals together may not equal one full meal. Moreover, eating solid foods between meals on fast days is not permitted. The exception, of course, would be those under physicians care, in which case an individual is encouraged to do another form of penance.

THE STORY OF OUR REDEMPTION

We begin the final week of Lent with these familiar readings. This year, we hear the Passion from the Gospel of Luke. These readings for Palm Sunday and the Passion used to be read on successive Sundays. Now they are combined into a single feast, so that we may see the whole sweep of the glory and the suffering played out. Jesus accepts the adulation of the crowd, the foreshadowing of his glory in the Resurrection. He bids farewell to his disciples in his last Passover, and forgives his tormentors as he dies on the cross. Later this week, we enter the Holy Triduum of Holy Thursday, Good Friday, and Holy Saturday, when the whole story of our redemption will play out once again.

TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION

This week, the Chrism Mass is celebrated in every cathedral in the world in preparation for the Easter Triduum. Only a bishop can consecrate chrism, pure olive oil infused with rich fragrance, so this liturgy is a sign of the unity of the local Church and the bishop's ministry to all who will be baptized and confirmed in our parishes in the coming year. Chrism is also used in the ordination of priests and bishops and the consecration of new altars. Two other sacramental oils, the unscented olive oil for catechumens and for the sick, will be blessed in the same liturgy and transported carefully to every parish by the beginning of the Triduum. Remember when Noah's dove returned with the sign of the world's rebirth? The dove carried an olive branch, a pledge that God was breathing the world to life again. Yet olives require human nurture. Olives are inedible unless they are cured by human labor. Olive trees grow on sunny slopes, away from the shade of city walls, so they can only be properly tended, cured, and laboriously pressed in peace time. The Chrism Mass with its olive oils expresses God's deepest desires for us, and our resolve to place our lives in service to God's saving, healing, loving plan.
