THE CHILDRENS LITURGY OF THE WORD

Thankfully we have come to the end of the month where we have to "*Repay to Caesar what belongs to Caesar.*" As has been reported in the news, the Tax Cut and Jobs Act of 2017 had left some surprises for taxpayers when they filed this year.

The most significant change related to charitable giving was the change to the standard deductions to \$12,200 for individuals and \$24,400 for married couples filing jointly. Many individuals and couples used their philanthropic gifts to boost their itemized deductions, but with the new standard deduction, charitable giving may not give that extra boost. If you are one of the many who has used charitable giving to reduce your annual tax liability, there are some options that you might want to consider as your plan for next year's taxes.

Qualified Charitable Distributions (QCD) from an IRA: If you are 70½ years old or older, you may be eligible to make a charitable gift with a direct rollover from your IRA. **A QCD gift will count towards your annual required withdrawal and will reduce your annual taxable income.** During the past several weeks, we've had multiple inquiries from parishioners about making their annual Sunday contributions via a QCD. This gift option continues to become more popular for our parishioners.

In many cases, parishioners will make a one-time distribution that would total what they would have given over the course of 52 Sundays, Christmas and Easter. The key in a QCD distribution is that the check must be made out directly to the charitable organization – in this case, the parish or school.

In addition to IRA distributions, there are other gift options that you may want to consider.

Non-Cash Gifts of Stocks & Securities: Gifts of stock and securities are still an excellent option if you are usually a cash donor and looking to reduce your tax burden. Donating appreciated securities helps you minimize capital gains tax that would be due if you had sold those securities. You will still receive a charitable deduction for your donation.

Bunching Tax Gifts: The concept is simple: bunching your gift is making two or more years of charitable donations during one calendar year to push itemized deductions beyond the \$24,400 limit. Then pull your giving back for the next several years and take the standard deduction.

Donor-Advised Funds: The Dunn Foundation now offers a donor-advised fund that is a dedicated charitable account used for the sole purpose of supporting projects you care about at St. Peter's School. The Foundation invests your gift, and the fund will grow. A donor-advised fund can be opened with a \$10,000 gift. You take the charitable deduction in the first year and can add smaller contributions to the fund at any time in the future.

As always, it is a good idea to review your tax strategy with your accountant or financial planner. These options are not right for everyone, and every situation is different. If you have some basic questions, we would be happy to talk with you in the Development Office or connect you with an expert in the parish.

SEEING IS BELIEVING

Seeing is believing! Since cellphone screens connect us instantly to social media, live TV, and loved ones' faces near and far, "Doubting Thomas" could be our patron saint: "Unless I see, I will not believe!" But how comforting for any of us who share Thomas's doubt, or love "doubters" who do, to see how kindly Jesus responds. By offering the very evidence that Thomas demanded, Jesus doesn't scold Thomas, but seems to understand such skepticism. Could Jesus have been thinking of us, who long to believe that "Jesus is risen!" but see so much suffering, and perhaps even cause some, that we wonder, how could something so wonderful be true? In today's reading from the Acts of the Apostles, the risen Jesus' healing love comforts through disciples who love others. In Revelation, "our brother John" doesn't just claim he saw Jesus alive, but passes on Jesus' life-giving words, "Do not be afraid." Seeing Jesus in others is believing!

TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION

An ancient title for this Sunday is *Dominica in Albis*, or "Sunday in White." During the Easter Vigil, the newly baptized are invested with a white garment, a sign that they have put on Christ. At one time, the garments were worn for a full week of celebration and reflection, and on this Sunday the newly baptized would appear in their robes again in their new place among the faithful for Eucharist.

In later centuries, the energy of new life at Easter was largely forgotten, and this Sunday was renamed "Quasimodo Sunday," or "Low Sunday." In recent years, with the recovery of the insight that Easter is the privileged time for celebrating and renewing baptism, there is nothing "Low" about this Sunday. At a week's distance, the beauty and grace of our Easter celebration is sustained by joyful alleluias, the blessing and sprinkling of holy water, and the comfort of the Lord's presence to us. He is risen, and he summons us together, opening up the scriptures for us, breaking the bread, filling us with new life.
