A good friend of ours just revealed that her husband was in the beginning stages of Alzheimer's. We had already guessed this, but we were waiting for her to tell us in her own time and space. With a smile on her face she outlined the things that they could no longer do because of his diagnosis. She said that one thing he still insisted on doing is balancing their checkbook. Late at night she goes back and balances the checkbook again after he has finished, something she had never had to do because it was what he had always done. She is facing a new reality.

My mother lost her husband when he was 40 years old. He did not pass away, but rather had a massive stroke that completely incapacitated him. She was somehow able to keep him at home until he was 57, becoming a care giver to not only her four growing children but her husband as well. Until cancer set in and then he had to go to a care facility. He passed away five years after that. During those twenty years, she faced a new reality daily and it was not a situation she had anticipated.

Recently I worked with a family who, out of the blue and with horrible coincidence, both parents lost their jobs. Their savings account dwindled, they lost their life insurance and their home all while still raising a young family. I have heard that both have now found other jobs, in fields that are a far cry from the ones they were trained in. They have a new reality, and I am sure not one they would have chosen if given the chance.

Sometimes I think that people get it wrong. God never promised us that life was going to be easy. In fact, I think he may have implied the exact opposite. If you watch the news, it is easy to think that some people have it easier than others. In reality all of us have had to face a new reality at some point. It might be a diagnosis of diabetes or cancer, a change of jobs or the loss of a loved one. Realities are very hard, and it takes strong people to face them no matter how small or large. The common thread that I have seen in people who have faced what might be termed as insurmountable realities is that they had faith, hope, love and strength.

There is a saying that God does not push you farther than you can go or give you more than you can handle. I personally hate that saying because I don't think it is comforting to people in times of "new realities". At the same time it speaks to the fact that God knows us, he knows what he created and the strength and love that lies within.

A perfect time to look at our realities is the season of Lent. Christ shows us an overwhelming example of facing new realities with fortitude and love as he walked the road to his death, but continued to give to those around him. Many of us may have failed in similar circumstances, not only physically but spiritually and mentally. He gives us the example of how to face those hardships in our lives, because as beings created in his image, he knows we can do it.

## CHURCH REGULATIONS REGARDING FAST &amp; ABSTINENCE

**Abstinence from meat** (beast or fowl) is to be observed by all Catholics **fourteen years old and older on Ash Wednesday and on all Fridays of Lent.** This obligation prohibits the eating of meat, but not eggs, milk products, or condiments of any kind, even though made from animal fat.

**Fasting means limiting oneself to one full meal** on a given fast day. Catholics who are **eighteen years of age but not yet fifty-nine are obliged to fast on Ash Wednesday and Good Friday.** On fast days, two additional smaller meals are permitted if necessary to maintain strength. However, the two smaller meals together may not equal one full meal. Moreover, eating solid foods between meals on fast days is not permitted. The exception, of course, would be those under physicians care, in which case an individual is encouraged to do another form of penance.

## PRISON MINISTRY CORNER



Our Catholic brothers at Richland Correctional who are involved in the re-integration programs involving knitting and crocheting send their deepest thanks for all the donations from our parish. The plastic grocery bags are woven into portable sleeping mats for the homeless. The yarn is used for a variety of items including hats, scarves, blankets, and stuffed animals; these items are given to first responders and other community programs involving traumatized children. ## FISCAL YEAR 2017-2018 AUDIT UPDATE

All,

I am pleased to report to you that St. Peter's has received the final audit report, dated February 6, 2019, from the William Vaughn Company, confirming that their work at St. Peter's is complete as it relates to fiscal year 2017-2018.

The eight page final report noted that the auditors encountered no apparent problems relating to internal controls, procedures, or accounting practices, and that St. Peter's is in compliance with the policies & procedures as they are defined by the Diocese of Toledo. The audit report recommended five correcting journal entries which, after being made, changed the operating net income of St. Peter's Parish from positive \$16,718 to negative \$16,652. This audit represents our best effort to remain in compliance with the policies set forth by the Diocese of Toledo, as well as our commitment to present accurate information to you, the St. Peter's Community. The reception of this report is especially significant considering that St. Peter's has not, in more than a decade, received a full audit.

We will continue to receive audits annually and expect that process to begin for the current fiscal year (2018-2019) as soon the year ends.

## PARISH ASSESSMENT AND THE "ACA:"

Some have asked the *difference between* what our "Parish Assessment" is for – and how this differs from our contribution to the Annual Catholic Appeal.

**The parish assessment is based on 10 % of the regular Weekend Collections, plus Christmas and Easter.** Every parish is assessed. For what? The "business side" of the diocese – or what some refer to as the "Temporal Goods" of the diocesan church: our Archives, the Marriage Tribunal, Human Resource services, the Chancery Office, the Pastoral Center in Toledo, Legal Risk Services, the United States Catholic Conference of Bishops (our portion of supporting the national Roman Catholic Conference), the Holy See, Communications and various Financial Services.

**The Annual Catholic Appeal (ACA) covers up to 75% of the costs for the pastoral and spiritual ministries of the diocese.** This includes: priestly formation; permanent deacon formation; Catholic Education services to parishes; Catholic Social Services (like Catholic Charities); Youth/Young Adult ministry; the support of our diocesan Cathedral; Parish and Family Life; and the largest percentage is dedicated to the formation and education of future priests for our diocese.

**Please respond generously to the Annual Catholic Appeal.** Our parish goal, our fair share of being a part of the wider, diocesan Church, is \$55,000. And please pray for priests – that St. Peter's will always have a resident pastor.

## 150TH SCHOOL ANNIVERSARY NOTES



The new elementary building was in full use and the red-brick high school building was deteriorating quickly. Monsignor Goebel started a building campaign in 1953 to build a new high school but he did not live to see his plans completed. So it was the next pastor, Monsignor Hebbeler, who broke ground for the new high school. In September of 1958, the new high school opened its doors to 349 students. The top two floors of the high school became the new home of the Franciscan Sisters, complete with chapel, kitchen, dining room, living room, and many bedrooms. The remaining three floors were classrooms, science labs, cafeteria, and gymnasium. An interesting photo here shows three high school boys standing on the fire escape on the red-brick high school building while they look to and can almost touch the new high school building, almost completed. Notice Crouse Street in the center of the photos.

## GOD FORGIVES

The Lord said to Joshua, "Today I have removed the reproach of Egypt from you." After forty years of wandering in the desert, this hard-headed people have finally reached the Promised Land. No more do they eat the manna in the desert, but they partake of the fruits of their new homeland. God has kept the promise to their parents in Egypt. Even though they were a sinful people, many times questioning God and even worshiping false gods, God has forgiven them and fulfilled the promise. The "take-away" for us is that there is no sin that is unforgivable. We may have offended our neighbors, given a bad example to someone, even worshiped the false gods of money and power. But God is a merciful God, true to the words spoken to us. God forgives all and calls us back to love.

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## TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION

Today, "Laetare Sunday," breaks the somberness of Lent for a little rejoicing, and the readings all summon us to an awareness of reconciliation. One of the best-loved stories of our tradition is today's Gospel story of the runaway son and the prodigal father. Prodigal, of course, is an adjective meaning "spendthrift or extravagant to a degree bordering on recklessness," and although the boy maxes out the credit cards, it is really the father who is prodigal with forgiveness.

Part of the excitement of this Laetare Sunday is rooted in the ancient catechumenate. Long ago, midway through Lent, the "elect" were focusing more and more on the gift of reconciliation accomplished for them by Christ and about to be realized in the Easter sacraments they were preparing to celebrate. In some places, the elect were even bedecked with roses on this day. A person bedecked with roses sticks out in a crowd; a person formed by the Eucharist and committed to living a life of reconciliation does, too. That's you!
