Well, let me start by saying, "Happy Birthday!" Happy birthday to you, Church of God! Happy birthday to you, St. Peter's Parish!

The Solemnity of Pentecost, which we celebrate today, is reckoned by many to be the birthday of the Church. The Spirit of God, the Paraclete...the Comforter, descended with power and signs and wonders upon the Apostles and the followers of Jesus who were gathered in the upper room where he told them to await the gift of the Spirit. It was from there that the Apostles went to become witnesses, "...in Jerusalem, throughout Judea and Samaria, and to the ends of the earth." (Acts 1:8)

This beginning was a type of new creation. The Holy Spirit enlivened the followers of Jesus and gave them the power to preach, to heal, to teach, to discern and to witness to the life promised to those who believed. Much like the original creation episode wherein, "...the Spirit of God (*alt. translation would be 'a great wind'* from the Hebrew *ruach Elohim*), hovered over the waters." (Gen. 1:2) Similarly, in Genesis, God is described as blowing, "...the breath of life into his (the first man – Adam's) nostrils..." whereupon, "...the man became a living being." (Gen. 2:7) The parallel to the birth of the Church is striking. The action of the Holy Spirit in coming down upon the Apostles is described as being like the sound of a great rushing wind (St. Luke uses the Greek word *pnoes* which means a gust or a breeze or, most importantly, respiration. It also serves as the root word for *pneuma* from which we get words like pneumatic and pneumonia...all having to do with wind or air power or respiration. Acts 2:2.)

It's very much like that first wonderful spring day when you can finally open the windows and let in the fresh air. Everything is enlivened and seems more energized and vibrant. This is great food for thought as we consider the birth of the Church...that the Spirit enlivens the Church and us in much the same way that fresh air drives out the musty old air of winter. Just think what the Apostles must have felt that day. We ought to seek to share in their experience!

As we celebrate Pentecost here at St. Peter's, we are also beginning the celebration of the 175th Anniversary of the founding of our Parish back in 1844. In previous bulletins (as well as more coming in the future) we've read about the brave and dynamic people of faith who built and strengthened this parish from those days even until now. They were literally the breath needed to bring our Parish to life! As we recall the coming of the Holy Spirit at Pentecost and as we remember that by the power of the breath of God the Church came to life, we see the parallel: if we are filled with the Spirit of God, we are the vessels by which God brings life to our Parish.

What gifts and talents do you possess? In what ways can you help to bring life to our Parish? The Spirit leads us to help enliven and empower our community so that we can all become the witnesses of Christ in our Parish and beyond, even, "...to the ends of the earth." (Acts 1:8) As we recall the faithful men and women who came before us here, let's seek to be like them...to give of our gifts and talents to continue to build this little slice of God's kingdom here and now. We can use your help. We can use your support. But most importantly, we need your presence. We need you to come take part in the events coming up. We need you to be there to be part of what's happening in our community...not just at Pentecost or on an anniversary, but every day. Why not say "Yes!" to the prompting of the Spirit within you?

175TH ANNIVERSARY NOTES

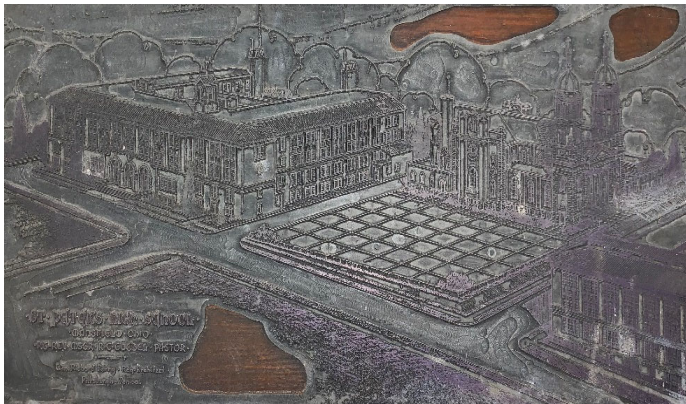
In this column we resume our look at the events and leaders who brought our Parish forward through the years. In the previous column, we began a look into the life and career of Monsignor James F. Hebbler, the eighth Pastor of St. Peter's Parish.

Upon the death of Monsignor Rupert Goebel in May of 1955, Bishop Rehring named as pastor Monsignor Hebbeler who, in his early days of priesthood, served as an Assistant here. He assumed his new responsibilities here on June 15, 1955.

First among the new Pastor's many concerns was the project left unfinished by his predecessor: the construction of the new St. Peter's High School and the accompanying convent for the Joliet Franciscan Sisters who staffed the Parish School. Monsignor Goebel had contracted with an architectural design firm (Wm. R. Perry Architects) from Pittsburgh, PA. Under Monsignor Goebel's guidance, a design plan was completed and fund-raising was already underway, having begun in 1953.

Monsignor Hebbeler elected to continue with the design plan and fundraising as developed by Monsignor Goebel. Monsignor Hebbeler presided at the ground-breaking ceremonies on May 6, 1956. Construction was completed in 1958 and the new High School opened its doors for the first time in September of that year. We will continue our look at the Pastorate of Monsignor Hebbeler in the next bulletin.

PENTECOST - JUNE 9, 2019

There are different kinds of spiritual gifts but the same Spirit. 1 Corinthians 12:4

On Pentecost we celebrate the "Birthday of the Church." Red is symbolically the color of the Spirit. The multitude of languages is our reminder that in the Spirit we are united and the mission of the Church is worldwide. Fr. Gregory Hite and Fr. Austin Ammanniti will read the Gospel in Italian at the Masses they celebrate.

Pentecost (from the Greek word, *pentēkostē*) means fiftieth, and originates as a seven week Jewish harvest festival following the Passover Sabbath. It predates the time of Christ. Also called the Feast of Weeks, it eventually became a memorial of the covenant and of the giving of the Law. Early Christians continued a similar observance but emphasized the Resurrection. Fasting and kneeling at worship were not allowed during this period as it was designated as a time of rejoicing. In its nascent stages, the Church celebrated the Ascension and Pentecost together as this feast of the fiftieth day evolved. In the late 4th century, Christians began to observe the feast of the Ascension on the fortieth day after Easter and, Pentecost, the outpouring of the Holy Spirit, ten days later. In the U.S. we celebrate the Ascension on the seventh Sunday of Easter and Pentecost, "the birthday of the Church," a week later.

RECONCILED DIVERSITY

A few years ago, during Rome's quiet summer, Pope Francis took a day off to visit privately with some old friends, whose identity took Catholic Italy by surprise: Evangelical Protestants. They welcomed Francis to their Pentecostal Church of Reconciliation, where Francis asked pardon for Catholic persecutions and celebrated the Holy Spirit's "pentecostal work." Unlike Satan, declared Francis, who creates division among God's children, the Holy Spirit creates a diversity rich and beautiful. And unity; not uniformity, Francis specified, but unity in diversity. Francis named the Spirit's gift "reconciled diversity." Pentecost's rich treasury of scriptural readings, for Saturday's vigil and Sunday's morning liturgy, traces the Holy Spirit's work from creation's beginning, through Jesus' resurrection, into the church's earliest days, now into our days. Kindled in our hearts, the Spirit's gentle fire is ours to share generously, even with those most strikingly different from us. All hearts are Spirit-warmed by reconciled diversity.

TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION

Today we are at the fiftieth day of the Easter celebration: seven weeks of seven days, a week of weeks, now culminating in a festival fiftieth day. While the liturgical color of the Easter season is gold, on this last day we have red. For the first thousand years of the church, there were no firm rules for using colors. Only wealthy churches could afford a full array of colors, and most places used the best vestments, no matter the color, for the greatest feasts. The Church spelled out an exact plan for color, including red for Pentecost, only in 1570, but local differences held on until the 1800s.

Color experts tell us that red is a hot color, best used for fast-paced, upbeat, active experiences. It is hard to be neutral before red, as any matador will tell you. It invites commitment, draws you in. It is a stimulating color, engaging the eye, stirring hunger. It is the most fitting color for this day when we celebrate the descent of the Holy Spirit into our lives, a dynamic presence overturning neutrality in favor of passion and commitment.
