Hello Everyone!

Throughout this Easter season, we are often reminded through the Church's liturgy that Christ has given us all the necessary means to stay close to him as we make our journey through this life. Among these means is the reality that we have the saints in heaven praying for us here below. Even better, we have specific saints that serve as patrons of specific causes or people. We are all probably familiar with St. Anthony as the (much needed) patron saint of lost items, St. Jude as the patron saint of lost causes, and St. Sebastian as the patron saint of athletes. But with summer just around the corner, allow me to introduce you to a patron saint whom you likely have not met, but will likely want to call upon in the coming months: St. Adjutor, the patron saint of swimmers and boaters.

While we do not know many details about St. Adjutor's life, we do know that he fought in the first Crusade, which began in 1095. During the fighting, he was captured by enemy forces and was held prisoner. During his captivity, he often invoked his favorite saint, St. Mary Magdalene, to help him persevere in the faith while detained. Legend has it that St. Mary Magdalene appeared to St. Adjutor and she freed his chains from the prison wall so that he could escape and swim across a body of water to the safety of the opposite shore. After all this, he became a Benedictine monk.

Legend also has it that, the stretch of the Seine River that flowed near St. Adjutor's abbey was troubled by a whirlpool that had taken the lives of many boatmen who had been caught in its current. Then St. Adjutor, rowing out to the edge of the whirlpool, took the chains that once held him in prison and cast them into the water saying, "It is as easy for God to free people from this whirlpool as it was for him to free me from my chains." Immediately the whirlpool became calm.

We will likely not find ourselves in St. Adjutor's home region of Normandy, France, this summer. But wherever we do find ourselves, we know we have a patron saint in heaven praying for us while we enjoy our summer fun. Whether we're at the pool or up on Lake Erie, remember to say a prayer to this saint for safe and relaxing summer months.

St. Adjutor, pray for us!

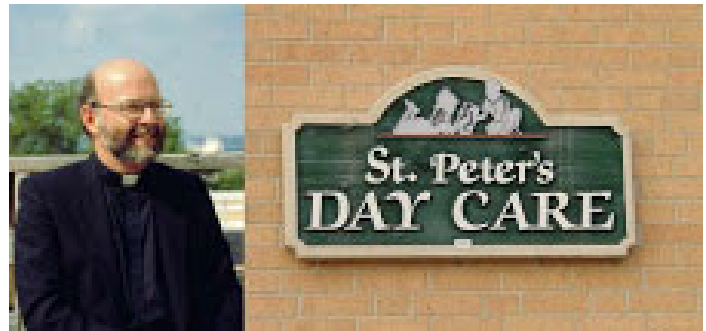
ST. PETER'S HIGH SCHOOL KEY CLUB

THE GIFT OF PEACE

"There arose no little dissension and debate." Did that happen at work this week? Most of us can recall run-ins with coworkers, even with the boss. Did it happen while socializing with friends? Go easy on politics, religion . . . even sports. At home? Even the most peaceful household experiences a little "give and take" now and then. So where was it that "there arose no little dissension and debate"? That tumultuous conflict occurred among our first Christian ancestors, disrupting the community life of the early church. But today's Acts of the Apostles shows how beautifully the Holy Spirit, promised by Jesus in today's Gospel, helped the church achieve a grace-filled resolution. What evolved was that "reconciled diversity" often encouraged by Pope Francis and even envisioned in today's passage from Revelations; and a wondrous experience of Jesus' promised Gospel gift: "Peace I leave with you; my peace I give to you."

TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION

Why is it still Easter? The lilies have long since faded. The roots of our tradition of fifty days of rejoicing from Easter to Pentecost lie in the seven-day rhythm of the Jewish week, drawn from the six days of creation plus a Sabbath day. A favorite name for the Lord's Day among our ancestors in the faith was "The Eighth Day," meaning that in Christ a breakthrough to a new humanity was achieved. With that inner architecture, it makes sense to see Pentecost as a week of weeks, forty-nine days plus one, again signaling that a new age has begun in Christ and in the outpouring of his Spirit. The Jewish appreciation for Pentecost gave rise to the Jubilee year, the fiftieth year, when debts were released and prisoners set free. Today, the character of our Easter Sundays is conveyed by joyful Alleluias and the rite of sprinkling at Mass. Long ago, people expressed this joy by suspending all rules of fasting and by never kneeling at liturgy.

These customs all point to our conviction that time is holy. There is an elegant balance to the Christian year: forty days of Lenten fast and discipline give way to fifty days of unrestrained rejoicing. That's why it is still Easter!
