Hello Everyone!

I hope everyone's summer has been safe and enjoyable so far; I know mine certainly has been. I have been blessed to enjoy visiting with family over the holiday, catching up with friends at weddings, and even sneaking out to the golf course a few times. God bless those who were golfing with me for their patience!

While the summer months (usually) offer priests a few more chances to have some fun compared to the rest of the year, they are also a reminder to us of something very important-our ordination and the ministry we have done since ordination. Because many priests are ordained in early summer, this season finds many of us giving thanks to God for so great a gift as our ordination. Likewise, as we recall that day, we are also reminded of all the people the Lord has brought into our lives and whom we have been blessed to serve. I have been a priest for only three years now, so I do not have as extensive a list of people or stories with which I might regale everyone as an experienced pastor might. However, I can certainly say that I have been blessed to meet everyone that I have here at St. Peter's.

One group that has repeatedly been a part of my reflections this summer is all those whom I have visited who are either in the hospital or are homebound. Without a doubt, I have been very blessed and honored to meet them and provide the sacraments for them. Their faith, gratitude, and strength in the midst of their suffering is a great inspiration to me. They would love to be in church for Mass every Sunday, but their situation simply will not allow them to physically be there.

The sad reality that I discover with regard to many who are ill or homebound is that they have family or friends that *could* bring them, but simply do not. Now, I understand that everyone's situation is different and that sometimes the circumstances are such that it truly is impossible for some of our homebound parishioners to come. Further, I also understand that I am likely "preaching to the choir" on this point because it is often the case that the family members/friends (children and grandchildren especially) who are not in church on Sunday are the ones who need to hear this message.

That being said, if you know of anyone in your family or in your circle of friends that would love to come to Mass on Sunday but cannot, PLEASE, PLEASE consider making the sacrifice to pick them up and bring them. Yes, it will require some of your time and patience, but it is also a spiritual work of mercy (comforting the afflicted). Rest assured that the Lord will reward you for making this sacrifice, even if we do not see that reward in this life.

If you are homebound, feel free to show this article to your family members to start the discussion! :)

MORE EDCHOICE-EDCHOICE EXPANSION SCHOLARSHIP GOOD NEWS

You and all St. Peter's High School families read the good news last week about the additional opportunity high school students in Ohio will now have with the [EdChoice Scholarship](#). Students in grades 9-12 for the 2019-2020 school year who are currently attending public or private schools (St. Peter's High School) and who would be assigned to a high school that is on the EdChoice Designated Schools list are now eligible. Mansfield Senior High School is on the list of EdChoice Designated Schools so your child is eligible for the EdChoice scholarship if: (a) you live in the Mansfield City School district and (b) your child would be assigned to Mansfield Senior High School if they were not here at St. Peter's High School.

Here is even more good news!

The State of Ohio Department of Education will also open an additional [EdChoice Expansion Scholarship](#) application period beginning July 1. The EdChoice Expansion Scholarship is based on family income *only*, regardless of where the student is currently attending school--public, parochial, or private. For example, a family of 4 whose income is \$51,500 or less would be eligible for the scholarship. A family would be eligible to apply for this scholarship upon admission to St. Peter's School.

She will answer any questions and, if eligible, get you started on the admission/application process. St. Peter's School will end the application process on Friday, July 26.

175TH ANNIVERSARY NOTES

In our last column we learned more about the life and work of St. Peter's ninth Pastor, Msgr. Edward C. Dunn. Msgr. Dunn served St. Peter's as Pastor from 1969 until 1984. His tenure in Mansfield marked some of the most challenging and growth-filled years in the history of the Parish.

In 1970 Diocesan leaders began developing plans to establish a new Parish south of Mansfield in neighboring Lexington. It was more than twenty years previously that St. Peter's had last surrendered territory for the establishment of a new Parish in Mansfield. At that time, on August 5, 1949, the parish of St. Mary Our Lady of the Snows was founded by Bishop Karl Alter (one of the last parishes Bishop Alter would establish before his appointment as Archbishop of Cincinnati in 1950).

The new Parish in Lexington was established by Bishop John Donovan in 1970 under the title of the Church of the Resurrection. The first pastor there was St. Peter's Associate Pastor, Father Robert J. Weithman. Appointed to St. Peter's in 1968, Father Weithman served here from 1968 until 1969, when he was named the founding pastor of the newly established Resurrection Parish. He remained in residence at St. Peter's until the completion of the rectory at Resurrection in 1971.

In 1970, under Msgr. Dunn's direction, plans were made to refurbish the interior of St. Peter's Church. Although many murals on the ceiling and rear walls were preserved, much of the notable minor artwork by John Bernat was painted over as the interior of the church was repainted. The painted surfaces were showing significant deterioration and the liturgical trends of the time called for greater simplicity of décor in subordination to calls for more direct participation in and attention to the action of the Liturgy itself. The murals above and behind the side altars and shrines were painted over.

It was Msgr. Dunn who established the first modern Parish Council in 1970. He had been influential in establishing lay people as lectors in 1969. Msgr. Dunn hired the very first lay principal in the high school, Mr. Dominic Dilorio, in 1970. Subsequently, Mr. Robert Kelly was hired by Msgr. Dunn as the first lay principal in the elementary school in 1974. With Msgr. Dunn's support and under Mr. Kelly's leadership, the Montessori pre-school became part of St. Peter's School in 1976. At the same time, the elementary school took up a program for students with learning disabilities. Part of the old municipal building at the corner of West Second Street and South Walnut Street served as the learning laboratory.

In 1971, Msgr. Dunn led the celebration of the centennial of the Joliet Franciscan Sisters' service in St. Peter's School. Over 100 sisters, including 15 who were daughters of our parish, attended the November 16, 1971, Mass and celebration at Saint Peter's. A reception and program followed in the high school cafeteria and auditorium.

We will continue our examination of the pastorate of Msgr. Edward C. Dunn in the next column. In meantime, be on the lookout for information about and opportunities to serve in the celebration of our 175th anniversary in late November. Information will be found in the bulletin in the coming weeks.

Finally, Luke's Gospel shares the well-known story of Mary and Martha, and the different ways they welcome Jesus into their home. Amid all this coming and going, we are invited to pay attention to the ways we tend to the needs of others. Each of us can ask, How am I present to God and others in my life?
