"Peace I leave with you; my peace I give to you. Not as the world gives do I give it to you. Do not let your hearts be troubled or afraid." (John 14:27) Those words of Jesus aren't unfamiliar to us. He says things like that repeatedly throughout the Gospel narrative, "...peace...do not be afraid...peace be with you...fear not – it is I."

Today's readings give us a further chance to understand and to encounter the promised peace of Christ. Words like peace and comfort and joy are among the principal ideas we take away from the scriptures today. It is important to realize that the peace of Christ is not like other kinds of peace that we might wish for. The peace of Christ is peace for us in spite of trouble, anxiety, or fear. The peace of Christ is peace for us in spite of trouble, anxiety, or fear. The peace of Christ defies the understanding of the modern world which says we must avoid suffering or deprivation at all costs. The peace of Christ says, "...be at peace IN SPITE OF TROUBLE OR FEAR. You may be anxious, but my peace overthrows all anxiety and worry."

Using images that call to mind our own childhood memories, the first reading speaks of the comfort God gives...comfort as for an infant child in its mother's arms. What a powerful thought! The God of the universe...the creator of the cosmos wants to give us comfort and wants to give us comfort, moreover, on an individual and personal basis. As you contemplate this idea, it ought to be really clear that God has a deep and abiding love for all of us. Amazing, isn't it?

The second reading reminds us that if we are in Christ we can count on his peace as well. Paul says, "...let no one make troubles for me; for I bear the marks of Jesus on my body." Essentially, he is reminding us that if we have died (bearing in our bodies the marks of Jesus) with Christ, we will also rise with him. In the light of that surpassing truth, what could ever cause us worry or fear?

The Gospel relates the story of sending out the seventy-two disciples who were to preach and heal and teach. Jesus gives them clear instructions...and he tells them to begin their encounters by wishing peace to whomever they meet. If they are people of peace, Jesus says, your peace will remain with them. If they are not, he says, your peace will return to you.

What does it say to us when we realize that one of God's deepest desires for us is that we might know peace and comfort. Think about this! God loves us and wants to comfort us — so much so, in fact, that he sent his only Son to make that peace and comfort possible? He actively seeks our peace all the time, if we but had the eyes and the sense to recognize that! Now how should we react to that?

CHURCH HOURS OPEN

Over the past couple of years, we have had a number of incidents of vandalism in our church during the day. Each had to be reported to the diocese. Moreover, during the restoration period of nine months, we had to lock the church due to the scaffolding being up and to avoid injury. Even with the security cameras in the church, leaving all door open all day is not prudent.

However, for those who wish to come to pray, we now have the **NORTH SIDE door of the church OPEN**—(side closet to rectory, so we can monitor through the security cameras in the parish office as well as from the rectory kitchen) during the day. **On Monday and Friday** we will open the door mid-morning and will lock the church after the evening Mass. **Tuesday through Thursday**, the church will be open prior to the 7:00 am Mass and will be locked by 5:30 pm.

We encourage parishioners to take advantage of these times for private prayer before the Blessed Sacrament.

MORE EDCHOICE-EDCHOICE EXPANSION SCHOLARSHIP GOOD NEWS

You and all St. Peter's High School families read the good news last week about the additional opportunity high school students in Ohio will now have with the [EdChoice Scholarship](#). Students in grades 9-12 for the 2019-2020 school year who are currently attending public or private schools (St. Peter's High School) and who would be assigned to a high school that is on the EdChoice Designated Schools list are now eligible. Mansfield Senior High School is on the list of EdChoice Designated Schools so your child is eligible for the EdChoice scholarship if: (a) you live in the Mansfield City School district and (b) your child would be assigned to Mansfield Senior High School if they were not here at St. Peter's High School.

Here is even more good news we received this week!

The State of Ohio Department of Education will also open an additional [EdChoice Expansion Scholarship](#) application period beginning July 1. The EdChoice Expansion Scholarship is based on family income *only*, regardless of where the student is currently attending school--public, parochial, or private. For example, a family of 4 whose income is \$51,500 or less would be eligible for the scholarship. A family would be eligible to apply for this scholarship upon admission to St. Peter's School.

175TH ANNIVERSARY NOTES

Monsignor James Hebbeler, the eighth Pastor of St. Peter's, had been pastor for fourteen years when, in the spring of 1969, Bishop John A. Donovan transferred him to the pastorate of St. Louis Church in Toledo. Named to replace Monsignor Hebbeler was the Principal of Tiffin Calvert High School, Monsignor Edward C. Dunn, who became the ninth Pastor of our Parish.



Edward C. Dunn was born in Tiffin, Ohio, on December 10, 1916, to John (1894 – 1994) who worked as a machinist, and Ethel (Culhane) (1892 – 1965) Dunn. He was the oldest of their three children, all of whom were sons. Edward's brothers were John, born in 1918, and Richard (born 1920).

Richard, following in Edward's footsteps, was also ordained a priest for the Diocese of Toledo. John married and worked as a sales manager in Toledo. The Dunn men were exceptionally long-lived. Edward's father John (died 1994) lived to be 100 years old. Father Richard Dunn, the youngest of the brothers, lived to be 89 years old and died in 2009. The middle brother John died in 2015 at the age of 96. Monsignor Dunn himself lived to be 95.

Edward attended grade school at St. Mary's School in Tiffin. He then attended Tiffin Calvert High School, where he worked on the school newspaper and the yearbook. He was chosen to be one of the speakers at his high school commencement exercises in 1934. Concern for others and care of the less fortunate were already issues of great importance to Edward. In his commencement speech, he said, "We know that we cannot live our lives apart and neglect our less fortunate neighbors. In the very beginning of time, God clearly taught us that we are our brothers' keepers."

Upon graduation from high school, Edward first attended the school operated by the Precious Blood Fathers, St. Joseph's College in Rensselaer, Indiana. At the beginning of his second year, Edward transferred to the College of the Assumption (now the University of Windsor) in Ontario, Canada. He completed the third and fourth years of his undergraduate education as a Basselin Scholar at the Catholic University of America in Washington, D.C. He earned a Bachelor's degree in philosophy and completed a Master's degree in European History in 1939.

After his secular studies were completed, Edward chose to remain at the Catholic University to begin theological studies. He earned an STL (a Licentiate in Sacred Theology) and was ordained a priest for the Diocese of Toledo in June 1943. He was immediately assigned as an assistant pastor at St. Rose Parish in Lima, where he also taught theology in the high school. In 1947 he was assigned as an assistant at Blessed Sacrament Parish in Toledo where he remained until 1952 when he was assigned to Tiffin Calvert High School as assistant Principal. He was named Principal at Calvert in 1956.

GODS PROVIDENCE

Today's readings celebrate God's providence. No matter how wonderful (or heartbreaking) our relationships are, God always provides for us. No one cares for us the way God does. Isaiah delights us with a deeply intimate image of God caring for us as a mother comforts her child. The prophet describes us not as the usual children of God, but as babies. We should not resist this image, but rejoice in it. Trusting in God's care, we can all let down our guard and rest like infants in the lap of our mother. Saint Paul's trust in God allows him to be at peace like this. He boldly declares that no one can make troubles for him, because he has given himself completely to Jesus. And when Jesus sends his disciples out to preach and heal, he challenges them not to provide for themselves, but to let faith be their guide.

TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION

It's high summer now, school is out, the pace of work slows, and some people drift away. There are visitors in the churches every summer, and familiar faces are among the missing. Some find the summer's call more appealing than the summons of the church bells. Many, however, would not dream of missing a Sunday, and so they make their way to Mass in unfamiliar places, watching the locals for clues as to when to sit or stand, where the Communion stations are. In answering the call, they keep the sabbatical rhythm of the Christian life: every seventh day, the Body of Christ assembles for worship. For centuries, there was no obligation to Sunday Mass in the sense of a written law, but Christians have always yearned to be together on Sunday. In the city of Abitina, during a persecution by the Emperor Diocletian, a group of Christians were urged to stop worshiping together on Sundays. They responded, Then take our lives, for without the Sunday we cannot live. By a curious coincidence, the appointed readings today center us on thoughts of peace. On our Independence Day, the experience of worship situated us in community, and evoked a commitment from us to be advocates of peace in all aspects of our society's life.
