According to legend, it was 500 years ago (1519) on the Feast of Corpus Christi when Spanish explorer Alonzo Alvarez de Pineda discovered a bay on the Gulf of Mexico. A city eventually grew on the edge of that bay and in 1852 that community adopted the name Corpus Christi and is now the sixth largest city in the State of Texas.

My wife and I spent three years living in Corpus Christi while working on TV. As you can imagine, the Feast of Corpus Christi is a big deal for the Catholic Church in that community. The diocese celebrated the feast this past Thursday with a three-hour, 1.5-mile procession around city streets, and stopping at three Altars along the way for prayers.

Children who celebrated their First Communion in the current year are highly encouraged to attend, and the girls are asked to wear their First Communion dresses. These new communicants are given the honor of following the Blessed Sacrament at the front of the procession. Attendees are also welcome to wear their native dresses from their home country of origin, which can be a feat for some since temperatures are always hot and humid in June. This year, the forecast in South Texas called for 110-degree heat indexes.

According to *The Catholic Encyclopedia*, the idea for a feast came from St. Juliana of Mont Cornillon in Belgium. "...Juliana had a great veneration for the Blessed Sacrament and longed for a special feast in its honor that was not tied to the sorrowful tone of Holy Thursday. Her desire increased after she had a vision of the Church under the appearance of a full moon having one dark spot, which signified the absence of such a solemnity. She made her thoughts known to Bishop Robert de Thorete, who instituted the feast in his diocese in 1246. By 1264 Pope Urban IV made the feast day a universal feast across the church." *

Living in a city named after the Body of Christ for three years was one we always will remember. We were able to experience how the Hispanic culture embraces their faith. Our parish, Most Precious Blood was a large active parish that liked to celebrate events. Behind the parish meeting hall, the Knights of Columbus built a smokehouse that could cook hundreds of chickens, up to 50 briskets and Thanksgiving turkeys that you had to be put on a waiting list for an open slot. For these cooks, it was a vocation that required an all-night effort. It was at MPB where we attended our first Quinceanera – an event unto itself, that rivals some wedding planning.

Then for a change of pace, we always had the option of attending St. Andrew by the Sea Catholic Church on North Padre Island. It is the only open-air parish in the world where Mass is celebrated year round. The pews and kneelers are all made of concrete to withstand the elements and the occasional hurricane. However, they do provide plenty of carpet squares to keel on, and in season – plenty of mosquito repellent available to spray oneself down with before Mass.

One of the great things about our universal church, there is so many traditions and culture that has grown from that First Eucharist on Holy Thursday. No matter where in the world you may be, the Eucharist at Mass will always be celebrated the same way.

PRISON MINISTRY CORNER



May was a busy month for the RCIA Catholic community. Our contract requires us to maintain records of numbers of inmates seen for each faith gathering. Here is a summary of our attendance for May:

Worship (includes Mass and Adoration) - 360 inmates, 27 team members

Rosary Prayer - 169 inmates, 18 team members

Music & Fellowship - 92 inmates, 15 team members

Spring Retreat - 75 inmates, 11 team members

Our activities also include weekly RCIA/Faith Enrichment, weekly Meditation Prayer, and bimonthly Catholic Book Study. Those attendance figures bring our monthly total to 760 inmates and 83 team members. Another part of the monthly statistics is number of men seen for individual or group pastoral visits, including to special housing areas such as Segregation, and general planning sessions, such as preparing for weekly Mass and special functions such as the Retreat.

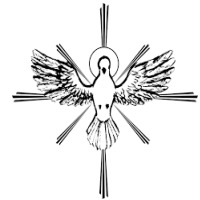

ACTING PRINCIPALS NAMED

Very Reverend Gregory R. Hite, Pastor of St. Peter's Catholic Church and Local Superintendent of St. Peter's School, Mansfield, has recently appointed two new leaders for the parochial school system.

Ashley Rastorfer, currently Director of the Montessori and Assistant Elementary Principal, will become the Acting Principal of St. Peter's School, Montessori through grade 6. She has been associated with the St. Peter's School system since 2013, serving as an elementary teacher in pre-school, kindergarten, third and fourth grades. Mrs. Rastorfer earned her Master of Education in Administration from Ashland University and holds a Professional Early Childhood (P-3) Teaching License and a Professional Principal License (PK-6) in the State of Ohio. She is also an adjunct instructor at Ashland University's College of Education.

Jonathan R. Cuttitta, Dean of Students at St. Peter's High School since 2014, will become the Acting Principal of St. Peter's High School and Junior High, grades 7 through 12. He has been on staff at St. Peter's since 2012, teaching Physics, Chemistry, Algebra 2 and Pre-Algebra. Mr. Cuttitta earned his Master of Education in Educational Leadership from the American College of Education and holds a Professional Adolescence to Young Adult (7-12) Teaching License and a Professional Principal License (5-12) in the State of Ohio.

Both acting principals will officially begin duties on August 1, 2019.

175TH ANNIVERSARY NOTES

We continue our look at the pastorate of St. Peter's eighth pastor, Monsignor James F. Hebbeler, who served here from 1955 until 1969.

**Rev. Msgr. James F. Hebbeler, 8th Pastor – 1955 – 1969**

Monsignor Hebbeler devoted an enormous amount of drive and energy to bolstering the Education and Athletic programs offered at St. Peter's. In addition to the completion of the High School/Convent building in 1958, Monsignor Hebbeler also oversaw the purchase of the old Church of Christ building which stands at the southeast corner of the intersection of South Mulberry Street and West First Street in 1962. The building was re-purposed as an annex for the elementary school, and it provided additional classroom space and athletic activity space.

The last years of the 1950's and the first years of the 1960's witnessed the whirlwind changes that swept through the Church after the election of Cardinal Angelo Roncalli as Pope John XXIII in 1958. "Good Pope John," as he was frequently known, introduced the idea of *aggiornamento* (Italian: to update or refresh) as he called for the first Ecumenical Council of the Church in nearly one hundred years.

Many of the changes worked in wake of the Second Vatican Council came about during the years Monsignor Hebbeler was Pastor here. He worked diligently to implement liturgical and administrative changes as he was directed to do. It was Monsignor Hebbeler who ordered and implemented the free-standing wooden altar in the center of the sanctuary. He oversaw the liturgical changes that were sweeping through the church. In May of 1966 in an interview with the Mansfield News-Journal, Monsignor Hebbeler gave his take on the changes. He said, "The greatest change made thus far has been in the liturgy or, as the Catholics call it, the Mass. For the past 400 years Latin has been the language used in the Mass, but Latin has not always been the official language of the church...to permit fuller participation and greater understanding of what the liturgy is trying to teach, the vernacular is permitted in parts of the Mass.

On the Third Sunday of Advent in 1965, assisted by several priest friends and the assistant curates of our parish, Monsignor Hebbeler celebrated the 40th Anniversary of his ordination as a priest. That Mass was one of the last at which the celebrant stood at the old high altar to offer the Mass. The Parish hosted an elaborate celebration, reception, and pageant in Monsignor's honor. They also gave him the gift of a trip to Rome. We will conclude our examination of Monsignor Hebbeler's pastorate in the next column.

THIS SACRED MEAL

Today we celebrate the Most Holy Body and Blood of Christ. Each of the readings includes a blessing and a sharing of food. They remind us of the central place of meals in our lives. Each meal brings to mind other meals: the sharing of cookies and milk, pizza and beer, loaves and fishes, bread and wine. When we prepare a meal for our family, our friends, even strangers, we always put something of ourselves into the preparation and the meal itself. The Most Holy Body and Blood of Christ reminds us of what God put into the preparation for this meal that we celebrate today. We share this sacred meal and are transformed as we remember the death of Jesus and the sacrifice that nurtures our faith, sustains our lives, and supports our work.

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TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION

We owe today's beautiful feast to a valiant woman who suffered a great deal to establish a feast out of her love for the Eucharist. Juliana was a nun in Belgium in the thirteenth century. She served in a hospital for lepers. She became convinced through her prayer that the liturgical year was incomplete because it had no feast for the Eucharist. Her efforts were not welcome, and a supervising priest sought to punish her for promoting a feast that nobody wanted. He even had her accused of financial mismanagement and banished her from her convent. Shortly after she was exiled, the bishop approved the feast. It quickly spread through Europe. In those days, people very seldom received Holy Communion, and so the processions through the streets with the Eucharistic bread not only led to an awareness of Christ's hunger to be with us, but prepared the way for a deeper desire to receive Christ's Body and Blood in more frequent Communion. The feast grew rapidly, but Juliana disappeared into poverty and a hidden life. She ended her days as an anchoress, a woman living in seclusion in a room attached to a parish church. Imagine her delight at seeing us gathered at the table of the Lord on this day, aware of Christ's presence in our midst, sharing fully in Christ's Body and Blood. Our celebration today invests her struggle and sorrows with dignity and meaning.
