A new school year is upon us, and I'm still a little surprised I have a fourth-grader in my home. However, I'm always reminded on Sunday mornings of my quickly growing children when it comes to the battle of getting them up for Mass every weekend.

"I don't want to go," and "Why do we have to go every week," are common Sunday morning phrases in my house. This summer we've changed up where we've gone to Mass, and the promise of donuts or pancakes have helped somewhat. I know that as children get older, they start to question their faith more. I know I went through a phase where I was "going to Mass", but wandered around the church basement.

I don't want him to be one of the many young adults who decide to leave the faith when he has the freedom to do so. So many have chosen that route over the past couple of decades, I'm sure nearly every family has been touched by one.

We can learn some of the answers from the book *"Going, Going, Gone, the Dynamics of Disaffiliation by Young Catholics,"* by Saint Mary's Press of Minnesota. In 2015 the publisher commissioned a survey about young adults who were raised Catholic, but who no longer identify as Catholic.

The reasons why they have left the Church are quite varied, but the study did find some common themes. Two that stood out for me were that individuals believed that religion was forced upon them by their families, and that one can believe in God and live a moral life without organized religion.

So how does that relate to us as parishioners and parents? I've realized in preparation for this article that I need to do a better job of explaining why going to Mass every week is essential. What can we do as a parish community to demonstrate our faith better – especially to those who have become dissatisfied?

I think back to one time when someone asked if it was okay to attend a service. My boilerplate answer was, "You are always welcome, and our doors are open." However, I could have done more to encourage them, even to the point of joining our family one weekend at Mass.

I bet a majority of those who attend Mass regularly have had a friend who has invited them to their more contemporary non-denominational church. There is a reason those churches are growing and asking their friends to attend is the starting point.

The challenge is for us to look for ways to model what contemporary churches do without compromising the core beliefs of our faith. One of the many reasons people convert to our faith is because they believe in the real presence of the Body and Blood of Christ in the Eucharist. What can we do as a parish to help support our clergy? How can we encourage more people to become more involved in parish life outside of Sunday Mass?

Unfortunately, there is no easy solution. We all have to be active participants and recruiters to our faith community.

A NEW LOOK FOR OUR DEACONS:

Effective August 10, 2019, the Feast of St. Lawrence, Deacon and Martyr, Bishop Thomas has given permission to the deacons of the Diocese of Toledo, if they so choose, to wear a gray clerical shirt when they are exercising their diaconal ministry in the Diocese. The Bishop's permission comes in response to a recommendation made by the Diocesan Deacon Council. The permission to wear clerical attire in ministerial settings, if the deacon so chooses, is meant to assist the deacon as a visible sign of his ministry of service and to help the faithful recognize the role of deacons in the life of the Church. Deacons are members of the Catholic clergy. The wearing of the gray clerical shirt is strictly optional on the part of the deacon.

175TH ANNIVERSARY NOTES

This column continues our look at the pastorate of Father John Blaser, tenth Pastor of St. Peter's from 1984 until 1994.

One of the notable events at St. Peter's during Father Blaser's term was the disastrous fire in the church on Thanksgiving morning, November 28, 1991. Shortly after the conclusion of the annual Feed-the-Needy Thanksgiving meal, Father Joseph Szybka, an Associate Pastor here, happened to enter the church from the vestibule. He saw a teenaged boy in the sanctuary. Father Szybka's first thought was of the votive candle racks in the church but, when he saw that they were undisturbed, he began to walk to the rectory. The smoke alarm in church sounded almost immediately thereafter. The servers' sacristy was consumed in a rapidly spreading fire.

Father Szybka ran to the rectory to call the Fire Department. Then he ran back to church to try to extinguish the fire. In that short amount of time, the fire had grown so much that it was entirely out of control. The rapid response of the Fire Department likely saved the church from total destruction. One of the fire fighters on the scene commented that if discovery of the fire had taken another five or ten minutes, the church would have been a total loss.

The damages to the Church were quite extensive. The server's sacristy was completely gutted. Wooden fixtures and cabinetry were utterly destroyed. The stained glass window depicting the sacrifices of Cain and Abel as well as the clerestory window depicting a Seraph (as well as the tablet windows on either side of it) were badly damaged. Glass from the windows fell outward onto the lower roof over the servers' sacristy and lead framing material used to hold the colored glass pieces in place melted and dripped onto the piano in the sanctuary. A black, oily soot covered every surface in the entire church.

The next morning, the 6:30 a.m. Mass was celebrated in the High School Chapel. Stunned by the extent of the damage, Father Blaser and the entire parish set about coping with the immediate needs of the Parish. Sunday Masses were celebrated in the High School Auditorium for the time being. Many civic and religious groups from the Mansfield community offered tangible and prayerful support. On December 8, 1991, the congregation was able to resume celebrating the Mass in the Church, not withstanding all the soot and damage in the Church.

In early March of 1992, the extensive repairs and restoration of the interior began with the erection of scaffolding to allow for cleaning and painting. The restoration work continued for more than three months. On the Feast of Sts. Peter and Paul, June 29, 1992, Bishop James Hoffman presided at a Mass during which he proclaimed, "The church has never looked better during the thirty-four years I have known it."

Total cost of the repairs to the church for the fire damages came to more than \$175,000. During the course of those repairs, the church's sound systems was upgraded and other improvements, to combat the effects of aging, were also undertaken. St. Peter's had survived the disaster and had come out of it stronger than before.

We will continue our examination of the pastorate of Fr. John Blaser in the next column.

WELCOME THE STRANGER

We have become accustomed to seeing pictures in the media and stories on the news about immigrants from Latin America and refugees from Syria fleeing violence and destruction in their own countries, trying to make their way to a safe place. We have also seen the reactions of people who want to keep them away from their countries, who fail to welcome the stranger and the helpless children. Have we forgotten Jesus call to comfort the homeless and the stranger? They shall bring all your brothers and sisters from all the nations . . . to Jerusalem, my holy mountain, says the LORD. In the three readings for this day, we are told that we are to welcome these strangers, to welcome the discipline of the Lord, which leads to peace, and to strive to enter through the narrow gate into the glory of God's own homeland, the reign of God.

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TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION

The wonderful diversity of life and worship among Roman Catholics of East and West is an example of God writing straight with crooked lines. The steady hand of the villainous Emperor Diocletian drew a line across Europe and Africa that split the empire in two, and for the most part determined how Christians would worship two thousand years later. Italy's heel and the far northern city of Trieste fell on the Eastern side, and have had a form of Eastern liturgy ever since. Constantinople, which soon became the seat of the Roman Empire, became a base for Christianizing the East up to Russia and Poland. Poland was on the Eastern side, but a series of wars and medieval mayhem pushed the religious boundary back to the Ukraine, and Poland remains an outpost of the Latin Church to this day. An old rule of thumb declared that whatever religion was observed by the local prince, the people had to follow. This gave rise to persecution and migration as people sought toleration for their expressions of faith. In the United States, we are accustomed to peaceful collaboration among Christians of East and West, a situation that challenges churches that still feel the pinch of age-old division.
