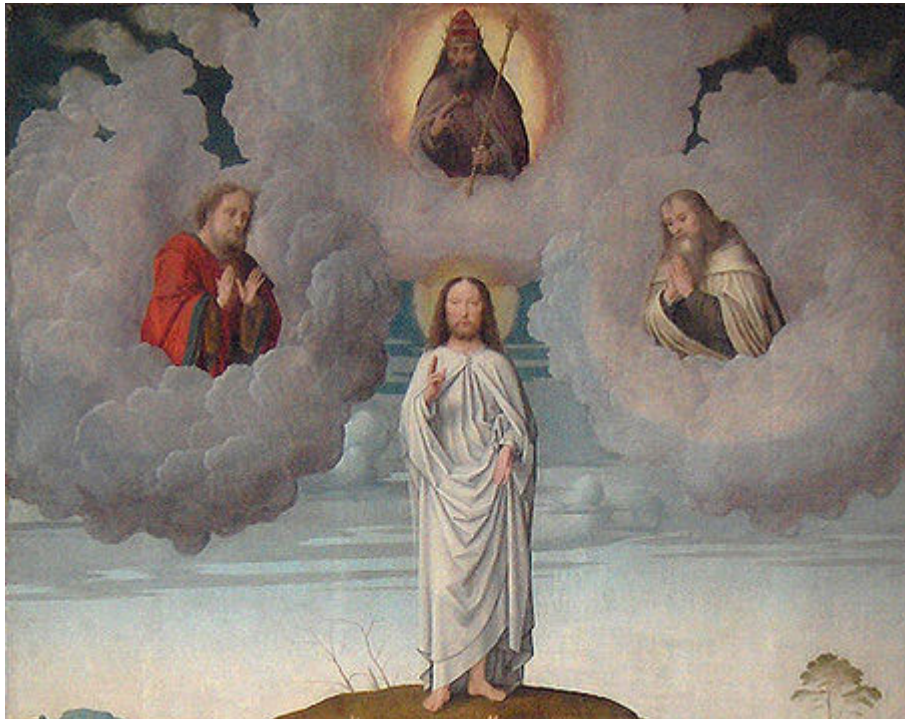

We Catholics are really good at celebrating. Think about it. Our Liturgy is called celebration. We celebrate the feasts of the saints. We celebrate life...we celebrate love. We celebrate the Lord's saving love at every Mass. We celebrate the gift of our salvation every time we call to mind what God and his Son Jesus have done for us.

Our celebrating relies on something else that we do well. We remember. In fact, if we couldn't remember what God has done for us, there would be no way for us to celebrate God's love in the Liturgy. Remembering, then, is a critical component of our faith.

What sorts of things are important enough for us to call to mind on a regular basis? Birthdays, anniversaries, events of national significance, and, if we can get past the crass commercialism of the holidays, we remember events in the story of our salvation – Christmas and Easter. Jesus himself commands us to remember him and his deeds each time we celebrate Eucharist. Eucharist actually means to give thanks. In order to give thanks, of course, we have to be able to remember.

Why is this important to us now? Our Parish is this year celebrating the 175th anniversary of our founding by Bishop of Cincinnati, John B. Purcell (with the able help of Father Maurice Howard), in the Fall of 1844. This really is an awesome and important event to remember...and it is not just the act of founding that's important to us. When we think about it, the entire history of this Parish is deserving of remembrance. All our ancestors and predecessors in the Faith who strove to build and sustain this magnificent and lively Parish are deserving of our remembrance.

It's next to impossible to understate the courage, determination, and faith that it took to carve this Parish out of what was a virtual wilderness no more than twenty years prior to our founding. That courage and determination and, above all, that faith are the real legacy left to us by our mothers and fathers in faith here at St. Peter's. In an era such as ours, when faith and courage are in short supply, we are blessed with an embarrassment of riches in faith and courage. We have only to step up and claim that faith and courage and determination as gifted to us by God through our ancestors.

Please consider taking part in the coming celebration. There are all kinds of activities and programs planned. The entire schedule of events will appear in this bulletin. But let's seize the opportunity to remember and joyfully commemorate the gift of faith and courage and this wonderful Parish in the coming months. And entering into this commemoration, let's claim that faith and share it with everyone around us!

PRISON MINISTRY CORNER



Because of the blessing of having a dedicated St. Peter's Parish prison ministry team of volunteers and a very supportive prison administration and staff, we are able to provide a variety of prayer opportunities for our brothers at Richland Correctional. Each First Friday we have Adoration, typically two hours incorporating aspects such as evening prayer, intercessory prayer, instrumental music, hymns, and prolonged periods of silence. These comments from our brothers tell us the value of such time: "Time in adoration has become a big part of my journey of faith. I use the time to draw closer to Jesus." "I have grown to love Adoration. At first, coming from a Protestant background, I didn't quite get it. Now I'm not sure what I would do without it." "I like the different forms - silence, hymns, communal prayers, the presence of our musician brothers providing instrumental music, etc. Mostly I know I can have at least an hour or so of a Holy Hour with no interruptions."

MUSIC IN THE AIR!

Summer is already flying by and we will soon be ready for the start of a new music season at St. Peter's. The **St. Peter's Traditional Choir will continue its 50th Anniversary Season** with rehearsals beginning on September 5, 2019, at 7:00 PM. In addition to their usual performances at Christmas Midnight Mass, Holy Week and the Easter Masses, this year's Choir will also perform the annual Lessons and Carols for Advent, featuring our newly refurbished organ, and, in celebration of the 175th Anniversary of our Parish, a springtime performance of the *Magnificat* and the *Requiem* by renowned composer John Rutter. If you have ever thought you'd like to be part of the Music Ministry at St. Peter's, now's the time! We're recruiting new singers to join us and if you can sing, we need you! We rehearse on Thursday evenings at 7:00 pm and perform most usually at the Sunday 11:30 Mass.

175TH ANNIVERSARY NOTES

In the past few weeks this column has examined the pastorate of our ninth Pastor, Monsignor Edward C. Dunn. A native of Tiffin, Ohio, Msgr. Dunn began his service in Mansfield in July of 1969 and served until 1984. Msgr. Dunn's time at St. Peter's saw times of great challenge and change for the Church and Msgr. Dunn sought to ease the Parish's transition through those changes as much as he could.

Msgr. Dunn's efforts on behalf of St. Peter's included the beginnings of the "Christ Renews His Parish" program; significant advancements on behalf of the school, including lay principals and teachers, the advent of computing, and the acquisition of land across from the high school for future development.

Msgr. Dunn oversaw the installation of the handicapped access ramp in 1974. As a volunteer project, the ramp brought together the talents of many parishioners under the leadership of parishioner Paul J. Herlihy. This group of volunteers managed to keep the cost of the ramp below \$1,000.

A pastoral man with a vision for ecumenism and a passion for the poor and those who were suffering or in need, Msgr. Edward C. Dunn left a considerable legacy at St. Peter's. First and foremost, at the time of his departure in 1984, the Parish was moved to continue Msgr. Dunn's impact by establishing the Monsignor Edward C. Dunn Foundation for Education in early 1985. In the almost 25 years of its existence, the Dunn Foundation has played a significant role in the support and operation of St. Peter's School. The Foundation has become one of the most important assets of our Parish and School.

As a founding member of the Mansfield Inter-Church Council, Msgr. Dunn helped to establish the relationships between churches in downtown Mansfield which continue to this day. Examples of the collaboration between the churches can be found in the mutual free meal programs offered during each week of the month at different churches, including St. Peter's own feed the needy program which began in 1992; the community Good Friday Service; and our yearly gathering with the congregation from First English Lutheran Church for the Blessing of the Easter Fire before the Easter Vigil.

By the time Msgr. Dunn announced his transfer from St. Peter's in 1984, nationwide trends in private and parochial school enrollments had begun to decline noticeably. In Mansfield, the local public systems also began to feel the pinch of rising costs and declining enrollment. At St. Peter's, however, and although the school did experience an ongoing struggle, Catholic education in Mansfield survived and St. Peter's High School continued to provide a high quality education as one of the very few remaining Parish-operated Catholic Schools in all of Ohio.

All good things must come to an end, as the saying goes, and the Pastorate of Msgr. Dunn was no exception. In the Spring of 1984, Msgr. Dunn wrote to Bishop James Hoffman and asked for a transfer to a less demanding assignment. Bishop Hoffman assigned him to St. Mary's Parish in Clyde, Ohio. His replacement at St. Peter's was announced as being Father John Blaser.

Msgr. Dunn served in Clyde until 1992, when he was allowed to take Senior Status in the Diocese and then retired. Even in retirement Monsignor Dunn remained very active. He assisted with Masses in Tiffin at St. Joseph's and at the Tiffin Franciscan Sisters Motherhouse and in Mansfield at St. Peter's. He participated in the 150th Anniversary celebrations at St. Peter's in 1994 with presentation of several educational programs. As a further measure of his impact on our Parish, Msgr. Dunn was elected to the St. Peter's Parish Hall of Fame in 2001. He continued his ministry of presence, especially among our High School Students right up to the day he passed away in Mansfield on August 24, 2012, at the age of 95. His funeral rites took place at St. Peter's and at St. Joseph's in Tiffin. He was buried alongside his family at St. Mary's Catholic Cemetery in Tiffin, Ohio.

USING OUR TIME WISELY

A jar of honey lasts practically forever. The oldest jar of honey ever discovered was over five thousand years old. Honey is quite different from market-fresh produce, then; because most fruits and vegetables last only a few days, we treat them carefully. At this time of summer, we rush to find recipes for cherries and cucumbers so we won't waste a single one. We wouldn't feel that same urgency about honey. In our own way, we are as delightful and fragile as ripe produce. Today's readings urge us not to spoil, but to make good use of our limited time on earth. Ecclesiastes reminds us that because God provides for us now and always, we can manage our daily affairs without anxiety. Saint Paul encourages the Colossians to keep thoughts of heaven in everything they do, and Jesus himself asks us to treasure not earthly wealth, but God alone.

TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION

Apart from the period from Thanksgiving through Christmas, the summer is a favored time for family reunions. We trace family trees and recall our origins. Worship has a family tree as well, and the way we celebrate today has been influenced by various styles and customs through the centuries. We are Western Christians of the Latin Rite. By far, we are the most numerous Western Christians, but there are other ritual families as well. The Archdiocese of Milan in Italy follows the Ambrosian Rite, Toledo in Spain preserves the Mozarabic Rite and the Arab language, and Lyons in France is home to the Gallican Rite. Other liturgical families, such as the Celtic in Ireland and the Sarum in England, faded away after the Reformation. Until recent times, members of some ancient religious orders such as Carmelites and Trappists followed a pattern of Mass that varied slightly from the plan observed in Latin Rite parishes. Isn't the Catholic Church the same everywhere? Not at all. It never has been! The existence of so many liturgical families in the West reminds us that unity, not uniformity, is what the Church seeks to achieve among her children. We are united in faith, but wonderfully diverse in rituals, ceremonies, languages, customs, and spirituality.
