It's never too early to start thinking about your end-of-year gift planning. With the increase to the standard deduction in late 2017, it has changed the habits of donors in their charitable giving. Nationally, charitable giving has decreased by 1%.

The loss of the itemized charitable deductions has changed the way some donors have given to St. Peter's. The most significant change has been for anyone over the age of 70½ who can take advantage of an **IRA Qualified Charitable Distribution** to the parish or school.

The IRA-QCD allows individuals to donate to a charity as a distribution from their retirement accounts. This gift is not a tax-deductible gift, but **it does reduce the individual's taxable** income for that tax year. These gifts also count towards their required minimum distribution for the year. Several parishioners have elected to use an IRA-QCD and make one annual gift to the parish instead of putting a check in the collection basket every week. The annual limit for an IRA-QCD is \$100,000.

The distribution check must be made out to St. Peter's and comes directly from the financial institution that manages your IRA. If we don't have specific instructions in advance from you on how the IRA-QCD should be used, we will always contact parishioners to be sure of your intentions.

If you're under the age of 70½, there is another option. If you have appreciated stocks sitting in a brokerage account, you can transfer them to St. Peter's. If you have held the share for more than a year you can take a charitable deduction for the stock's fair market value on the day you give it away. You will **also avoid paying capital-gains taxes** that you would have paid if you cashed the shares out yourself and then donated the leftover cash. Your broker can transfer stocks or securities to us electronically, and then we sell the stock and put the money to your gift designation.

(Note: If it's a losing stock, it's better to sell it and give the money. That way, you'll be able to take a capital loss when you sell.)

If you are interested in donation of stocks or securities, you can call the Development Office, and we can provide you with the information to make an electronic transfer.

I always recommend, if you have any specific questions, to talk with your tax professional about your personal situation. You are still welcome to call me for general inquiries, including how you can put your charitable gift to use. Your gift can have an immediate impact on our programs, or you can also help secure our future through contributions to one of our endowments.

175TH ANNIVERSARY NOTES

In the past few columns we have been looking at the pastorate of Father Herb Weber, the eleventh Pastor of St. Peter's.

In the first months of his pastorate in 1994, Father Herb led the celebrations of the 150th Anniversary of the Parish's founding. October 9, 1994, was the date designated for the celebration. An anniversary Mass was celebrated by Bishop James Hoffman, assisted by then current and former pastors and associate pastors, as well as by the Parish's permanent deacons. In addition, representatives from the Sisters of Mercy, the Sisters of the Precious Blood, and the Franciscan Sisters of Joliet also attended in great numbers.

Although social concerns and a passion for justice marked Father Herb's tenure here. In addition, he was a skilled manager and led the Parish through a capital campaign designed to raise funds to pay for much needed repairs and improvements to buildings and sites all over the Parish campus.

One major goal of Father Herb's capital campaign fundraising here was the construction of the Franciscan Activity Center across First Street from the High School Building. The old "tin gym" was demolished and ground was broken for construction by Bishop James Hoffman on the Franciscan Activity Center on April 12, 1998. Completed in 1999, the Franciscan Activity Center was dedicated on June 13, 1999.

Another development during Father Herb's tenure was the acquisition of land for Prince of Peace Cemetery, located in Madison Township. The land for the cemetery was acquired in 1998 and 1999. After improvements and preparation of the property, Prince of Peace Cemetery was dedicated on September 28, 2002.

In a move designed to make better use of classroom space and school organization, St. Peter's Junior High School was moved to the third floor of the High School Building in 2002. It had previously occupied a part of the Elementary Building. Simultaneously, improvements in the Elementary building were made by moving the library to the main floor and making the fifth floor space the new art room.

In the years after the Franciscan Center was built and after the cemetery was completed, St. Peter's, under Father Herb's guidance, purchased the 33 acre Fire Fighters Athletic Complex on Hickory Lane. Although Father Herb was instrumental in the initial phases of the Athletic Complex acquisition, he did not have the chance to see it through to its conclusion. Spartan Field, as it came to be known, was brought to fulfillment by Father Herb's successor, Father Tony Borgia.

In 2005, Father Herb was tapped by Bishop Leonard Blair to become the founding Pastor of Blessed John XXIII (now Saint John XXIII) Parish in Perrysburg, Ohio. Father Herb's energy and vision, long an invaluable asset to St. Peter's, brought the construction of St. John XXIII Parish to completion in 2018 with the dedication of the newly completed church building there.

TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION

Although the hours of daylight are rapidly dwindling, many people would say that these October days bring the years most splendid weather. Americans are riders and joggers, not strollers, and so the pleasures of the season are often lost on us. This is not the case with many Jewish people, who observe an ancient rule in walking to synagogue on the Sabbath. On city streets and suburban sidewalks in many cities, we may notice around sunset the nicely dressed families walking and chatting on Friday afternoon. After a short prayer at dusk, the families stroll home again for a relaxing and festive meal. They return to synagogue in the morning, and then spend an afternoon in family leisure until three stars appear in the night sky and Sabbath ends.

Catholics, on the other hand, pile into the car and drive even a short distance to Mass; some even divide the family to participate at different hours. For Jews, the leisurely walk marks a dividing line between hectic life commitments and a day of abundant joy and enrichment. Before we became an automobile culture, Catholics embraced a similar pace, and in most places walked to church. These lovely days of fall invite us to tap into an old and life-giving tradition. If you live within a mile of your church, walk next week. If you must drive, park at a good distance and walk the rest of the way. Talk about your life, greet strangers, notice the crunch of leaves under your shoes. You may be surprised at how different Sunday Mass feels when it is framed by leisure!
