Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults

One of the many joys of being part of our parish RCIA process is seeing how our "newest" Catholics share their time and talent. I love watching our catechumens and candidates grow in their faith through the RCIA process, then seeing how they contribute in beautiful ways to the parish. They are lectors, cantors, choir members, hospital visitors, Vacation Bible School volunteers, gardeners on our parish grounds, participants and facilitators of adult faith enrichment programs, Feed the Needy team members, and the list goes on.

They truly fall in love with our Lord, they take faith development and evangelization seriously, and they serve as examples of true disciples.

Another joy of being part of the RCIA process is hearing the seekers' stories. Some individuals have not been baptized and have never experienced "church." Others may have been baptized and perhaps were even active in another denomination, but feel they are being called to the fullness of the Catholic faith. Still others may have been baptized in the Catholic Church but have had little or no catechesis their entire life and desire to find their way "back home." By the grace of God the journey may lead all of these seekers to the Easter Vigil.

I'm often asked: How many are in RCIA this year? The answer is "The whole parish!" The entire parish is involved in the RCIA process. We all play an integral role. In reality, there is no RCIA community. The seekers are not joining the RCIA. They are joining Christ! And where do we find Christ? Within the Body of Christ – the body of believers we call parish. That is the only community that can initiate the seekers into the way of faith and conversion....and accompany them on their journey to develop a growing relationship with God.

Here are some specific ways each St. Peter's parishioner can participate:

- Invite someone to church who has expressed interest in learning about the Catholic faith;
- Share your own faith right where you are – with family, co-workers, neighbors;
- Encourage and support your spouse or other family members if they are feeling the Spirit's nudge to embrace the Catholic faith;
- Serve as a sponsor, an invitation requiring energy and commitment but through which your own faith will truly be affirmed and strengthened;
- Provide breakfast items for the RCIA class once during the year;
- Pray daily for all who are seeking a deeper relationship with Jesus Christ.

A SPECIAL GUEST IS COMING TO ST. PETER'S

On **Monday, September 16**, St. Peter's will be honored to host His Eminence, Francis Cardinal Arinze, for a visit. The Cardinal will be in North Central Ohio for an engagement and will visit Mansfield. Although he is now retired, the Cardinal maintains an active schedule. At the time of his consecration as a Bishop in 1965, His Eminence was the youngest bishop in the world at the age of 32. He served as Archbishop of Onitsha, Nigeria, and, in the course of the Nigerian Civil War, was himself forced to become a refugee. He was made a Cardinal by Pope St. John Paul II in 1985 and served as pro-President of the Pontifical Council for Inter-religious Dialogue. In 2002 Pope St. John Paul named Cardinal Arinze to head the Sacred Congregation for Divine Worship and the Discipline of the Sacraments. He resigned that post in 2008. **Cardinal Arinze will preside at the 5:30 Mass on September 16 (when the Church celebrates the Feast of Sts. Cyprian and Cornelius...Cyprian was an African Bishop and one of the earliest African martyr). You are invited to attend the Mass and help us welcome the Cardinal to Mansfield.**

A NEW LOOK FOR OUR DEACONS:

Effective August 10, 2019, the Feast of St. Lawrence, Deacon and Martyr, Bishop Thomas has given permission to the deacons of the Diocese of Toledo, if they so choose, to wear a gray clerical shirt when they are exercising their diaconal ministry in the Diocese. The Bishop's permission comes in response to a recommendation made by the Diocesan Deacon Council. The permission to wear clerical attire in ministerial settings, if the deacon so chooses, is meant to assist the deacon as a visible sign of his ministry of service and to help the faithful recognize the role of deacons in the life of the Church. Deacons are members of the Catholic clergy. The wearing of the gray clerical shirt is strictly optional on the part of the deacon.

175TH ANNIVERSARY NOTES

We continue our examination of the pastorate of our tenth Pastor, Father John Blaser, who was Pastor of St. Peter's from 1984 until 1994.

Father Blaser's term in Mansfield witnessed great change in the parish, in the Church and in the community. Declines in the number of manufacturing jobs and loss of larger employers (Westinghouse, Tappan, Ohio Brass, etc.) had a cascade effect when it came to Parish members, school enrollments, and distribution of Church personnel and resources. Other contributing factors included a generally aging population, loss of young people who went away to school and who just never came back, drug abuse, and an increase in crime and violence.

Mass attendance reached a peak around 1970, when our average attendance was 4,431 people per Sunday to an average of 2,293 people in 1993. At the same time, there was a significant decline in the enrollment numbers at St. Peter's School. In 1962, enrollment peaked at 1,200 students in the elementary school and 519 students in the High School. By 1993 those figures had dropped to 454 students in the elementary school and 198 students in the High School. Even the numbers of priests and nuns stationed at St. Peter's declined dramatically during those years. In 1966 there were 31 sisters in residence at St. Peter's and by 1990 that number had dropped to seven. In the years between 1984 and 1993, the number of priests assigned to St. Peter's had dropped from a total of four to just two.

In November of 1985 the Parish Offices were moved from the rectory to the fourth floor of the High School building, after the Franciscan Sisters of Joliet had consolidated their living space into the west wing of the third floor. The remainder of the old convent gradually became offices, meeting rooms and classrooms over the course of time.

During Father Blaser's time in Mansfield, the Office of Development was established to set up scholarship funds and to provide assistance for the school. Special Funds in memory of Monsignor Hebbeler, Father Kenneth Hans (a Mansfield native and St. Peter's alumnus who was very generous to the school and parish), and Miss Mary K. Swint were added to the newly established Monsignor Edward C. Dunn Foundation for Education.

The decline in priestly and religious vocations also meant that more Parish work was being done by lay people. Father Blaser hired the first Business Manager for the Parish in 1984 setting a pattern that has continued until now. In addition to the hiring of lay people for staff positions, the Church began reaching out to religious order priests and to Sisters from various communities who ministry matched the needs of St. Peter's. In that vein, Father Richard Kennedy, MSC, (also a son of the parish) came back to Mansfield and served as Principal of the High School and helped with Masses and pastoral needs of the parish. Likewise, Sr. Angeline Hoffman C.P.P.S. and Sister Fran Schismenos OSF/T were hired as Pastoral Care and Religious Education staff respectively.

We also began to rely heavily on those who were ordained to the newly restored Permanent Diaconate. Deacon Terry Philpott, the Parish's first Deacon was ordained in 1974. Deacons Rudy Wolf and Gary Jones followed in 1986 and 1989 respectively. Deacon Gene Philips moved to Mansfield in 1993 and began to assist at the parish. Deacon Jim Marshall was ordained in 1994 and Deacon Larry Wilson was ordained in 2003 but then moved to Central Ohio in 2006. Deacon John Reef, presently the only Deacon actively serving the Parish was ordained in 2011.

We will continue our examination of Father Blaser's pastorate in the next bulletin column. Stay tuned!

Humility is a virtue we don't see much in our times. It seems that bragging, swaggering, and arrogance dominate our fashion for everything and our Internet conversations. Our stores, catalogs, and online shopping sites are full of useless items geared in use and price to the very rich, as ordinary, useful things seem to fade off the sales scene. As the rich get richer, the poor get poorer and the middle class is fading away. What is the antidote to this? Humility is a good place to start. Devotion to God is worth more than riches. TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION

The readings today center on mindfulness, awareness of where we stand in God's plan. The mountain of Sinai carries a message of the majesty and distance of God, while Jesus' presence as host of the banquet speaks of intimacy and mystery. September's shadow calls us all to mindfulness as we prepare to return to life outside of summer. The Christian life holds these two places of knowledge of God in careful balance. Even in the accounts of the Passion we see the table of the upper room in balance with the Mount of Olives. Altar means "high place", yet it is also a table. The former liturgy of the Latin Rite began with the priest bowing at the foot of the altar's three steps, chanting, "Introibo ad altare Dei", or "I will go to the altar of God", followed by the altar servers' response, "The God who gives joy to my youth." Many parishioners can recall and recite this scene by heart. As with so many things in liturgy, there are layers of meaning in our worship. The altar table evokes memories of the high places once reserved for encounter with the holy, and the intimacy of the table where hospitality draws us to share food and drink.
