THE CHILDRENS LITURGY OF THE WORD

Hello everyone!

In the first few weeks of each school year, my father would always remind my siblings and me how much he loved the sound of pages turning and pencils scratching across our homework papers. I am sure that many parents share the same sentiment today! As everyone is settling into a new school year, here are some of my recommendations for turning the pages of some "spiritual homework..." for everyone!

Vibrant Paradoxes: The Both/And of Catholicism, by Bishop Robert Barron (Word on Fire Catholic Ministries, 2016). In this book, Bishop Barron gives brief but insightful reflections on various aspects of our Catholic faith which might initially seem opposed to each other, but are, in fact, complementary realities within the depth of the Church's belief in the Gospel message. He covers topics such as the relationship between reason and faith, freedom and discipline, suffering and joy, among other topics as well. Both thought-provoking and relevant to today's culture, these reflections could be your morning coffee-reading or part of a group discussion.

Orthodoxy, by G.K. Chesterton (1908, reprinted by Ignatius Press in 1995). In this short book, the famous English author G.K. Chesterton offers his autobiographical journey to the Catholic faith. A self-proclaimed pagan by the age of twelve and a self-proclaimed agnostic by the age of sixteen, Chesterton subsequently and slowly discovered the truth of the Catholic faith by what many have referred to as a "common sense" approach. That is, through young adulthood, he was always seeking answers to his questions and was never satisfied until he found them. Ironically, it was through the many poorly formulated or incorrect arguments of others against the Catholic faith, that he was brought to consider what the Church actually believes and teaches. Chesterton is not afraid of a clever turn-of-phrase or of some poetic wording, and his story is fun and compelling.

He Leadeth Me, by Fr. Walter J. Ciszek, S.J. (Image, reprinted in 1995). In this short book, Jesuit Father Walter Ciszek details the true story of his experience of being captured by the Russian army during World War II. Fr. Ciszek spent twenty-three years in a Soviet gulag and recounts how the Lord was with him during the entirety of his detainment. A truly and powerfully moving story, this proves to be a very quick read. In his first book, With God in Russia, Fr. Ciszek gives more details about the events of the twenty-three years, but in He Leadeth Me, he accounts for more of the spiritual side of his experience.

All of these books can be found on Amazon.com or on the publishers' websites. If you are unable to access the internet, I would be happy to help try to find other ways of finding a hard copy of these texts.



175TH ANNIVERSARY NOTES

We continue our look at the pastorate of our eleventh Pastor, Father Herb Weber, who served here from 1994 until 2005.

In the previous column, we read that Father Herb had gone to Loyola University in Chicago in 1978. There he earned a Masters Degree in Social Work. When he returned to the Diocese of Toledo in 1980 Father Herb was appointed the Associate Director of Catholic Social Services for the Diocese. A year later, Father Herb was asked to head up a task force assigned with exploring ways to create and improve ministry to the handicapped.

In addition to that appointment, Father Herb was subsequently named the Assistant Moderator of the St. Vincent de Paul Society's Toledo Conferences. He was also named to the Board of Directors of Michaelmas Manor, a residence for the elderly in Toledo operated by the Diocese. While serving in the Office of Catholic Social Services, Father Herb wrote or edited several directories compiled to promote awareness of the social service programs of the Diocese. He also wrote *The Parish Help Book: A Guide to Social Ministry and Faith.* He was the author of a number of magazine articles and wrote a series of columns for the National Catholic News Service.

In July of 1983, Father Herb became Associate Pastor at St. Joseph's Parish in Maumee. His term there was short-lived. In the summer of 1984, he was appointed Pastor of the St. Thomas More University Parish in Bowling Green. An almost ideal post for Father Herb, St. Thomas More afforded him with opportunities to take part in public colloquia and panel discussions by which he was able to advance faith-based issues and ideas in many settings, particularly of an ecumenical nature.

In a September 12, 1984 news article in the BG News, Father Herb said one of his goals as the new Pastor at St. Thomas More was to, "...pick up the tempo of the University...I want to do a lot of listening to see what questions people have and to find out their needs. I would also like to see St. Thomas More become a place known for its hospitality." (BG News, September 12, 1984, pg. 1, Bowling Green, Ohio.)

GOD IS ON THE SIDE OF THE POOR

Two of today's readings make it quite clear that God is on the side of the poor. Amos describes in detail the exploitation of the poor and needy. The psalm repeats that God acts to benefit the poor and lowly. But Luke turns things upside down, telling a tale of a conflicted steward, about to be fired, who demonstrates his cleverness and is rewarded. Like the community to whom Paul writes in Timothy, these readings are personal, directed to believers, members of the Jewish and Christian communities, who struggle to deal with personal choices about how to conduct their lives. They offer an outline for how God wishes us to live in a world as complicated and as confusing as our own.

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TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION

Although June is the month most associated with weddings in the United States, September has become more popular in recent years. Wedding celebrations always require some savvy planning, and people who have a talent for hospitality in the mix. At the wedding feast at Cana, the mother of Jesus was recruited to deal with some of the details of the banquet, and when a very understandable crisis arose, she did what she could to rescue the party. Anyone who has ever run out of ice, dessert, or table settings knows the stress! Slowly, the memory of Jesus Christs blessing of this marriage feast led the Church to form a way to bless marriages. A thousand years ago weddings migrated from the family home to the doors of the church, where the celebration was held in public view. From this practice came a prayer called the Nuptial Blessing, one of the most solemn prayers in our tradition. It is very much like the prayers by which baptismal water and chrism are consecrated, the ordination prayer over a priest, and the Eucharistic Prayers over bread and wine. Four hundred fifty years ago, weddings moved inside the church building. All of this gives married couples good reason to celebrate their anniversaries well, especially with the clinking of glasses filled with good wine.
