Dear Sisters and Brothers in Christ –

Happy New Year! Or perhaps I should say, *Happy Church New Year!* With our entry this weekend into the season of Advent, we begin the Year of Grace 2020. In little over a month, we will celebrate the civic New Year's Day with all the usual parties, meals, and football games. We will probably indulge in the customary resolutions about our diets, smoking-cessation, exercise, and general development of new good habits to take the place of old bad habits. As usual, some of us will stick to our resolutions and some of us will not. Whether we succeed in our efforts or not, come New Year's 2021, we will probably make resolutions again.

It is not such a bad thing that we desire to improve ourselves – or that we resolve to change our behaviors. It is not a terrible thing that we often fail to keep our resolutions or fail to achieve our goals. It is not bad that we try making the same resolutions year after year, either. After all, how can hope and aspiration be bad things? How can the desire to do better or to improve ourselves be bad?

No, indeed. Aspirations and striving for improvement are good things. They are signs of hope. 'Hope springs eternal,' or so the saying goes. May our Advent journey be one of hope and of patient longing for the coming of the One who will make our lives into what they are truly meant to be. May our eyes and hearts be focused on the Sun of Righteousness who comes to set us free. Whether we keep our spiritual resolutions or not, may our prayer always be, "Even so, Lord Jesus, come soon!" *Maranatha!*

HOPEFUL EXPECTATION

Our liturgical year begins with the season of Advent—a time of hopeful expectation of the coming of the Lord. On the First Sunday of Advent we look forward to the end of time when we will awaken to the dawn of Christ's new day.

Today we hear Isaiah speak of a day when God's power will have brought universal peace and God's Word will have instructed all people, radiating God's "light" (teachings) into all of human society. Only when humanity walks "in the light of the LORD" (Isaiah 2:5), when all people desire to be instructed "in [God's] ways" (Isaiah 2:3), will the world be set aright and our deepest longings fulfilled. The reading from Romans calls us to "awake from sleep" for this final "day is at hand" (Romans 13:11, 12). Together this Sunday's scriptures proclaim our Christian faith that Jesus is the One who will finally come to fulfill God's plan of salvation.
