THE CHILDREN'S LITURGY OF THE WORD**December 8** Patti Marie

In October, I had the opportunity to visit our 6th graders at Damascus Outdoor Camp. The facilities were beautiful and the staff members were extremely friendly and so easy to work with! While I was there, the students participated in a prayer workshop, took turns on the giant swing, and went to an aquatics class! Every activity was based on scripture. I walked away feeling positive and closer to God.

Both the Elementary and High School have begun a new accreditation cycle with OCSAA this year. OCSAA stands for Ohio Catholic Schools Accreditation Association. The purpose of the OCSAA is to strengthen Catholic school identity and mission and to engage Catholic schools in the ongoing improvement of student learning. The accreditation process is a 6 year cycle. Parent, staff, and student surveys have been completed. Survey data will be analyzed and we will use this data, as well as testing results, to affirm our Catholic identity and academic goals. At our November staff meeting, staff examined our current mission and belief statement. We are also working on our school, student, and community profiles. Teachers are currently working on completing an "Assessing Catholic Identity" survey and a "Student Learning" survey.

I am excited to announce a new service project that both our Montessori and Elementary staff and students will be participating in during the Advent season called the "Wall of Love." The "Wall of Love" will be on the chain link fence outside the Elementary school over Christmas break and will have Ziploc bags hung by clothes pins on it. Inside each bag will be items that can be used by those in need in our community.

The Advent season is a time of preparation for our hearts and minds for the coming of Jesus' birth on Christmas. It is a time that signifies prayer, penance, and sacrifice. Hope, faith, joy, peace, and purity are symbolic of the Advent season. Celebrating Advent is a special way to prepare our minds and our hearts for Christmas. With this in mind, we feel very inspired to make this mission, our "Wall of Love," be a part of our Advent season.

We are asking staff, students, and community members to donate items for our "giving bags" now through December 13th. Items can be placed in the designated box located in the foyer of the Elementary as well as the Montessori house. Some examples of items to donate include: toothbrushes, toothpaste, soaps, brushes, combs, hats, gloves, scarves, warm socks, hand warmers, and Chap Stick.

Students and staff will help assemble the bags during the school day and help to hang the bags on the fence before we leave for Christmas break. Students will also be working in their classrooms to color Christmas cards to put inside the bags. We hope this mission will be well received within our Mansfield community! Our brothers at ManCI and RiCI were blessed to celebrate Mass with Bishop Thomas on the Solemnity of Christ the King. 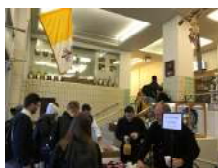

COCOA LADIES

The rule for fasting to receive Holy Communion for Catholics many years ago was more than the one-hour fasting now in place. In the early 1900's, since elementary school students attended Mass every morning during the school week, they could not eat breakfast before arriving to school. A group of women parishioners—the St. Rita's Sodality who were later called the "cocoa ladies" - served hot cocoa after Mass to the children in the church basement. Children would bring their breakfast and top it off with the delicious hot drink. This continued for many, many years.

REASON TO REJOICE

Dark violet is worn throughout Advent to express the seasons character of spiritual preparation for Christmas and “the coming of the Lord.” But on the Third Sunday of Advent, known as Gaudete (Latin for “rejoice”) Sunday, the color rose may be added to the liturgical environment. The entire liturgy is infused with a spirit of rejoicing. Today’s first reading and Gospel proclaim the reality of God’s saving work in our midst. Isaiah exuberantly describes the idyllic transformation of all creation as a result of God’s presence in the midst of the people. In the Gospel, Jesus connects Isaiah’s prophecy with what is happening in his own ministry. In addition to the list of healings from Isaiah (the blind, the lame, lepers, and the deaf), Jesus’ presence brings two other reasons for rejoicing: “The dead are raised, and the poor have the good news proclaimed to them” (Matthew 11:5).

Oh that we would truly recognize God’s creation as a “holy mountain” where justice would flourish and decisions were made “aright for the land’s afflicted.”

We need the words of hope spoken by the prophet Isaiah in today’s first reading today more than ever. But rather than just a vision of hope, God’s holy mountain is a goal “for the earth shall be filled with the knowledge of the LORD.” Christ has come, and the Spirit that rested upon him rests upon us.

The vision of Isaiah is the kingdom heralded by John the Baptist—a vision realized through repentance. As pastoral musicians and liturgists, through carefully selected and composed music and prayers, we lead others to envision God’s kingdom and to experience a continual conversion. However, let us not neglect our own daily conversion and repentance. What are we doing to prepare for a new birth of Christ in our hearts?

Preparing our hearts for Christ can seem to be a daunting task in a world where division and hatefulness is regularly encouraged and even celebrated; where we can barely speak cordially to each other if we have disagreements; where we ourselves can become instruments inflicting harm and ruin. Yet this is the mission given to us by Christ. We come closer each and every day that we regard our common life on this planet as sacred, and seek to be converted toward peace and justice in our own lives and circles of influence. Then will Isaiah’s image of justice, peace, and coexistence come to pass; then will harm and ruin be turned into safety and abundant life.
