THE CHILDREN'S LITURGY OF THE WORD**November 17** Patti Sarah

Weeks have passed since my last article, and I almost missed the deadline for this article! There is no particular theme, just a lot of things that have been going on in our parish that I would like to bring to your attention.

November is set aside in the Church's calendar as time for remembering our deceased family and friends. We celebrated as a parish community Sunday afternoon, Nov. 3, with our annual Mass for All Souls. We prayed that all in the Communion of Saints intercede for us, and that all of our faithful departed, especially those being purified to behold the face of God, benefit from our prayers. Special thanks to our Bereavement Committee for organizing the event. November is the customary time to visit cemeteries and to visit our deceased. Thank you to Dave Barber who is our parish overseer of Mansfield Catholic and Prince of Peace Cemeteries.

On another note, I am conscious that this is the time of the year we hear **a lot about money**. *I don't like to ask for financial support, but it's part of my job as the pastor. Moreover, I feel the need to communicate how we spend our treasure, as well as rely on your generosity, to keep our parish in good stead. To that end:*

+ **Our Annual Catholic Appeal** is nearing our parish goal. If you have made a gift in the past, and missed the opportunity to do so this year, we still need about \$9,000 to make our diocesan goal. Locally, in recent years, Fr. Austin received the benefit of your giving in graduate studies, as well as the new pastor of St. Mary's and Resurrection – a former student of mine – Fr. Matthew Frisbee.

+ In this weekend's bulletin, you have **the written financial report**. *Please review it. We will have an oral presentation next weekend.*

+ Other **diocesan appeals** are usually made at this time of year: Missions (Propagation of the Faith) and Priests' Retirement. Please consider an offering as you are able.

+ Following the **oral financial report the weekend of November 16/17**, an update on our **Strategic Plan** will also be given.

+ After a successful church restoration, our attention is now being directed to our **high school auditorium project**. Phase I of our second major project has received full financial support, and seating continues to go in this week. If you have **made a pledge to our Capital Campaign, yet-to-be fulfilled pledges and additional gifts will be received until December 31, 2019**. *Your gift will help us to continue the work in the auditorium. Thank you!!*

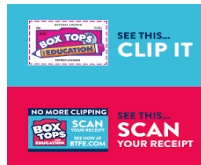

175TH ANNIVERSARY NOTES

In this column, we continue our look at the pastorate of Father Tony Borgia, the twelfth Pastor of St. Peter's Parish. Father Tony's approach to ministry was very informal and uncommon. At the time of his departure from our parish in 2011 at a Farewell Gathering at Spartan Field, Rand Smith (the leader of the development efforts at the new athletic complex) described Father Tony as "fearless." That assessment was true enough, and a better word might not readily come to mind, although it is certain that many other adjectives could be employed. Perhaps another good description would be "unabashed."

Father Tony took pleasure in being seen as "just one of the gang." It was not unusual to see him up to his elbows in dirty dishes or manning a grill or actively enjoining others to step up and help. One of his consistent mantras throughout his ministry was, "Many hands make light work!" You could always tell that he spoke from experience and, for many parishioners, his willingness to muck in with everyone else was just the spark they needed to step up and help, too.

Beyond that, Father Tony was willing to allow himself to be a figure of fun in his ministry. No one who knew him can forget the picture of Father Tony holding up and kissing a brightly colored parakeet at our annual Blessing of Pets. The picture made the front page of the *News Journal* and was used again on a large billboard celebrating the twenty-fifth anniversary of his ordination to the Priesthood.

And who can forget the white horse? When the Parish celebrated the 100th anniversary of the laying of the cornerstone for our present Church, it was revealed that at the original event in 1911, the Parish celebrated with a lengthy parade through town up to the site of the new building, and that the parade was led by the Assistant Pastor, riding on a white horse. When the suggestion was made that we should recreate the parade, including the horse, everyone on the committee knew that Father Tony had to be the one to ride the horse. Of course, Father Tony said yes to the idea and rode through town on the day of the centennial on a white horse, while an amused Bishop Leonard Blair waited on the front lawn of the rectory as the parade wound up Mulberry Street to the Church.

Father Tony was a favorite with students in St. Peter's School. From visiting classrooms to his informal preaching style at Mass to lunches in the cafeteria, students resonated with Father Tony's warmth and kindness. At Father Tony's twenty-fifth anniversary celebration in 2009, the St. Peter's Mini-singers performed a rousing and humorous song composed for the occasion by Music Teacher and Assistant Principal Mrs. Beverly Brook. It was the highlight of the day.

CONFIDENCE IN THE LORD

We are nearing the end of the liturgical year. Today's readings remind us that our own lives will draw to a close one day, and we can be certain that the Lord will encourage, strengthen, and save us--both now and at the last. The astonishing story of the Maccabees invigorates our faith as we behold an entire family willing to die rather than deny the Law of Moses. The psalm response echoes the faithful cries of the Maccabees: I call upon you, for you will answer me, O God. That same confidence appears in Saint Paul's letter to the Thessalonians. "The Lord is faithful", he testifies; "he will strengthen you and guard you from the evil one." In the Gospel, Jesus explains just how long God's protection will endure. The children of God whom God guards, Jesus says, will live forever like angels.

TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION

In the seventeenth century, English Catholics, many of them wealthy and well educated, looked to the American colonies as a place to regain a measure of religious freedom. In Ireland, the so-called penal laws were even harsher than in England, as a minority Parliament tried to force the conversion of the population by denying the majority political and economic power. Beginning in 1691, laws were passed that punished dissenters, principally Catholics, but also causing hardship for Jews, Quakers, and others. There were acts forbidding mixed marriage or sending children "beyond the seas" for schooling. Catholics were taxed at double the common rate, barred from the legal professions and from university, and not allowed to build churches or own a decent horse.

In 1793 the situation began to change, as it became clear that the economic persecution would not drive the majority away from Catholicism. Gradually, laws were repealed until by 1829 freedom was won, although Catholics at university were ineligible for honors, and until the 1920s when the Republic was formed, the Church of Ireland was the state church, funded by the taxes of all citizens. -
