I recall a discussion of the concept of "both / and" as an essential key to understanding theology. One classmate insisted, "How can something be both/and...Everything has to be either/or...." Upon further study and much reflection over time, this person realized the wisdom of "both / and" and shared this insight: "I had to take myself out of the equation and simply accept."

Opposite poles may seem far apart and difficult to hold together. It may seem difficult to understand and balance both sides of a complex issue. But rather than overemphasizing one side and neglecting the other, our challenge to grow in our faith is to hold the two poles together, to maintain a proper balance. Let's look at this shortened list of some theological issues presented by Fr. Felix Just and see that the best answer is "both / and" or, to put it another way, "not only..., but also...."

God is both Transcendent and Immanent.

Jesus is both Fully Human and Fully Divine.

Mary is both Virgin and Mother.

The Bible is both Word of God and Authored by Humans.

The Bible should be both Meditated Prayerfully and Studied Academically.

The Church is both One Universal "Body of Christ" and Many Particular Local Communities.

The Church is both Holy (God's Spirit with us) and Imperfect (in need of ongoing reform).

The Mass includes both Liturgy of the Word and Liturgy of the Eucharist.

Human nature is both Good (created in God's image) and Sinful (in need of forgiveness).

The Greatest Commandment is both to Love God and to Love All (neighbors, enemies, self).

To be saved we must both Believe (have faith) and Put Faith into Practice (do good works)

Our salvation is a result of both God's Grace (a free gift) and Our Cooperation (accepting the gift).

Faith is both Trusting Relationship with God and Obedient Assent to Doctrinal Truths.

Prayer includes both Speaking to God and Listening to God.

Physical death is both the End of Mortal Life and a transition to New/Immortal life.

The End of the World may both Come Soon and Be Far Off.

On Judgment Day God will be both Merciful and Just.

Wishing everyone BOTH a holy Christmas season AND many blessings in the New Year!

END OF YEAR CHARITABLE GIFTS

The end of the year is fast approaching, and it is time to think about those last minute charitable deductions to reduce your overall tax burden. Here are a few ways that may work for you:

- 1) IRA Charitable Rollover – If you are 70 ½ or older, you can elect to make a qualified charitable distribution from your IRA. This distribution will lower your overall taxable income for the year. More seniors are taking advantage of this option and are making a one-time distribution to cover all their Sunday giving for the year.
- 2) Transfer of Appreciated Stocks – If you hold stock that has appreciated significantly you can avoid capital gains taxes and take a charitable deduction by donating it to St. Peter's. These transfers can be done electronically, so contact the Development Office for more information. Stock transfers should be initiated by December 22, 2018 to guarantee they will be completed by the end of 2019.
- 3) Doubling/Bunching your Gift – Trying to reach that itemized deduction level? One strategy to combat the new tax laws is to consider doubling or bunching your charitable gifts to every other year. Doubling may allow you to itemize your deductions in giving years instead of taking the standard deduction.

Be sure to consult your tax advisor about any questions how the new tax laws affect your personal situation.

NORTHWEST OHIO SCHOLARSHIP FUND



Apply today for a scholarship for the 2020-21 school year! Scholarships are available for your children to attend a private school or for homeschool expenses for grades K-8.

Your child may qualify for a scholarship worth up to \$1,500 at the private school of your choice or for \$500 for homeschool expenses based on your family's annual household income.

- * Families who meet the eligibility requirement and reside in one of the participating counties* can apply.
- * Scholarships payments are made directly to the school.

STATE OF OHIO SCHOOL CHOICE SCHOLARSHIPS—IMPORTANT CHANGES

Across Ohio, thousands of parents use state-funded scholarships to send their children to the school they choose. St. Peter's Catholic School is a registered "provider school" with this State of Ohio School Choice Scholarship Program.

THERE ARE SOME IMPORTANT CHANGES AND UPDATES WITH TWO OF THE STATE FUNDED SCHOLARSHIPS

Educational Choice Scholarship (EdChoice)

EdChoice provides scholarships to students who attend the state's underperforming public schools. For the 2020-2021 school year, numerous schools have been newly added to the ODE designated list of underperforming schools so students assigned to those schools are eligible for the scholarship. **Prospect, Sherman, Woodland, Madison South and Mifflin elementary schools, Mansfield Middle School, and Mansfield Senior High are some of the area public schools on the ODE designated list.**

Ed Choice Expansion

This scholarship is based only on family income. For the 2020-2021 school year, **students in ALL grades K through 12** whose family's income is at or below 200% of the Federal Poverty Guidelines are eligible to apply. For example, last year a family of four earning \$51,500 or less was eligible to apply for the scholarship. *Families currently enrolled at St. Peter's who meet these requirements are eligible to apply.*

IMPORTANT: The application period for EdChoice and EdChoice Expansion scholarships is February 1 through April. Once the admission process is complete to attend St. Peter's School for the 2020-2021 school year, application for state scholarships can begin. The sooner that process begins, the better.

TRUST IN GOD

On this final Sunday of Advent our scriptures focus on the historical birth of Jesus, who is son of David and Son of God, child and king, Jesus and Emmanuel.

Isaiah the prophet begs Ahaz to ask for a sign, to allow God to offer him reassurance of the survival of the Davidic dynasty. The king hypocritically refuses to “tempt the LORD” in that way (Isaiah 7:12), but the prophet foretells the birth of a son, an heir to the throne, who will prove the Lord’s enduring protection of God’s chosen lineage on the throne of David. The child will be called Emmanuel.

Matthew’s reference to this history in his description of the birth of Jesus highlights the contrast between the faithless refusal of trust shown by Ahaz, and the complete trust in God shown by Mary and Joseph in bringing about the birth of Jesus Christ.
