

Greetings from St. Peter's High School and Junior High!

What an unusual year it has been! Just over a year ago, we sent the students home for what we thought was going to be a two-week 'break' to help combat the spread of the coronavirus. Two weeks turned into two and a half months as the students were unable to return to the building for the remainder of the school year. Everything that we had planned for the spring was disrupted and almost all events were canceled.

Unfortunately, the influence of the coronavirus didn't end there as we spent most of the summer planning for returning to school in the midst of the pandemic. The days and weeks before school, usually filled with preparation for new and exciting educational initiatives were instead focused on learning new COVID protocols and how best to utilize Zoom as a teaching medium. The year started on a somber note of caution and concern as we didn't know week to week or even day to day what path the pandemic would take and whether or not we would be able to stay at school in-person long-term or not.

Three quarters of the school year later, I am pleased to report that I believe we have done as well as any school has at weathering the pandemic while maximizing the opportunity for in-person learning and preventing the spread of the coronavirus. Through the work of the Restart Smart Committee to develop an effective plan and the diligence of our faculty in executing the plan we were able to persevere.

However, this was without a doubt the most challenging year for our teachers. Not only did we ask them to teach under the new safety protocols but also to conduct classes simultaneously via Zoom. They also had to adjust to students switching back and forth between in-person and remote, various schedule changes, and the potentially increased risk of exposure to the virus. Fortunately, we have a dedicated staff and they took on this challenge willingly and quite successfully. This year could not have worked without them!

Fortunately, as we begin the final quarter of the school year, it appears that the worst of the pandemic is behind us. As restrictions have been relaxed somewhat, we are enthusiastically preparing for our traditional spring events including May Crowning, Prom, Senior Awards, Baccalaureate Mass, and Graduation. After a tumultuous year, we are hoping that we can give the Class of 2021 the sendoff that they deserve. We are optimistic about the coming months and looking forward to a more normal return to school in 2021.

Finally, I want to thank the parishioners of St. Peter's Parish and all members of St. Peter's family for their support during this difficult year. Your contributions help make the work we do at St. Peter's School possible. Despite the pandemic, not only have we continued to provide an outstanding education, but we have also continued to experience our Catholic faith through daily prayer, School Masses, and Theology classes. The one field trip we have managed this year was our Senior Retreat, returning this year to the Damascus Catholic Mission campus. We remain committed to our mission of practicing Christian spirituality, academic excellence, and service to our community as we move on to the final chapter of this extraordinary school year.

#### THE NEW COVENANT

Today's first reading is an enormously important passage, not only in the history of the Jewish people, but also for us as disciples of Jesus, who see in it a foreshadowing of the Christian dispensation. The prophet announces that God has chosen to forgive the people, and that as a sign of divine forgiveness a new covenant will be established. Contrasting the new covenant with the one made with Moses on Mount Sinai, Jeremiah says that the new covenant will be written on the people's hearts rather than on tablets of stone. No longer will the community's tradition be the sole bearer of the covenant; henceforth, God will speak directly and personally to each individual, forgiving sin and calling for a return to God in faithfulness. No longer will mere outward compliance with the dictates of the Law suffice; henceforth, God asks for an obedience that springs from the depths of one's heart.

Precisely that kind of obedience is highlighted in today's second reading, where the author of the Letter to the Hebrews describes Jesus as the mediator of the new covenant whose obedience has made him the source of salvation for all who, in turn, obey him.

#### **FEAST OF FAITH**

#### The First Reading

Each Sunday, we listen to three scripture readings. The first reading usually comes from the Old Testament. "The New Testament lies hidden in the Old; the Old Testament comes fully to light in the New," we read in the Introduction to the Lectionary. "Christ himself is the center and fullness of the whole of Scripture" (5). On Sundays, these readings usually have a close connection to the Gospel. In this season of Lent, for example, the Exodus account of the thirst of the Israelites in the desert is paired with the Samaritan woman's encounter with Jesus at the well. Ezekiel's vision of the Lord raising people from their graves is paired with the narrative of Christ raising Lazarus from the dead.

The readings are taken from many sources—historical books like Judges, Kings, and the Acts of the Apostles, prophets like Isaiah and Ezekiel, wisdom literature like Proverbs or Ecclesiastes. But no matter its genre, the first reading always ends with the same acclamation: "The word of the Lord." The scriptures are written by human authors who wrote in widely different cultural and historical contexts, but these human authors are also divine instruments through whom God speaks to us. And so we say, "Thanks be to God."

#### **TODAY'S READINGS**

First Reading — I will make a new covenant; I will write my law upon their hearts (Jeremiah 31:31-34) or Ezekiel 37:12-14.

**Psalm** — Create a clean heart in me, O God (Psalm 51) or Psalm 130.

**Second Reading** — Christ learned obedience and became the source of eternal salvation (Hebrews 5:7-9) or Romans 8:8-11.

**Gospel** — If a grain of wheat falls to the ground and dies, it produces much fruit (John 12:20-33) or John 11:1-45 [3-7, 17, 20-27, 33b-45].
