

Dear Sisters and Brothers in Christ:

Earlier today I was waiting in line to check out at a local pharmacy. There was only one customer in line ahead of me. Like all of us lately he was wearing a mask. He also had on a ball cap and a coat. After looking for a moment, I realized that I knew him and proceeded to say hello. We joked that, back when we were kids, if you walked into a store wearing a mask the police would very likely have been summoned. Too true.

That encounter provided food for thought as I tried to decide what I might cover in this column. I realized that my chance meeting pointed to the question of recognition and then I remembered the topic of today's Gospel.

The two disciples who had been walking to Emmaus related their tale to the apostles...that is, how they had met a man on the road and how he was revealed to them as the risen Lord Jesus. I find that tale a bit odd. How could they not have recognized Jesus? Didn't they see his hands? Didn't they recognize his face or his voice? Was he cloaked and disguised like some mysterious traveler? The Gospel narrative doesn't say why they couldn't recognize Jesus.

What the Gospels tell us is that Jesus became known to them, "...in the breaking of the bread." Of course! At table in the breaking of the bread! However, I suspect that the two disciples may have been more than a little distracted by grief and, because they had already heard from the apostles about the appearances of the Lord, perhaps by astonishment or shock. At any rate, Jesus became known to them as he broke bread at table with them.

Their recognition, slow as it may have been, points the way for us in a couple of ways today. The fact is that we encounter Jesus more often than we know. Most of us aren't really good at recognizing him when we see him. I'd like to suggest that we think about some of those ways of encounter.

At Mass, we encounter Jesus in the Scriptures...he is the Living Word of God proclaimed before us every Sunday. We also encounter him in the Eucharist...of which he said, "...this is my Body...this is my Blood." Less recognizable but still an encounter, is the presence of Jesus in all those who attend Mass with us...we are the Body of Christ in yet another sense. How does that make us feel? How do we respond to that encounter?

In other ways, we encounter Jesus in the poor and needy and marginalized people of the world. He is in that sense, as St. Teresa of Calcutta said of him, Jesus "...in his distressing disguise..." How does that make us feel? How do we respond to that?

It comes down to our response to those encounters. If Jesus himself is present in the Word and in the Eucharist, shouldn't we give him our attention and our devotion? If Jesus is present in the poor and destitute, shouldn't we treat his wounds? Shouldn't we minister to his needs?

We don't need to see his face. His words and our faith tell us what we need to know and what we need to do. The rest is up to us. Let's open our eyes and embrace our risen and living Jesus where we find him!







FULFILLMENT

It is interesting that during the Easter season, when we do not hear a reading from the Old Testament, it becomes so important. This is particularly true today. Peter's speech begins with a prayer formula familiar to Jews: "The God of Abraham . . ." (Acts 3:13). It likewise contains the potent phrases "Holy and Righteous One" and "mouth of all the prophets" (3:14, 18). Peter was stating in no uncertain terms that the law, psalms, and prophets had been fulfilled in Christ. This is reinforced by Jesus himself in the Gospel passage, when he states that everything in the scriptures (to the early Christians "the scriptures" were what we call the Old Testament) had to be fulfilled. Above all, Jesus and Peter both emphasize that we are witnesses to all of this, and are sent forth to bear witness to it in the world. The Latin Missa, from which our word "Mass" comes, means "sent" (as in "mission"). As we leave Mass today, let us remember to be witnesses to all that has been fulfilled in the risen Christ.

FEAST OF FAITH

The Second Reading

The Liturgy of the Word generally follows a consistent pattern of three readings and a psalm. The second reading is always taken from one of the New Testament epistles or the book of Revelation, and generally is not intentionally aligned with either the Gospel or the first reading.

Where would we be without these letters in which great saints and apostles like Paul, Peter, James, and John share their wisdom and pastoral good sense with the early Christian communities? It is in these letters, even more than in the Gospel narratives, that we learn what it means to be church: to live with each other, in the world yet not of the world, in these days after the Lord's resurrection. Each New Testament letter was written by a particular leader for a particular community at a particular time. We are reminded of this at the beginning of the proclamation—"A reading from the letter of Saint Paul to the Ephesians," or the Corinthians, or the Thessalonians. These texts were shaped by their particular historical and cultural context, but at the same time, through the liturgy, these letters are written to us, here, today. They speak to the realities of Christian living no matter where—or when—we live. They are truly "the word of the Lord" for us.
