FROM THE PASTOR:

Thanks to everyone who helped last weekend with my Installation Mass and with our eighth grade Confirmation Mass. Bishop Thomas was very happy to be with us for both events. I am grateful to everyone who prepared food for the reception on Saturday evening. The food was delicious, and the socializing was wonderful. I'm equally grateful for those who prepared our eighth graders to receive the grace of the Holy Spirit. Confirmation is an important sacrament for spiritual growth and maturity, which are needed for heaven.

If we were to make a list of the most important people in the world, those near the top of the list would be those who teach the Christian Faith, especially to our youth. These people are called catechists, and they prepare people for eternity. Parents are to be the first catechists for their children. Life on earth is just a moment, compared to leaving earth and entering eternity. We do need to take care of our physical health, but it is much less important than our spiritual health. Jesus reminds us of this in the Gospels. The dedication and hard work of parish catechists deserve all of our thanks. They will be blest to see the fruit of their labors, but only completely in eternity. They help to till the soil of the human heart in our youth. In teaching students about God, morality, and their mission here on earth, catechists prepare them for for the grace of the Sacraments.

In Confirmation, there is to be a transformation where the person becomes not just good, but godly. Receiving Confirmation does not make a person "an adult in the Church," nor is it an opportunity to "make the Faith their own." Adulthood is measured by age. However, the church is not interested in age, but instead with our Christian maturity. In addition, our eighth graders have been making the faith their own, but Confirmation is an invitation to go much deeper than that. The word "Con-firm-ation" tells us something. If you know any Spanish, which is similar to Latin, then you probably know that "con" means "with." The purpose of the sacramental grace of Confirmation is to send the person forth "with firmness". God is seeking to make them "firm" (strong) in living the Faith of the Church. Please pray that they desire the transformation God seeks for them. Let us pray the same for ourselves. Let us encourage and inspire each other in the Catholic faith, which will benefit us here on Earth, in eternity, and in Heaven.


RCIA





HEAD OF SCHOOL — UPDATE

When I began in this new role as Head of School on August 1, I created a list of plans and priorities that I shared with Fr. Miller and the School Governing Board. This list includes:

- 1. Enhanced Catholic Identity
- Building community between students, families, faculty, staff, and the Parish
- 3. Increased Academic excellence and student growth
- Meaningful service and leadership opportunities for all of our students.

While we have only been in school for two months, very real progress is being made in each of these areas and many more.

Enhanced Catholic Identity: Fr. Miller and Fr. Kevin are in classrooms every day. Their engaged presence on campus is an enormous blessing for us all. Further, weekly Masses, daily prayer, grace before meals, Eucharistic Adoration, and thoughtful religion and theology classes ensure that our students know and love Christ.

Building Community: Thanks to the Spartan Family Association and many others, St. Peter School is planning events for both school and parish families. In addition, our faculty and staff are engaging in some cross-campus dialogue and planning sessions that will benefit all of our students. St. Peter's is fortunate to be a preschool through high school community, and we will continue to work to leverage all the benefits-spiritual, academic, social, and emotional-that this unique educational model affords.

Increased Academic excellence and student growth: The principals and I have met frequently along with the Building Leadership Teams to discuss academics and student growth. Our students in Grades 1-8 took the MAP (Measure of Academic Progress) Tests this past month. We will use this data to assess student academic growth and to drive instruction. Our school is also going through an accreditation process this year, which will only increase our commitment to student learning and continuous improvement.

Service and Leadership Opportunities: Our entire faculty and staff are committed to providing many opportunities for service, in our local community and beyond. Jerry Bradner is graciously spearheading the 7th through 12th-grade service component and is also working closely with the Elementary School to help build lifelong servant leaders. Look for more school-wide, collaborative service projects in the months ahead.

These are just a few of the many great things happening here at St. Peter's School. As always, thank you for prayers and financial support, and thanks for being a part of the St. Peter's family.

FEAST OF FAITH

Only Say the Word

The bread is broken, the banquet is prepared, and now we are invited to the feast. Once more the priest holds the host, now broken, for us to see, and invites us to behold the one "who takes away the sins of the world." Truly blessed and happy are those invited to this meal, which is a foretaste of the heavenly banquet, the supper of the Lamb (Revelation 19:19). We respond to this invitation with a prayer to the Lord: we acknowledge that we are not worthy, but at the same time we are confident that the One who comes to us can heal us, body and soul. This prayer echoes the story of the centurion in Luke's Gospel. The centurion, a Gentile, asks healing for his servant, but does not consider himself worthy to have Jesus come under his roof—he believes that Jesus can heal his servant with a word, without even seeing him. Jesus is amazed at his faith. It is the same for us. We believe that Jesus speaks to us, comes to us, dwells with us, even though we neither hear his voice nor see his face.

THE HUMANITY OF JESUS CHRIST

All three readings today support—each in its own way, of course—a reflection on the humanity of Jesus Christ and how that humanity played a key role in the drama of our salvation. Although not chosen specifically to coordinate with the other two readings, today's second reading, does in fact, carry forward the theme of Christ's humanity in a remarkable way. The author of the Letter to the Hebrews highlights the solidarity that exists between Jesus and us, precisely because in his human nature Jesus has known the same sufferings and testing that are our own experience. Because he can "sympathize with our weaknesses," we can "approach the throne of grace to receive mercy." For the author of Hebrews, the humanity of Jesus was an essential requirement for his redemptive death, as well as an invitation to us to find in Jesus someone with whom we can identify in our daily struggles.

OCTOBER 17 - THE FEAST OF ST. LUKE, EVANGELIST

Early historians said this author of the third Gospel and the Acts of the Apostles was born to a pagan family in Antioch (Turkey) and converted to Christianity.

According to Paul's letters and Acts, he was a doctor and Paul's companion during his later journeys and imprisonment in Rome. Luke's New Testament writings in Greek were for gentiles, extending to them the salvation promised to Israel. He is the patron of physicians and surgeons and, because of a legend that he painted a Marian icon, of painters.
