

FROM THE PASTOR:

Hopefully this past week you experienced some of the beauty and goodness of God. Life is filled with challenges and difficulties, but also with God's blessings. Just as plants need both sunshine and rain to grow, so we too need both the blessings and difficulties to become more like God. It's the challenges in life that call us to grow in Christian virtue, and to become less worldly and more Godly. When those moments come, be sure to draw near to Christ, He will help you through it

One of the blessings we will experience next weekend is having Bishop Thomas join us both Saturday and Sunday. The occasion for his visit is to officially install me as pastor here at St. Peter (Saturday 5:00 pm) and to confer the sacrament of Confirmation to the eighth graders of this parish (Sunday 11:30 am).

After the Saturday evening Mass, there will be a reception in the church basement for all parishioners to attend. Hopefully you will be able to join Bishop Thomas and your fellow parishioners for good fellowship and tasty refreshments. I'll provide more information next week about both my installation and the sacrament of Confirmation.

You might have noticed in the pews last week envelopes for "Perpetuate the Gift". As you may know, those envelopes are for the annual collection for the Priests' Retirement Fund. In our diocese, like most dioceses, priests receive a modest income from wherever they serve. Once a priest retires from active ministry, the diocese continues to provide income to him for necessities like food, housing, etc. The funding for this is the reason for the "Perpetuate the Gift" envelopes in the church pews. Please consider making a donation to this fund, even if it's only ten dollars. Our retired priests will be grateful that you did!

You will also notice at the Masses this weekend something different. It won't be in what you see but in what you hear. In the past, during the Universal Prayers, which years ago were referred to as the Petitions, the names of recently deceased parishioners were included in the last prayer (petition).

Beginning this Sunday, only one name will be spoken as part of the last prayer, which will be the name listed in the bulletin for that particular Mass. There is a very important reason for why these names have not been spoken during the Mass, which I will explain in a future bulletin. The Church is concerned about people having an incorrect understanding of what the Mass intention(s) is. This is already the case for many Catholics. Notice this Sunday the exact wording of the last Universal Prayer. That will be the first installment of the catechesis (religious instruction) about this in the future bulletin.

Both high school and elementary students created "thank you" posters using hand cutouts to make flowers. These posters will be distributed to staff at both Ohio Health and Avita Hospitals.





FEAST OF FAITH

The Sign of Peace

"Greet one another with a holy kiss," wrote Saint Paul to the Corinthians (1 Corinthians 16:20), and he said the same thing to other communities as well. The holy kiss, the sign of peace, has been a hallmark of Christians from the very beginning. In giving and receiving the sign of peace, we are not giving something of our own, but something that Christ has given to us. "Peace I leave with you, my peace I give to you," Jesus told his disciples (John 14:27). Jesus comes to us when we gather together in community.

We celebrate the Eucharist not just to receive spiritual nourishment to help us on our solitary way to salvation, but to be transformed into one body, the Body of Christ in the world. As we receive the Eucharist, we are not only united to Christ; we are united to each other. It is never easy to live in community, and we hurt each other on the way. So we need to turn to each other in a sign of reconciliation and forgiveness, to look into each other's eyes, and give and receive the peace that is not ours, but Christ's.

THE BARRIERS THAT SEPARATE US

We live in a society that has many technological avenues for stimulation and entertainment, one in which the urban population exceeds the non-urban. It is curious that loneliness is a prevalent malady. It is easy to reach out and touch someone, we are told. But—in truth—it is not all that easy, and statistics from the mental health field will reinforce that opinion. Today's readings are about the ways in which we can authentically reach out: God touches Adam to create a mate and end his solitude; God-in-Jesus takes on human flesh and death in order that we might come to glory; Jesus reaches out to the children whom the disciples had tried to keep away, showing us the manner in which we must approach the loving embrace that awaits us in heaven. Until that day, however, we must remember that ours is a sacramental church, a church of signs of the love of God. And so we are called to reach out continually to ease the loneliness and the barriers that separate us from one another and, therefore, from the love of Christ.

RESPECT LIFE MONTH 2021 | REFLECTION

St. Joseph: Faithful Protector of Mother and Child

The infant Christ "came into our world in a state of great vulnerability. He needed to be defended, protected, cared for and raised by Joseph" (PC 5). The humble and often hidden carpenter of Nazareth accompanied Mary in her pregnancy, assisted at the birth of the Messiah in a stable, presented Jesus in the Temple, fled with his family far from their homeland to protect them, and lovingly raised Jesus as his own son in the years to come.

While the angel of the Lord appeared to Mary to announce that she would bring forth the Savior of the world, it was revealed to *Joseph* in a series of dreams how God's plans would be brought to fulfillment. As Pope Francis highlights, "God trusted Joseph, as did Mary, who found in him someone who would not only save her life, but would always provide for her and her child" (PC 5).

Like every other human family, the Holy Family had to confront real and concrete challenges. Yet, "in every situation, Joseph

declared his own 'fiat'" (PC 3). His "yes" to the Lord meant that regardless of the hardship and personal sacrifice to himself, he consistently chose to put the needs of Mary and Jesus before his own. Joseph's devotion helps reveal to us our own call to show special care for the lives of those whom God has entrusted to us.

During this Year of St. Joseph, each of us can find in him "an intercessor, a support and a guide in times of trouble" (PC, Intro). Joseph shows us how to say "yes" to life, despite our own fears, frailties, and weaknesses. For it is Joseph who was "chosen by God to guide the beginnings of the history of redemption. He was the true 'miracle' by which God saves the child and his mother" (PC 5).

May we, too, be miracles in the lives of those who are most in need, especially at the beginning and end of life. *Dear St. Joseph, you who were "able to turn a problem into a possibility by trusting always in divine providence" (PC 5), help us to imitate your faithful trust and courage.*
