

From the Pastor:

I hope the last few days were a blessing to you and your family. I pray you were able to set aside the business and concerns of the world and be with your family and friends. I have always enjoyed these special days, not just because of pumpkin pie and homemade stuffing, both of which I like very much, but because of the opportunity to be with those who are most important to me. I also enjoy the rest and relaxation that comes with the holidays. They are good for the body and good for the soul.

This Sunday marks the beginning of Advent, the time each year when we focus on the coming of Jesus: both His first coming (past) and His second coming (future). It is important that we think about both of these 'advents' as one single transcendent and ongoing event. History is only important in its ability to affect today and tomorrow. We are not meant to live in the past, but rather in the present while we anticipate and prepare for the future. Christians celebrate Christ's first coming, but they also look forward joyfully to His Second Coming.

The mature Christian yearns to enter into the presence of God, and knows that doing so requires holiness. As a result, the mature Christian looks to God first before deciding what to think, say, and do. Such a person truly seeks to love God more than anything, and also to love their neighbors as they would love themselves. Advent calls us back to this. At Mass this weekend, notice how the second scripture reading makes this point. We are reminded to "... conduct yourselves to please God." God calls us to "...increase in love..." and to be "...blameless in holiness." God will "... strengthen your heart," if you ask for that in your prayers.

You will soon be receiving in the mail, if you haven't already, a Christmas card from Fr. Kevin and me. We are happy to be here at St. Peter Parish as your priests. It is the greatest joy of our lives, and we are blest to live our vocation among you. The card is a small token of our love and appreciation for each of you. We will be praying with special intensity this holy season of Advent for all of you. We hope you and your family will join us in one of the most special prayers, the Christmas Mass. We will be offering six different Mass times here at from Christmas Eve through Christmas morning.

Please be aware that Christmas this year is on Saturday, which will affect the weekend Mass schedule. You will also notice that all the Masses will be in the church and none will be celebrated in the school auditorium. This was done in the past to accommodate large crowds of people for the early vigil Mass. However, attendance at the auditorium Mass has decreased over the years as has the availability of priests. We do have two priests at this parish, but that leaves no margin for error if one of us is sick or needs to respond to an emergency. Parishes have had to cancel Masses because a priest was sick. Thankfully, we won't have to do that here.

We the Church enter into Advent and the new liturgical year with a call for a watchful confidence. Our readings were originally addressed to communities undergoing great loss and confusion. Jeremiah speaks confidently of God fulfilling the ancient promises to Israel, even during a time of foreign invasion. Paul speaks of God leading the Church into holiness, while the community longs for the coming of Jesus. In the Gospel passage from Luke, Jesus speaks of powerful signs and of great confusion to come, but emphasizes that we may look forward knowing that God brings not cause for despair, but hope. We celebrate Advent to remind each other of God's faithfulness. We are to be watchful, to see how God is stirring up our world. God disturbs both our pride and our complacency, and brings us healing and justice. We prepare ourselves to welcome Jesus, confident that God indeed fulfills all these divine promises.

Advent Begins

November 28 - December 24

Beginning the Church's liturgical year, Advent (from, "ad-venire" in Latin or "to come to") is the season encompassing the four Sundays (and weekdays) leading up to the celebration of Christmas.

The Advent season is a time of preparation that directs our hearts and minds to Christ's second coming at the end of time and to the anniversary of Our Lord's birth on Christmas. From the earliest days of the Church, people have been fascinated by Jesus' promise to come back. But the scripture readings during Advent tell us not to waste our time with predictions. Advent is not about speculation. Our Advent readings call us to be alert and ready, not weighted down and distracted by the cares of this world (Lk 21:34-36). Like Lent, the liturgical color for Advent is purple since both are seasons that prepare us for great feast days. Advent also includes an element of penance in the sense of preparing, quieting, and disciplining our hearts for the full joy of Christmas.

As we prepare for Christmas, the General Instruction of the Roman Missal notes some differences to the Mass that should be observed during the season. For instance, the priest will wear violet or purple during Advent, except for the Third Sunday of Advent (Gaudete Sunday) when rose is worn (GIRM, no. 316). Aside from what the priest wears, other aesthetic changes in the Church can include a more modestly decorated altar.

The final days of Advent, from December 17 to December 24, we focus on our preparation for the celebrations of the Nativity of our Lord at Christmas. In particular, the "O" Antiphons are sung during this period and have been by the Church since at least the eighth century. They are a magnificent theology that uses ancient biblical imagery drawn from the messianic hopes of the Old Testament to proclaim the coming of Christ as the fulfillment not only of Old Testament hopes, but of present ones as well.

Advent devotions including the Advent wreath, remind us of the meaning of the season. Our Advent calendar above can help you fully enter into the season with daily activity and prayer suggestions to prepare you spiritually for the birth of Jesus Christ.
